Thyroid and anti-thyroid drugs

Dr. Gopal Krishna Padhy Assoc. Professor Centurion University of Technology and Management Thyroid hormones are iodinated amino acids derived from L-Tyrosine, synthesized in the thyroid gland and stored as amino acid residues of thyroglobulin.

Thyroxine (T4) and Tri-iodothyronine are the principal thyroid hormones. Chemically they are amino acids containing iodinated diphenyl ethers.

Biosynthesis

The thyroid hormones are synthesized and stored in the thyroid folicle as part of thyroglobulin molecule, which is a glycoprotein (m.w. 660 KD)

The formation of thyroid hormones involves the following steps.

O Active uptake of iodide by the folicular cells.

- Oxidation of iodide and formation of iodotyrosine residues of thyroglobulin.
- O Formation of iodothyronines from iodothyrosine
- O Proteolysis of thyroglobulin and release of T_4 and $T_{3.}$
- ${\tt O}$ Conversion of ${\rm T_4}$ to ${\rm T_{3.}}$



L-Thyroxine

o Levothyroxine is a synthetically prepared levo-isomer of the thyroid hormone thyroxine (T_4 , a tetra-iodinated tyrosine derivative) that acts as a replacement in deficiency syndromes such as hypothyroidism.

 OT_4 is the major hormone secreted from the thyroid gland and is chemically identical to the naturally secreted $T_{4.}$

O In the fetus and newborn, it is required for the growth and development of all tissues including bones and the brain. In adults, it helps to maintain brain function, food metabolism, and body temperature. MOA: It is converted to its active metabolite, L-triiodothyronine (T_3). T_4 and T_3 bind to thyroid receptor proteins in the cell nucleus and cause metabolic effects through the control of DNA transcription and protein synthesis.



Uses: Levothyroxine is used to treat hypothyroidism.

L-Thyronine



IUPAC: L-3-[4'-(4''-hydroxy-3''-iodophenoxy)-3',5'-diiodophenyl]alanine

Levothyronine is synthetic triiodothyronine (T3), thyroid hormone. Levothyronine has properties of levothyroxine; however, it acts faster and binds less with blood proteins.

MOA: Similar to L-thyroxine

Uses: Levothyroxine is used to treat hypothyroidism.



MOA IUPAC: 2,3-dihydro-6-propyl-2-thioxo-4(1H)-pyrimidinone OPropylthiouracil binds to thyroid peroxidase and thereby inhibits the conversion of iodide to iodine.

O Thyroid peroxidase normally converts iodide to iodine (via hydrogen peroxide as a cofactor) and also catalyzes the incorporation of the resulting iodide molecule onto both the 3 and/or 5 positions of the phenol rings of tyrosines found in thyroglobulin.

O Thyroglobulin is degraded to produce thyroxine (T4) and triiodothyronine (T3), which are the main hormones produced by the thyroid gland. Therefore propylthiouracil effectively inhibits the production of new thyroid hormones.

Uses: Used to manage hyperthyroidism which is due to an overactive thyroid gland (Grave's disease)

Methimazole



MOA IUPAC: 1-methyl-2,3-dihydro-1H-imidazole-2-thione OPropylthiouracil binds to thyroid peroxidase and thereby inhibits the conversion of iodide to iodine.

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
