# **Unit Hydrograph**

# Unit hydrograph

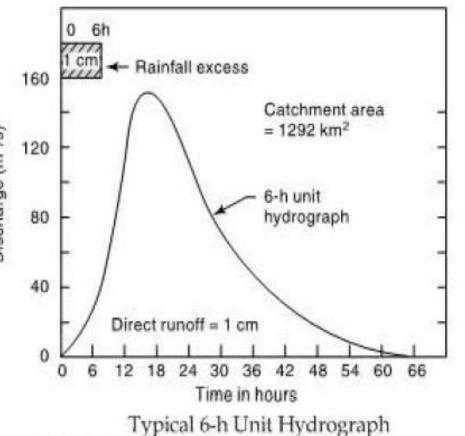
- A unit hydrograph is defined as the hydrograph of direct runoff (DR) resulting from one unit depth (1 cm) of rainfall excess occurring uniformly over the basin and at a uniform rate for a specified duration (D hours).
- This method was first suggested by Sherman in 1932.
- Unit hydrograph relates direct runoff to the rainfall excess

## Application

- Design of hydraulic structures
- Extension of flood-flow records
- Flood forecasting & warning system

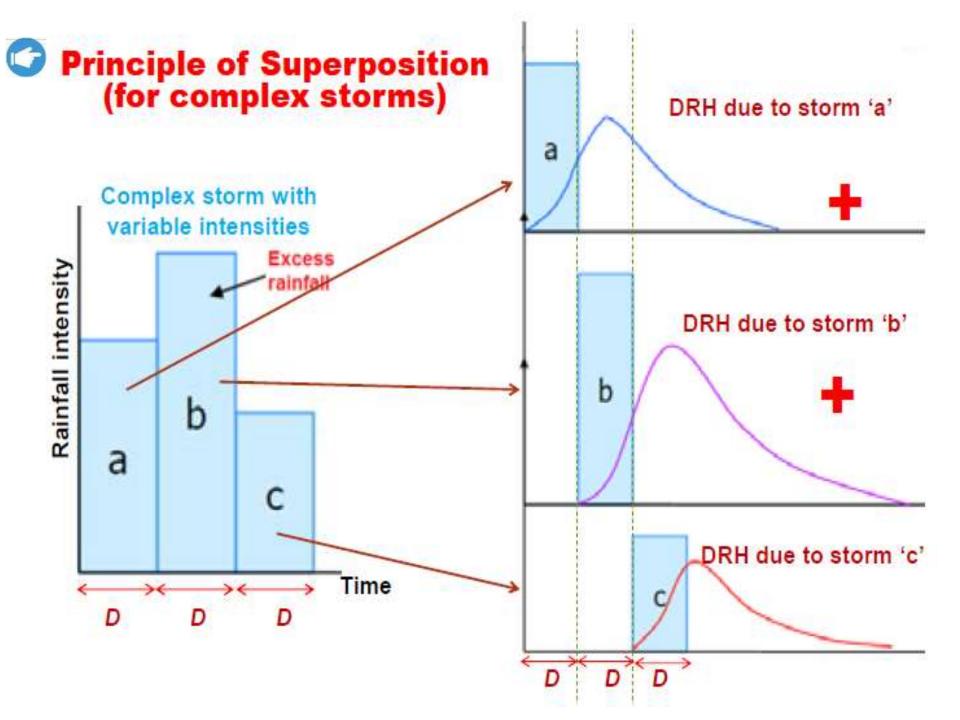
## Assumption of Unit Hydrograph

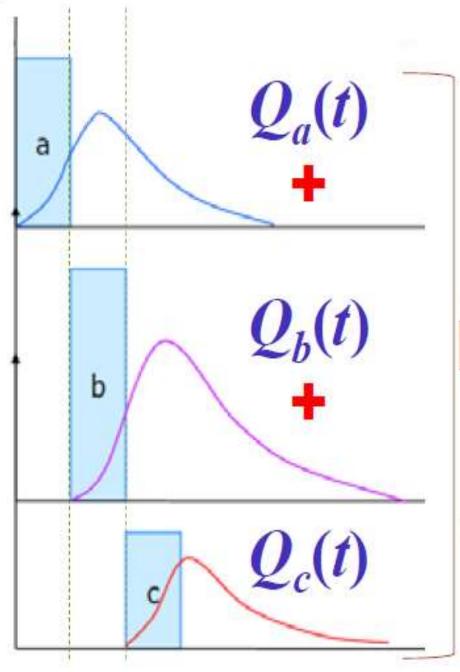
- Time invariability of rainfall: DRH for a given ER in a catchment is always same irrespective of when it occurs
- Spatial invariability of rainfall: Effective rainfall should be uniformly distributed over the whole catchment.

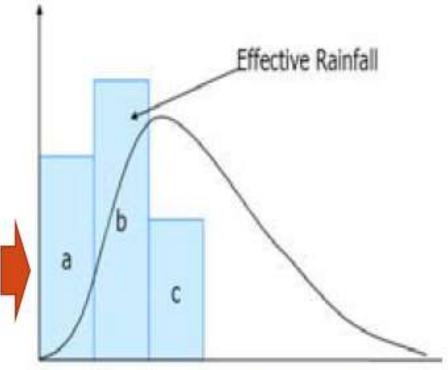


• Time base of the DRH (i.e., the duration of DRH): Depends only on the effective rainfall duration (D), and is independent of the magnitude of the effective rainfall intensity.

- Proportionality Principle: DRH ordinates are proportional to the magnitude of effective rainfall intensity.
- **Time invariance principle:** Unit hydrograph (UH) reflects the basic effects of various physical characteristics of the basin, which do not change in time.
- Linear response: Linear response means if an input  $x_1(t)$  causes an output  $y_1(t)$  and an input  $x_2(t)$  causes an output  $y_2(t)$ , then an input  $x_1(t) + x_2(t)$  causes an output  $y_1(t) + y_2(t)$ .
- Area limitation: The linear UH theory can be applied only for a basin having drainage area between 200 ha -5,00,000 ha(5000 km<sup>2</sup>).







## $Q(t) = Q_a(t) + Q_b(t) + Q_c(t)$

Direct Runoff= DR due to storm 'a' + DR due to storm 'b' + DR due to storm 'c'
