


SOCIAL STRATIFICATION

Social stratification categorises groups of people into a hierarchy on the basis of wealth, status,

or power.

- stratification is the division of population into two or more layers, each of which is relatively homogeneous and between which there are differences in privileges (opportunities), restrictions, rewards and obligations Lundberg 1968.
- A pattern of superimposed categories of differential privilege is termed as social stratification – Cuber 1954.

- A Social class is one or two broad groups of individuals who are ranked by the members of the community in socially superior or inferior positions.-Ogburn and Nimkoff
- Social class is in 3 forms
- Upper class, Lower class and Middle class
- Social stratification comes in four types, Slavery, Caste, Clan, Social Class

The movement of individuals or groups from one stratum of society to another is known as social mobility.

According to MacIver a social class is any portion of a community marked off from the rest of social status.

CenAusocial class has been defined as an abstract category of arranged on levels according to social status they posses. There are no firm lines dividing one category from another - Rogers 1960

Caste: The term 'Caste' was derived from the Portuguese word 'casta' meaning lineage or race.

Characteristics of Caste System in India;

Caste status of an individual is determined strictly by his heredity.

2. Endogamous

It endogamous character strictly prohibits inter-caste marriages.

3. Hierarchical

Caste system has a system of superiority and subordination.


- 4. Fixed Occupations
- Members of any caste are obligated to adopt the professions of their caste.

Untouchability:

In Indian caste system out castes are considered to be untouchables.

Absence of Vertical mobility:

- In a caste system, there is no mobility or movement of its members, up or down, the social status ladder. A person's status at birth is his life time status.
- 8. Reinforcement by religious beliefs:
- Religious beliefs have played a significant role in making caste system unavoidable.
