Maslow's Need Hierarchy

The Qeriya hierarchy of five needs. As each need is substantially satisfied, the next need becomes dominant.

Assumption Higher Order Internal

Lower Order External

Physiological

- Individuals
 cannot move to
 the next higher
 level until all
 needs at the
 current (lower)
 level are
 satisfied
- Must move in hierarchical order

Evaluation

Appreciations

- Theory presents for the first time entire array of non-economic worker needs
- Explanations for non-motivated employees
- Motivation as a continuous process

Criticisms

- Presence of more than one need in the same situation
- Hierarchy
- Intensity

Herzberg's Two Factor Theory:

- The factors leading to job satisfaction and job dissatisfaction are different.
- Improving Hygiene factors lead to reduce job dissatisfaction and motivation factors leads to job satisfaction.
- To Herzberg hygiene factors must be met to remove dissatisfaction. If motivators are given, then satisfaction can occur.

Key Point: Satisfaction and dissatisfaction are not opposites but separate constructs

Evaluation

- Herzberg is limited by his methodology
- Participants had self-serving bias
- Reliability of raters questioned
- Bias or errors of observation
- No overall measure of satisfaction was used
- Herzberg assumed, but didn't research, a strong relationship between satisfaction and productivity

Alderfer's ERG Theory

Three primary categories of Human needs:

- Existence: Physiological needs and protection from physical danger
- Relatedness: Social and affiliation, respect and positive regard
- Growth Realizing one's potential
- More than one need may be operative at the same time.
- If the gratification of a higher level need is stifled, the desire to satisfy a lower level need increases.

For Maslow it is 'satisfaction- progression' but for Alderfer it is 'frustration-regression'.

McGregor's Theory X and Theory Y

- Two distinct views of human beings: Theory X (basically negative) and Theory Y (positive).
 - Managers used a set of assumptions based on their view
 - The assumptions molded their behavior toward employees

Theory X

- Workers have little ambition
- Dislike work
- Avoid responsibility

Theory Y

- Workers are selfdirected
- Enjoy work
- Accept responsibility

Mc Clelland's theory of needs:

- The need for achievement (nAch)
 - The drive to excel, to achieve in relation to a set of standards, to strive to succeed
- The need for power (nPow)
 - The need to make others behave in a way that they would not have behaved otherwise
- The need for affiliation (nAff)
 - The desire for friendly and close interpersonal relationships
 - People will have varying levels of these needs, which make this theory difficult to measure.
