Types of Normalization

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Type of Normalization or Normal forms

- To overcome these anomalies we need to normalize the data.
- Here are the most commonly used normal forms:
 - 1. First normal form(1NF)
 - 2. Second normal form(2NF)
 - 3. Third normal form(3NF)
 - 4. Boyce-Codd normal form (BCNF)
 - 5. Fourth normal form (4NF)
 - 6. Fifth normal form (5NF)


First normal form (1NF)

- An attribute (column) of a table cannot hold multiple values.
- It should hold only atomic values.
- A table in which the intersection of every column and record contains only one value.

DistributionCenter table is <u>not</u> in 1NF



Converting DistributionCenter table to 1NF




Second normal form (2NF)

- It is based on the concept of full functional dependency.
- A relation schema R is in 2NF if every nonprime attribute A in R is fully functionally dependent on the primary key of R.
- An attribute of relation schema R is called a prime attribute of R if it is a member of some candidate key of R and if it is not a prime attribute then called as nonprime i.e. if it is not a member of any candidate key.

Cont...

 If we follow 2NF, then every non-prime attribute should be fully functionally dependent on prime key attribute. That is, if X → A holds, then there should not be any proper subset Y of X, for which Y → A also holds true.

TempStaffAllocation table is not in 2NF



staffNo	dCenterNo	name	position	hoursP	erWeek
S4555	D002	Ellen Layman	Assistant	16

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Values in name and position columns are only determined by staffNo, so table *not* in 2NF.

This is an example of a partial dependency.
