

Lecture – 13 Qualitative & Quantitative trais and Multiple factor hypothesis

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CALL ATIVE AND QUANTITATIVE CHARACTERS

The phenotype of any individual can be classified into two types:

- 1) Qualitative characters and 2) Quantitative characters
- 1. Qualitative characters: The characters that show discontinuous variation and which cannot be measured easily are known as qualitative characters. These are also known as classical mendelian traits.

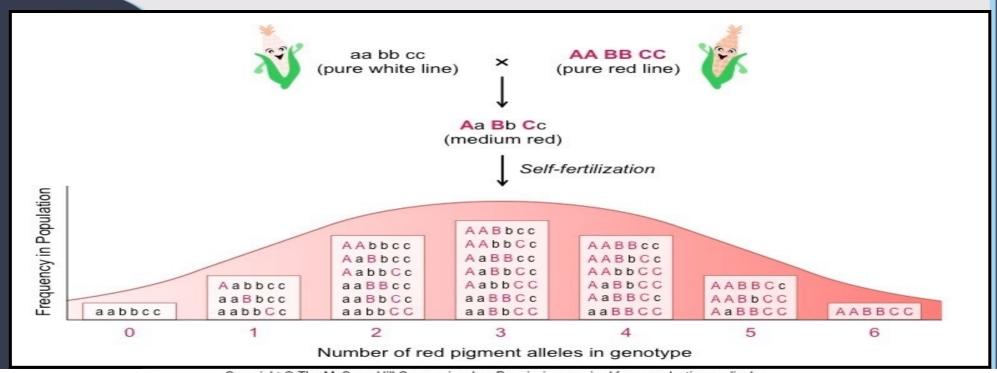
Eg: Corolla colour – Red white or pink → no continuous variation

Seed shape – Round wrinkled → variation is not continuous

2. Quantitative characters: those showing continuous variation and which can be measured easily. These characters are also known as metric traits.

The data obtained from such characters is known as quantitative data. This data can be subjected to statistical analysis and the branch of science which deals with such analysis is known as quantitative genetics or biometrical genetics.

Eg: Yield, Plant height

Historical

Francis Galton- "Law of ancestral inheritance"

- May be due to operation of Mendelian principles in random mating population.
- Pearson (1904) countered that Mendelian principles could not explain "Law of ancestral inheritance"
- de Vris and Bateson, Continuous variation was non heritable rather it produced by environmental factors.
- Johannsen (1903) put the concept of Pureline for seed size in rajma. Result revealed that a part of variation in quantitative trait was heritable, but a substantial portion of it was due to environment and hence not heritable.
- In 1908-09, Nilsson-Ehle presented the multiple factor hypothesis to explain his result on inheritance of seed colour in wheat and oat.

IULTIPLE FACTOR HYPOTHESIS

- Swedish Geneticist H. Nilsson Ehle in 1909 explain inheritance of kernel University wheat and oats.
- and 63:1 ratio between coloured and white seeds from different crosses.
- It is clear from these ratios that the seed colour was governed by one (3:1 ratio in F2), two (15:1 ratio in F2) or three (63:1 ratio in F2) genes.
- When he crossed a dark red strain to a white strain (or variety), he observed that all the F1s were medium red (intermediate between the parental types). But in F2 generation only one out of the sixteen were of parental types.
- However, on a closer examination of the coloured seeds, he found that there was a marked difference in the intensity of their colour.
- Therefore, the red seeds depending on the intensity of red colour could be classified into four distinct classes as dark red, medium red, red and light red in the ratio of 1:4:6:4.
- So finally 15:1 ratio turned into 1:4:6:4:1

Assumptions of Nilsson-Ehle for multiple factor hypothesis

Showing 15:1 in F2, seed colour is governed by two genes university alleles of each colour gene produce seed colour is called Positive allele (denoted by capital letter, R1, R2 etc.) while othe allele does not produce any colour, is known as Negative allele (denoted by small letter, r1, r2 etc.).

- These genes do not show dominance so that heterozygote for colour gene e.g., R1r1 is intermediate in colour between two homozygotes (R1R2 and r1r2)
- Each of the positive alleles has small, almost equal, effect on seed colour.
- The effect of positive alleles are additive. Thus the intensity of seed colour depends on the number of positive allele of all the gene responsible for seed colour.

Thus, a character governed by several genes; the positive alleles of the genes governing the trait are similar to each other in their (effect), and that their effects are additive or cumulative in MULTIPLE FACTOR HYPOTHESIS.

Masic antitative characters

Characters governed by polygenes, but showing discrete spirition. E.g. No. of branches per plant, no. of pods per plant, tiller no per plant, etc.
