8. **Insulation:** Insulation plays a critical role in preventing short circuits and ensuring electrical safety in the rotor. The rotor bars and end rings are insulated from the core and each other using materials such as mica or fiberglass. This insulation prevents current leakage and ensures that the current flows only through the desired path.
9. **Wedges:** Wedges are often inserted into the rotor slots to secure the rotor bars and prevent their movement under the electromagnetic forces experienced during operation. These wedges are typically made of non-conductive materials and help maintain the integrity of the rotor winding arrangement.

10. External Connections: The rotor is connected to an external circuit through slip rings and brushes. The slip rings are mounted on the rotor shaft and provide electrical contact with the rotor windings. The brushes, in turn, make contact with the slip rings and allow for the transfer of electrical power between the rotor and the external circuit.
