

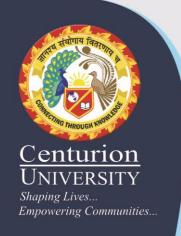

Collisions

Relation between Elastic constants. (Y, η & σ)

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17:-RELATION BETWEEN Y, η and σ

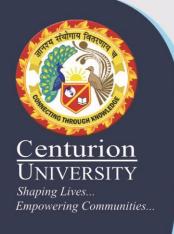
If a tangential force F is applied to the upper face ABEF of a cube ABCDEFGH, then the face ABCD is displaced to new position A'B'CD and diagonal DB increases to DB' while diagonal CA decreases to CA'.

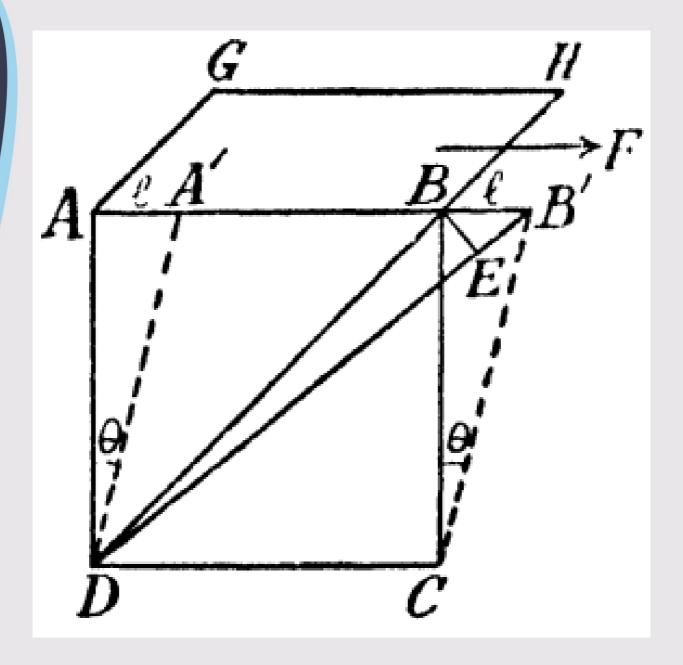
Shearing stress =
$$\frac{F}{Area\ ABGH} = T$$

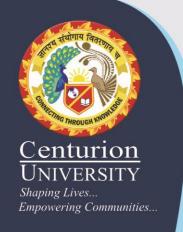
Now the shearing stress along AB is equivalent to the tensile stress along DB and an equal compressive stress along CA at right angles.

Let α =longitudinal strain per unit stress

 β = lateral strain per unit stress







Now the increase of diagonal DB due to tensile stress= $DB \cdot T \cdot \alpha$ and increase in diagonal DB due to compressive stress along $AC = DB \cdot T \cdot \beta$

 $\therefore \text{ Total increase along DB} = DB \cdot T \cdot (\alpha + \beta)$

$$= \sqrt{2}LT(\alpha + \beta)$$
 eq(1)

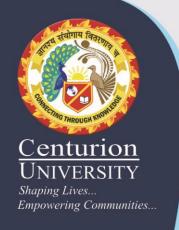
Where L is the length of a side of the cube.

Now, $BE \perp DB'$. So, increase in length $\approx B'E$

Since θ is very small, $B'E = BB' \cos 45^\circ = \frac{BB'}{\sqrt{2}} = \frac{l}{\sqrt{2}}$

Where l is the change in length of the side of the cube. Putting in eq(1)

$$\frac{l}{\sqrt{2}} = \sqrt{2}LT(\alpha + \beta)$$



or,
$$T \cdot \frac{L}{l} = \frac{1}{2(\alpha + \beta)}$$

Also
$$\eta = \frac{T}{l/L} = \frac{TL}{l}$$

$$\therefore \quad \eta = \frac{1}{2(\alpha + \beta)} = \frac{1}{2\alpha(1 + \beta/\alpha)} \qquad \text{eq}(2)$$

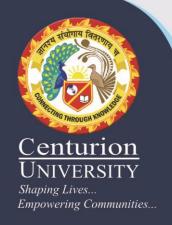
Now by definition, Poisson's ratio $\sigma = \frac{\beta}{\alpha}$

and Young's modulus $Y = \frac{1}{\alpha}$

So,

$$\eta = \frac{Y}{2(1+\sigma)}$$

or,
$$Y = 2\eta(1 + \sigma)$$
 eq(3)

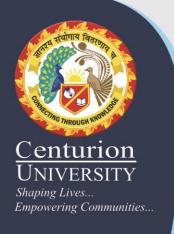


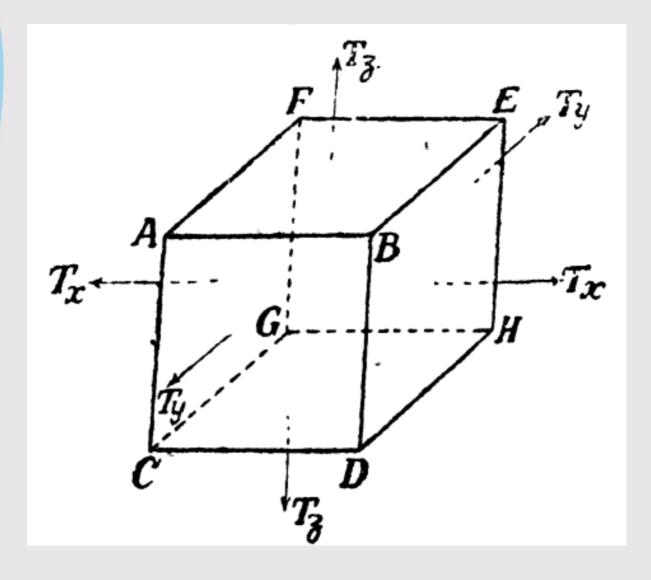
Relation between Y, K and σ

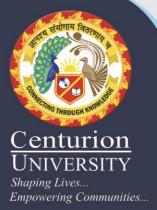
Let us consider a unit cube ABCDEFGH and let forces T_x , T_y and T_z act to the face BEHC and AFGD, EFGH and ABCD, ABEF and CDGH respectively as shown in the figure.

If α corresponds to the increase per unit length per unit tension along the direction of force, then the increase in the edge AB, BE and BC will be $T_x \cdot \alpha$, $T_y \cdot \alpha$ and $T_z \cdot \alpha$ respectively.

If β corresponds to the contraction per unit length per unit tension in a direction \bot to the force, then the contraction produced \bot to the edge AB, BE and BC will be $T_x \cdot \beta$, $T_v \cdot \beta$ and $T_z \cdot \beta$ respectively.







Shaping Lives... So, the length's of the edges will be:

$$AB = 1 + T_{x} \cdot \alpha - T_{y} \cdot \beta - T_{z} \cdot \beta$$

$$BE = 1 + T_{y} \cdot \alpha - T_{x} \cdot \beta - T_{z} \cdot \beta$$

$$BC = 1 + T_{z} \cdot \alpha - T_{x} \cdot \beta - T_{y} \cdot \beta$$

Hence the new volume of the cube= $AB \times BE \times BC$

$$= (1 + T_{x} \cdot \alpha - T_{y} \cdot \beta - T_{z} \cdot \beta)$$

$$\times (1 + T_{y} \cdot \alpha - T_{x} \cdot \beta - T_{z} \cdot \beta)$$

$$\times (1 + T_{z} \cdot \alpha - T_{x} \cdot \beta - T_{y} \cdot \beta)$$

Since α and β are very small, higher powers are neglected.



Volume =
$$1 + \alpha (T_x + T_y + T_z) - 2\beta (T_x + T_y + T_z)$$



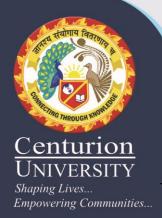
Shaping Lives... Now the bulk modulus,

$$K = \frac{Stress}{Volume\ Strain}$$
$$= \frac{P}{3P(\alpha - 2\beta)} = \frac{1}{3(\alpha - 2\beta)}$$

or,
$$K = \frac{\frac{1}{\alpha}}{3(1-2^{\beta}/\alpha)}$$

$$\therefore K = \frac{Y}{3(1-2\sigma)}$$

$$\therefore K = \frac{Y}{3(1-2\sigma)}$$



Relation between Y, η and K

We have

$$\eta = \frac{Y}{2(1+\sigma)}$$

$$K = \frac{Y}{3(1-2\sigma)}$$
[1]

From eq(1), we have

$$2 + 2\sigma = \frac{Y}{\eta}$$
 [3]

and from eq(2), we have

$$1 - 2\sigma = \frac{Y}{3K} \tag{4}$$



Shaping Lives... Adding eq(3) and (4), we have

$$3 = \frac{Y}{3K} + \frac{Y}{\eta} = Y \left[\frac{1}{3K} + \frac{1}{\eta} \right]$$

or
$$\frac{3}{Y} = \frac{(\eta + 3K)}{3\eta K}$$

$$\therefore Y = \frac{9\eta K}{\eta + 3K}$$
