IDENTIFICATION OF DIFFERENT NON-INSECT PESTS:

VETERINARY INSECT PESTS

Objective:

To study the characteristics and nature of damage of different non-insect pests *viz.*, veterinary insect pests

I. Cattle Pests

1. The horse fly Tabanus striatus

• Has a thick set body, alarge head and big eyes

Family: Tabanidae

Order: Diptera

2. The cattle fly Hippobosca maculata

• • •

Order: Diptera)

Family: Hippoboscidae

- Horny or leathery flies
- Have long and stout legswith well developed tasal claws for clinging to host's hair

3. The blood sucking fly Siphona exigua

Order: Diptera)
Family: Muscidae

- Yellowish-grey
- Proboscis slender and projects downwards
- At rest, wings are held at an angle

II. Fowl Pests

1. The shaft louse Menopon gallinae

• Dorso-ventrally flattened and wingless

• 1.5mm in length with biting mouth parts

Order: Mallophaga Family: Menoponidae

2. The body or vent louse Menacanthus stramineus

Order: Mallophaga Family: Menoponidae

- The antennae are club shaped and mostly concealed beneath the head.
- The female chicken body louse is yellowish, and each leg has two tarsal claws.
- The abdomen is elongated, broadly rounded posteriorly, and has two or more transverse rows of hairs on most dorsal plates.

3. The chicken flea Echidnophaga gallinacean

Order: Siphonaptera Family: Tungidae

• It is a minute, flat, dark brown insect remaining attached to the host with its

 head embedded in to the skin.

III. Sheep and goat

1. The head maggot of sheep Oestrus ovis

Order: Diptera

Family: Oestridae

- The sheep nasal bot fly is a stout, grayish-brown fly covered with short hairs.
- Adult *Oestrus ovis* have black pits dorsally between the eyes on the frons and black tubercles among the yellow hairs on the yellow-brown scutum and scutellum.
- The abdomen is black with an irregular pattern of lighter marking which varies with the angle of illumination.

2. The sheep ked Melophagus ovinus

Order: Diptera

Family: Hippoboscidae

• It is a wingless, leathery, hairy fly which attacks the sheep

3. The biting louse *Bovicola ovis*

Order: Mallophaga Family: Trichodectidae

- The sheep body louse is a pale yellow insect 1.5–2 mm long with brown transverse stripes on the abdomen and a broad, red-brown head
- Males are smaller than females and have more pointed abdomens.
