## **Colloidal Systems**

- Colloids some foods contain one or more discontinuous phases in a continuous phase
- Contains substances whose molecular aggregates have a diameter of 1µm and less than 100 µm
- Colloidal dispersions are classified as:
  - Lyophilic colloids
  - Lyophobic colloids

## **Food Dispersions**

Food dispersions classified:

- Solids in liquid (Sol) gelatin in water
- Liquid in insoluble liquid (emulsion) water in oil emulsion
- Gas in liquid (foam)

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- Gas in solid (solid foam) foam candy
- Solid in gas (aerosol) smoking of meat and fish
- Colloidal dispersions of polysaccharides:
  - Sols free flowing liquids at room temperature
  - Gels relatively firm, do not flow
  - Food sols have a diameter of 1μm and less than 100 μm (dilute solution of gelatin in water)





### **Food Dispersions**

Sols possessing continuous aqueous phase have particles that are electrically charged on surface

- Ionized groups are the source of these charges
- Electrical double layer may exist around each particle
- Food gels consist of continuous phase of interconnected macromolecules intermingled with a continuous liquid phase such as water (jelly, gelatin)
  - Varying degree of elasticity and rigidity
  - Sol can be transformed into gel under low temperature, change in pH, alteration of gelling agent



#### **Emulsions**

- Colloidal dispersion of one liquid in another immiscible liquid
- Dispersed droplets in food emulsions have diameters
  between 10 100 microns
- Two types of food emulsions:
  - Oil in water (O/W) lipid droplets dispersed in water (milk, cream, ice cream) – milk, cream
  - Water in oil (W/O) water droplets dispersed in a continuous oil phase butter



### **Emulsifying Agent**

- An emulsifier holds the dispersed phase within the continuous phase
- Consists of two parts:
  - Hydrophillic
  - Hydrophobic
- Function is to stabilize the emulsion



### **Emulsions**

The opacity of an emulsion is determined by droplet size, droplet concentration

- An emulsion is transparent when the droplet diameter is  $\leq 0.05 \ \mu m$
- Droplet size distribution emulsions change their size distribution over time with droplet size shifting to larger values
- Emulsifying agent (emulsifier) holds the disperse phase within the continuous phase
  - Mayonnaise stable emulsion of oil and vinegar has egg yolk (lecithin) as emulsifier
  - Stabilizers are often added to increase viscosity, shelf life



## **Mechanism of action of Emulsifier**

Emulsifiers are grouped into three based on their mechanism of action in forming stable emulsions

- Emulsifier at the oil water interface
- Finely divided particles absorbed at the interface
- Water dispersible hydrocolloids that increase viscosity of the continuous phase
- Stability of emulsion is reduced by the following process:
  - Flocculation –agglomeration of droplets to form loose or irregular clusters (first step)
  - Creaming involves floatation or sedimentation of dispersed emulsified droplets into emulsion layers
  - Coalescence irreversible union of small droplets to form large droplets

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Is a dispersion of gas bubbles in a liquid or semisolid phase

- Bubbles are separated from each other by liquid or semisolid wall (lamellae)
- Based on thickness of bubble size foam can be very dense as continuous liquid phase or light as the dispersed gaseous phase
- Features of foam:

Foam

- Large amount of entrapped gas
- Extensive surface area rigid, elastic walls



### **Foam Formation**

Foam formation depends on the presence of a foaming agent in the continuous phase prior to dispersion of gas Foaming agent is absorbed to reduce surface tension and resist the coalescence of bubbles (ice-cream)

- Foam is formed either by :
  - Condensation gas under pressure is passed into solution
  - Dispersion gas is injected into the solution through orifice
- Foaming agent can be classified as:
  - Surface active lipids (phospho-lipids)
  - saponins
  - albumins

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### **Foam Stability**

Stability is related to the resistance of the foam wall to bursting stresses

- Loss of liquids in wall is caused by gravitational force and deformation forces brought by gas movement
- Stability is increased by increasing the viscosity of the solution and by producing particulate matter



#### **Foam Destruction**

- Excessive foaming may lead to wastage of material coffee extract, fruit juices
- Wastage is prevented by addition of antifoaming agents silicone oils
- Antifoaming agents collapse the foam
