

SELECTION OF MACHINERY

Replacing manual machines or traditional methods when labour is not available for economic consideration

- Large area is under cultivation
- **Timeliness of operation**

If cost of operation of traditional method is more than improved method by machine

Advantages of custom hiring

If machines are available for operation, then custom hiring is economical for small and medium farms

Timeliness of operation is important

For large farms partial ownership and partial hiring may be economical

COST OF OPERATION

Fixed cost Depreciation [D = (P - S)/L]Interest Insurance, tax and shelter (3.5% of the purchase price/ annum) Variable cost Labour cost Fuel, oil and lubricant **Repair and maintenance cost**

Determination of fixed cost percentage

Annual Depreciation AD = (P - S)/L = (P - 0.1P)/L = P * 0.9/LInterest >INT = i (P +S)/2 = i (P + 0.1P)/2 = i *0.55 *P Taxes, insurance and shelter >3.5% of the purchase price = 0.035P Total Fixed cost (TFC) = P * 0.9/L + i*0.55P + 0.035P = P (0.9/L + i*0.55 + 0.035)Fixed cost % of purchase price = (TFC/P) * 100 = 100 * (0.9/L + i*0.55 + 0.035)

*When average annual use exceeds this number of hours, machine will wear out befor it becomes obsolete.

*If machine is mounted type, add total of 1% of new cost for each time machine mounted *and* dismounted (normally once a year).



SELECTION OF POWER SOURCE - TRACTOR

PRIMARY CRITERIA

Size of land holding (High hp tractor for big farm)

Type of operation (Field operation that is toughest)

Working time available (80 % of the available time is utilized)

Type of soil



Secondary criteria

Running cost

Less specific fuel consumption is preferred

- SFC varies from 185 205 g/PTO hp/hr for 50 25 hp tractor
- Tractor with low fuel consumption may require high R&M cost.

Major repair after 2000-3000 h of operation

Compare the fuel and R&M cost of tractors before purchase

After sale service and repair facilities

Other considerations

- For puddling- see the suitability of the tractor for wet tillage
- Draft and depth control system should be preferred
- Safe limit of noise level (85-90 dBA)
- Lower turning radius
