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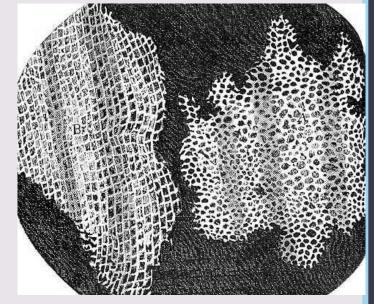


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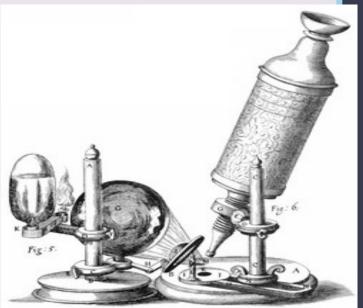

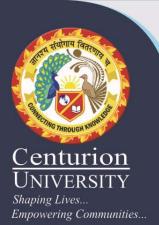
## History of Cells & the Cell Theory

In 1665, Robert Hooke used a microscope to examine a thin slice of cork (dead plant cells)



• What he saw looked like small boxes





#### Hooke is responsible for naming cells

 Hooke called them "CELLS" because they looked like the small rooms that monks lived in called Cells



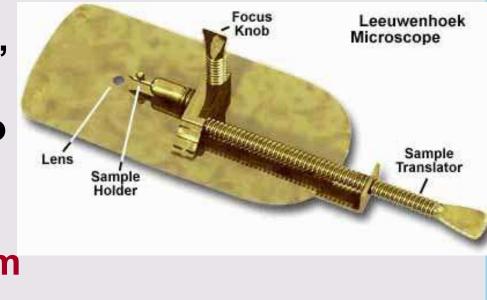

 Schleiden is a cofounder of the cell theory





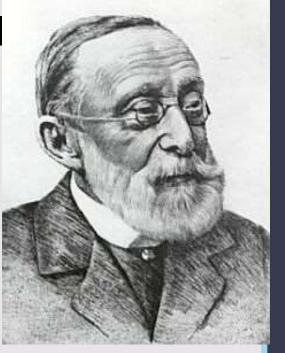


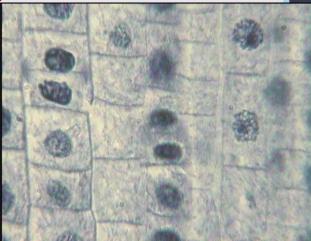
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## Beginning of the Cell Theory

In 1855, a German medical doctor named Rudolph Virchow observed, under the microscope, cells dividing









## **CELL THEORY**

- All living things are made of cells
- Cells are the basic unit of structure and function in an organism (basic unit of life)
- Cells come from the reproduction of existing cells (cell division)

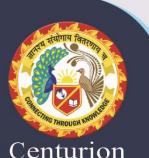

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# Prokaryotes – The first Cells

Cells that lack a nucleus or membrane-bound organelles

Includes bacteria

Simplest type of cell

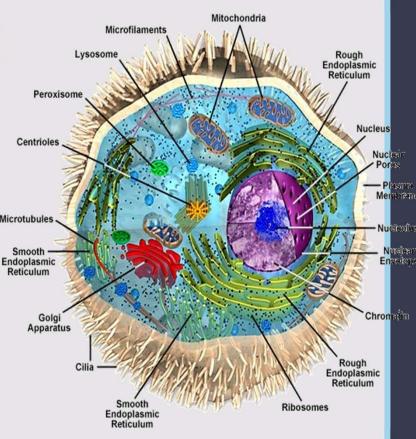
Single, circular chromosome



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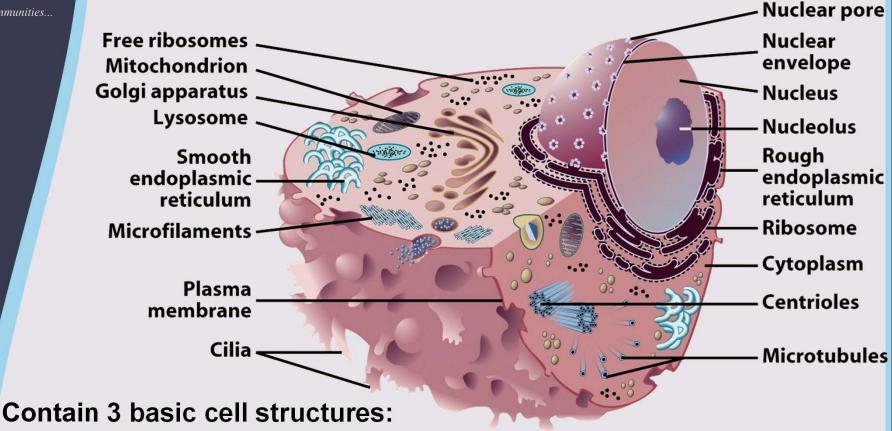
# Eukaryotes

- Cells that HAVE a nucleus and membrane-bound organelles
- Includes protista, *fungi*, plants, and *smooth endoplasmic animals*
- More complex type of cells





# **Eukaryotic Cell**



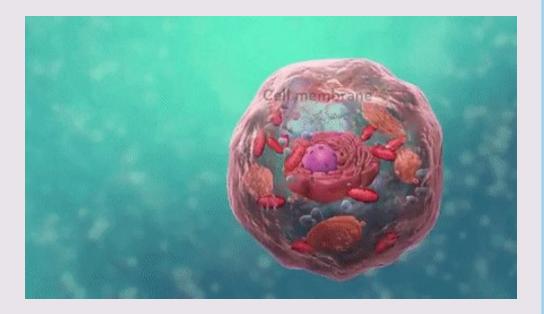
- Nucleus

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## Organelles

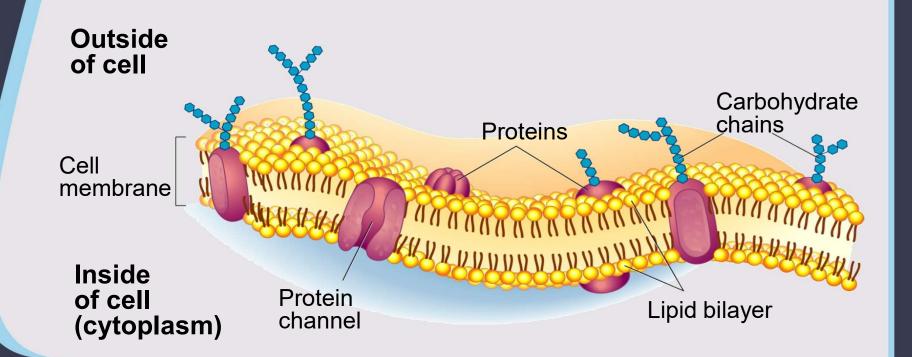
- Very small (Microscopic)
- Perform various functions for a cell
- Found in the cytoplasm
- May or may not be membrane-bound





Cell or Plasma Membrane

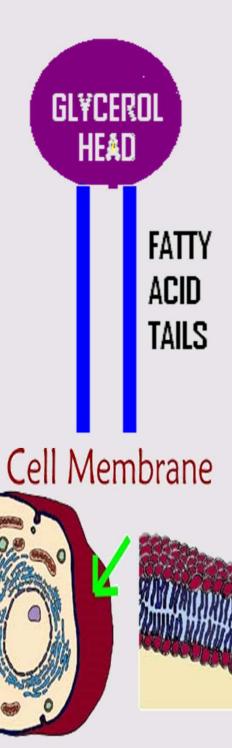
- Composed of double layer of phospholipids and proteins
- Surrounds outside of ALL cells
- Controls what enters or leaves the cell
- Living layer

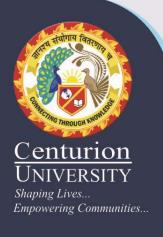




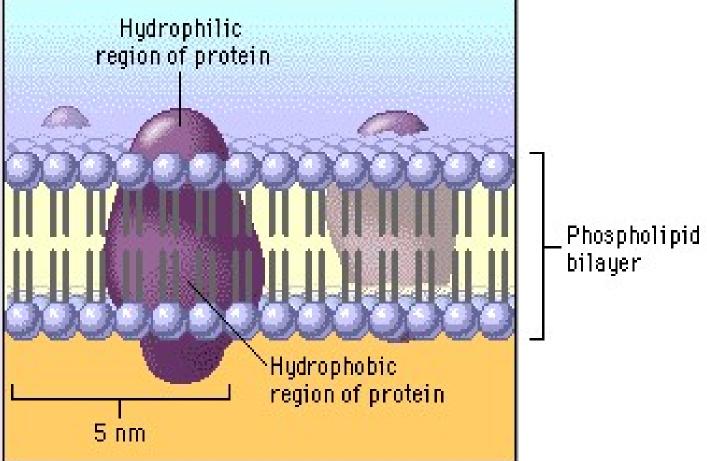
## **Phospholipids**

- Heads contain glycerol & phosphate and are hydrophilic (attract water)
- Tails are made of fatty acids and are hydrophobic (repel water)
- Make up a bilayer where tails point inward toward each other
- Can move laterally to allow small molecules (O<sub>2</sub>, CO<sub>2</sub>, & H<sub>2</sub>O to enter)





## The Cell Membrane is Fluid



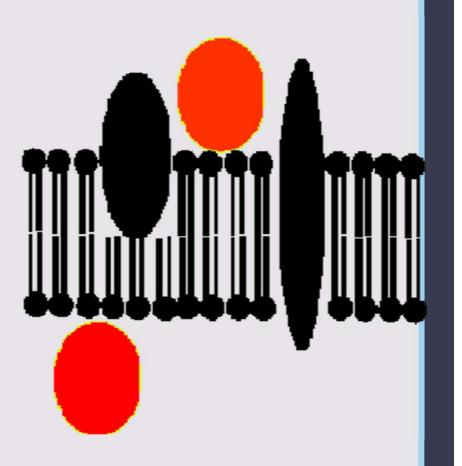
#### Molecules in cell membranes are constantly moving and changing



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## **Cell Membrane Proteins**

- Proteins help move large molecules or aid in cell recognition
- Peripheral proteins are attached on the surface (inner or outer)
- Integral proteins are embedded completely through the membrane



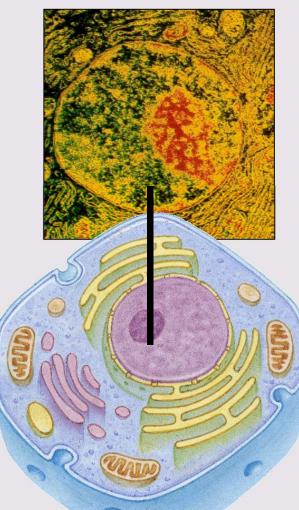


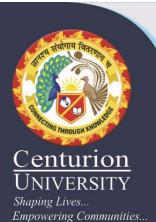
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## The Control Organelle -Nucleus

Controls the normal activities of the cell

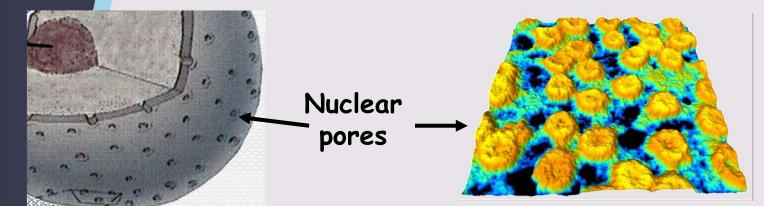
- Contains the DNA in chromosomes
- Bounded by a nuclear envelope (membrane) with pores
- Usually the largest organelle

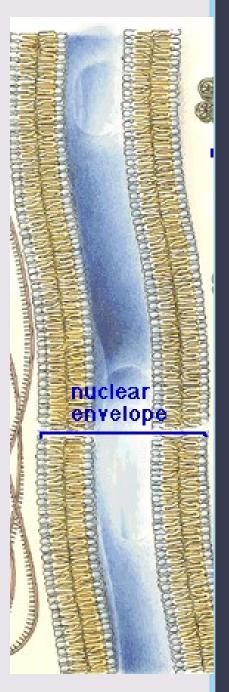


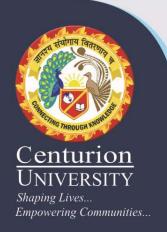


## **Nuclear Envelope**

- Double membrane
   surrounding nucleus
- Also called nuclear membrane
- Contains nuclear pores for materials to enter & leave nucleus

# The genetic material (DNA) is found

CHROMATIN





DNA is spread out And appears as CHROMATIN in non-dividing cells DNA is condensed & wrapped around proteins forming as CHROMOSOMES in dividing cells



## What Does DNA do?

#### DNA is the hereditary material of the cell

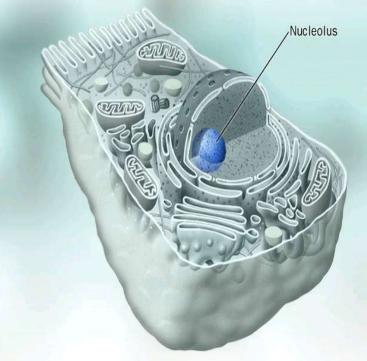


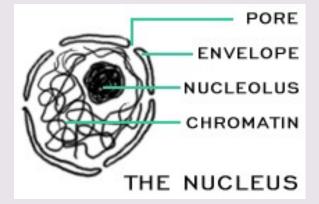
## Nucleolus

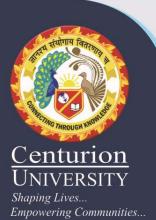
#### Inside nucleus

 Disappears when cell divides

 Makes ribosomes that make proteins

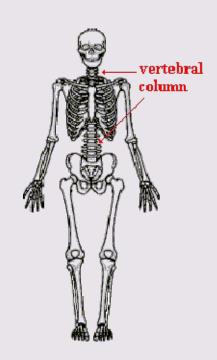


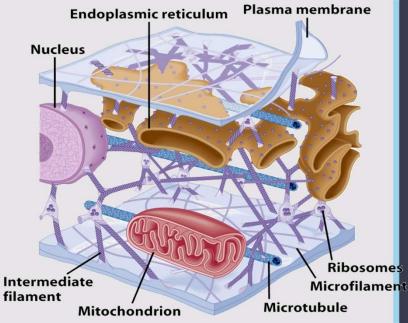


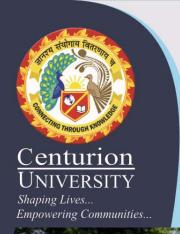


## Cytoskeleton

- Helps cell maintain cell shape
- Also help move organelles around
- Made of proteins
- Microfilaments are threadlike & made of ACTIN
- Microtubules are tubelike & made of TUBULIN







## Centrioles

- Found only in animal cells
- Paired structures near nucleus
- Made of bundle of microtubules
- Appear during cell division forming mitotic spindle
- Help to pull chromosome pairs apart to opposite ends of the cell





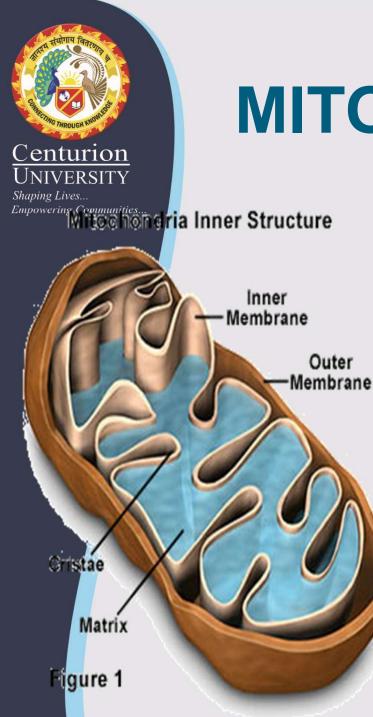


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## Mitochondrion (plural = mitochondria)

- "Powerhouse" of the cell
- Generate cellular energy (ATP)
- More active cells like muscle cells have MORE mitochondria
- Both plants & animal cells have mitochondria
- Site of CELLULAR RESPIRATION (burning glucose)





## MITOCHONDRIA

Surrounded by a DOUBLE membrane

Has its own DNA

Folded inner membrane called CRISTAE (increases surface area for more chemical Reactions)

**Interior called MATRIX** 

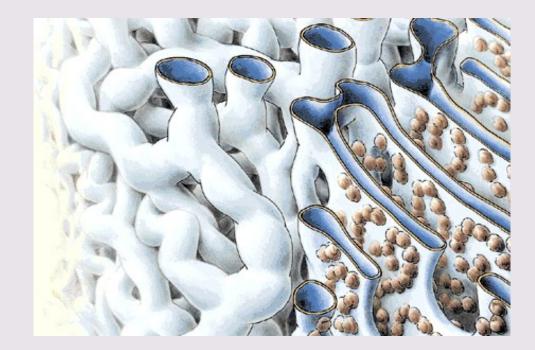


- Mitochondria Come from cytoplasm in the EGG cell during fertilization Therefore ....
- You inherit your mitochondria from your mother!

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## **Endoplasmic Reticulum - ER**

- Network of hollow membrane tubules
- Connects to nuclear envelope & cell
   membrane
- Functions in Synthesis of cell products & Transport

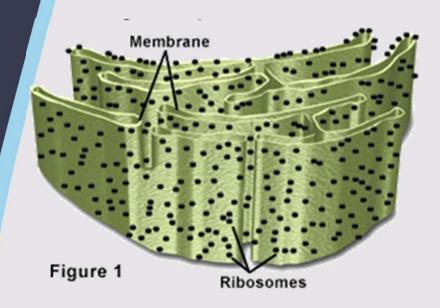


#### Two kinds of ER ---ROUGH & SMOOTH

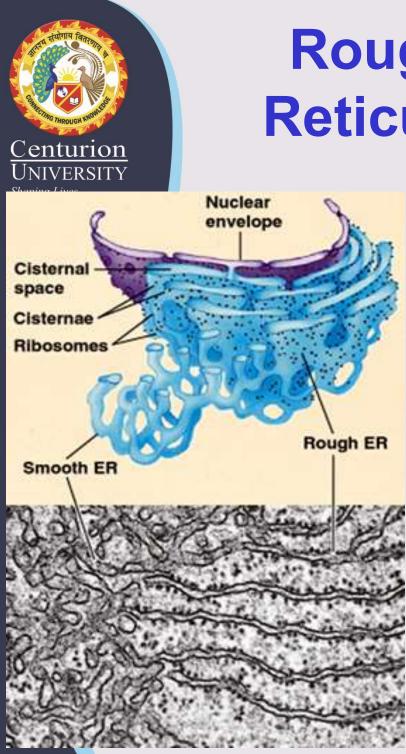


## Rough Endoplasmic Reticulum (Rough ER)

Has ribosomes
 on its surface



 Makes membrane proteins and proteins for export out of cell



## Rough Endoplasmic Reticulum (Rough ER)

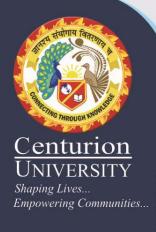
- Proteins are made by ribosomes on ER surface
- They are then threaded into the interior of the Rough ER to be modified and transported

## Functions of the Smooth ER

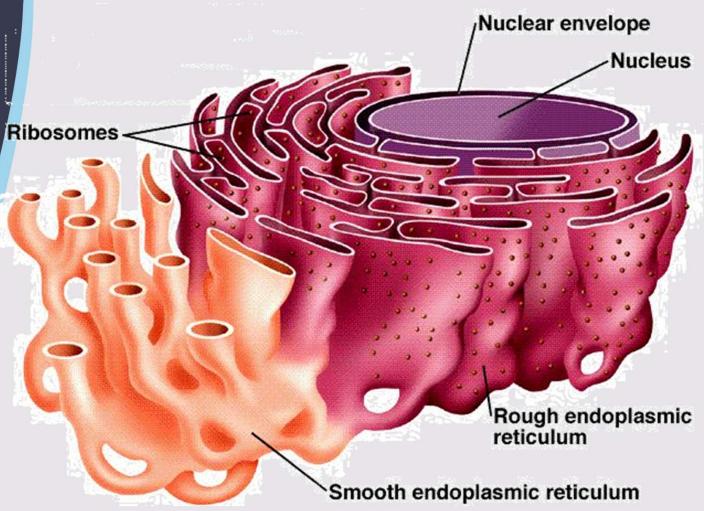
 Makes membrane lipids (steroids)

 Regulates calcium (muscle cells)

Destroys toxic
 substances



## **Endomembrane System**

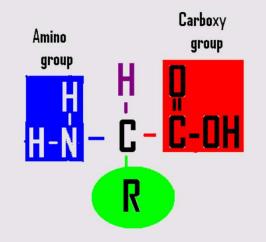


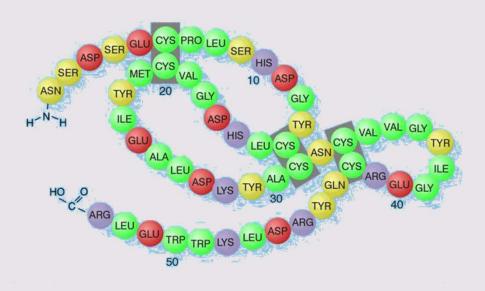
## Includes nuclear membrane connected to ER connected to cell membrane (transport)

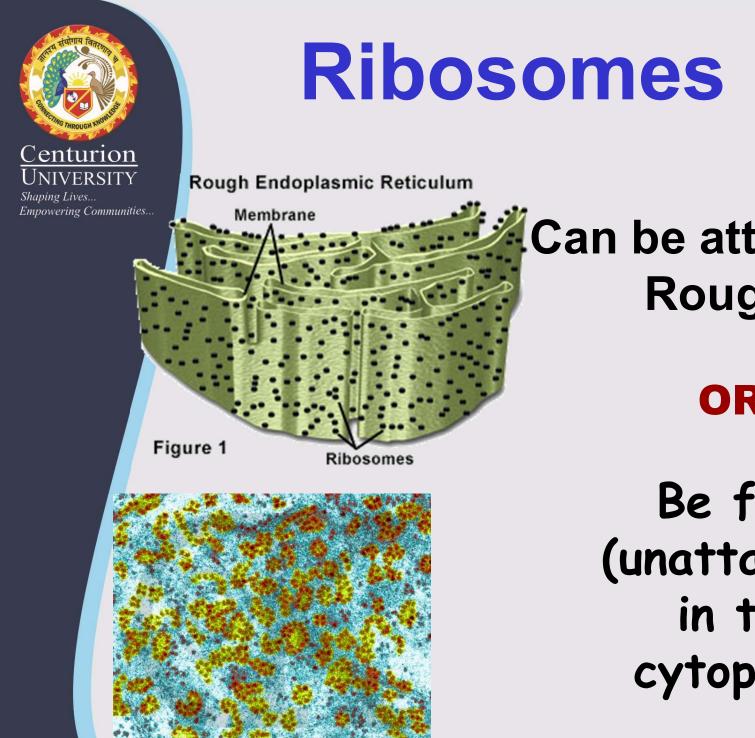


## Ribosomes

- Made of PROTEINS and rRNA
- "Protein factories" for cell
- Join amino acids to make proteins through protein synthesis







#### Can be attached to **Rough ER**

#### OR

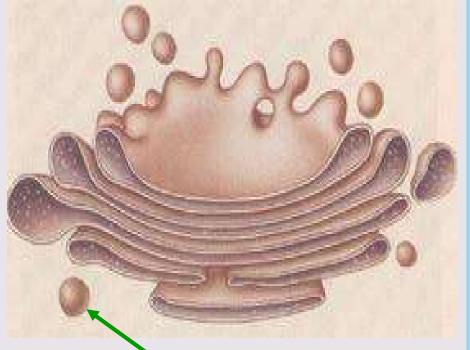
Be free (unattached) in the cytoplasm

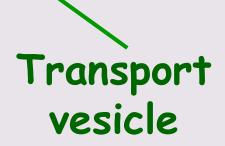




# **Golgi Bodies**

- Stacks of flattened sacs
- Have a shipping side (cis face) & a receiving side (trans face)
- Receive proteins made by ER
- Transport vesicles with modified proteins pinch off the ends







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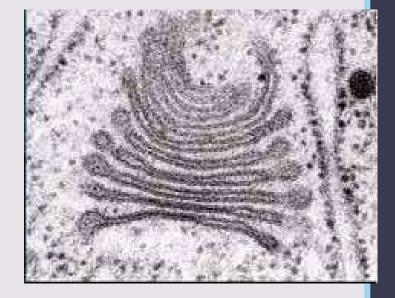
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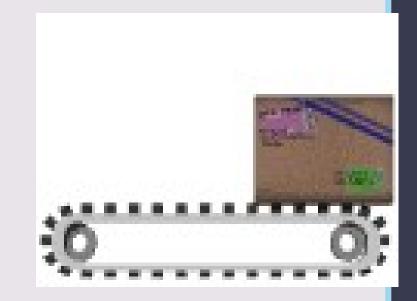
**Golgi Bodies** 

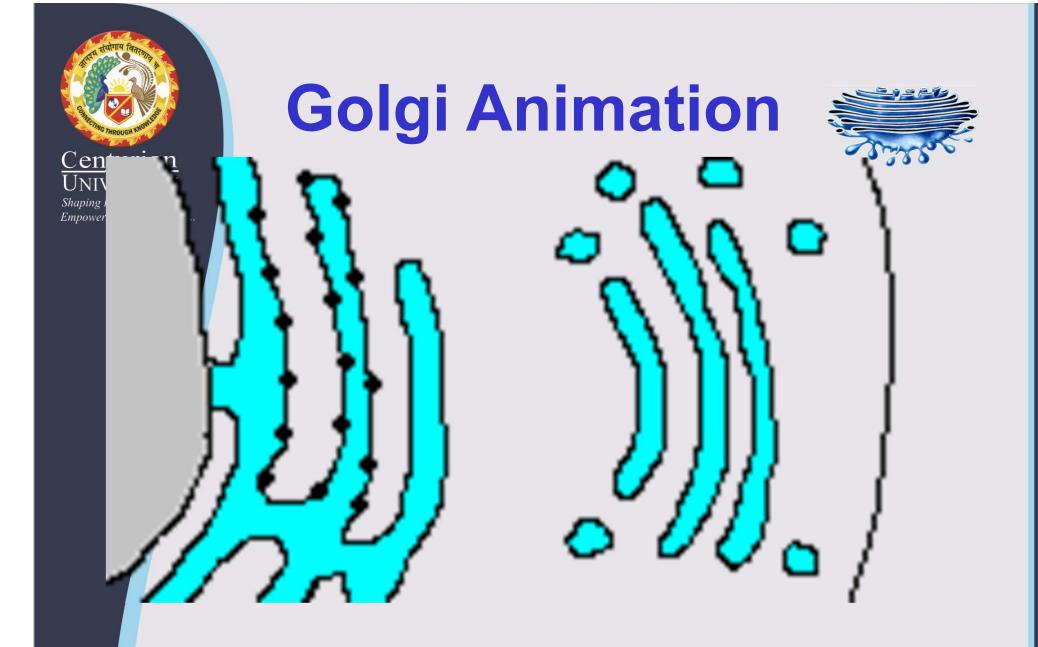
Look like a stack of pancakes



Modify, sort, & package molecules from ER for storage OR transport out of cell







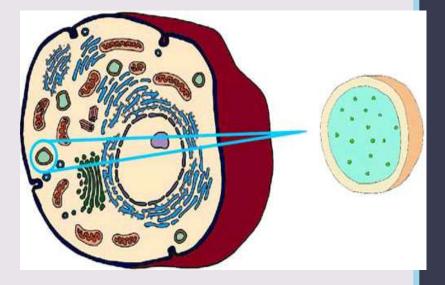
Materials are transported from Rough ER to Golgi to the cell membrane by VESICLES



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## Lysosomes

- Contain digestive enzymes
- Break down food, bacteria, and worn out cell parts for cells
- Programmed for cell death (APOPTOSIS)
- Lyse & release enzymes to break down & recycle cell parts)



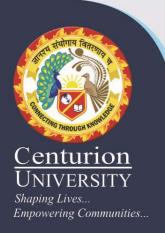




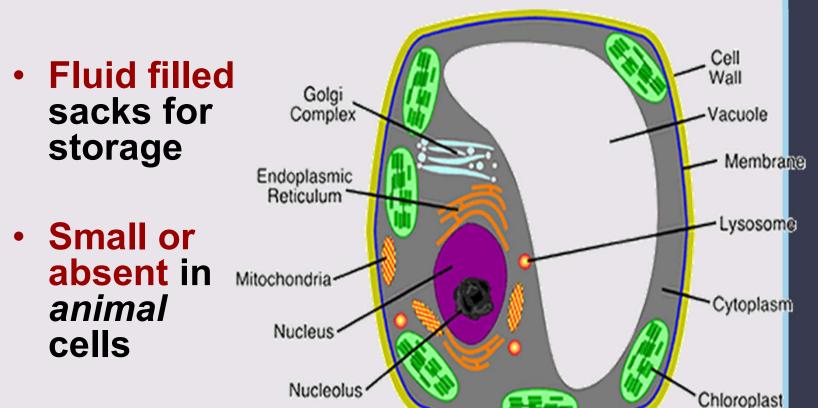
## Lysosome Digestion

## Vacuoles



 Plant cells have a large Central Vacuole



## Vacuoles

In plants, they store Cell Sap

 Includes storage of sugars, proteins, minerals, lipids, wastes, salts, water, and enzymes
