

## BINOMIAL DISTRIBUTION

- Binomial distribution- Bernoulli Distribution
- Associated with the name of James Bernoulli
- Binomial distribution- the probability of one set of dichotomous alternatives success or failure
- The type of process which gives rise to this distribution Bernoulli trial/ Bernoulli process
  - Wherein an experiment is performed repeatedly, yielding either a success or a failure in each trial and where there is absolutely no pattern in the occurrence of successes or failures



# ASSUMPTIONS OF BERNOULLI PROCESS

- An experiment is performed under the same conditions for a fixed number of trials, say 'n'
- There are only two possible outcomes of the experiment- success and failure. The sample space of possible outcomes on each experimental trial is
  - S = {success, failure}
- The probability of a success denoted by P remains constant from trial to trial. The probability of a failure denoted by q is equal to (1 – P). If the probability of success is not the same in each trial, that will not be binomial distribution



# ASSUMPTIONS OF BERNOULLI PROCESS

- The trials are statistically independent- the outcomes of any trial or sequence of trials do not affect the outcomes of subsequent trials
  - Example- If an experiment is conducted *n* times under the stated conditions, what is the probability of obtaining exactly *x* successes? Suppose 10 coins are tossed together, what is the probability of obtaining exactly two heads?



### BINOMIAL DISTRIBUTION WITH SOLUTION

- If a coin is tossed once- two outcomes: head or tail
- The probability of obtaining a head or  $p = \frac{1}{2}$
- The probability of obtaining a tail or  $q = \frac{1}{2}$
- Thus (q + p) = 1 and these are terms of the binomial (q + p)



## BINOMIAL DISTRIBUTION WITH SOLUTION

- If two coins are tossed simultaneously- four possible outcomes are there-TT, TH, HT and HH
  - TT- qq (q<sup>2</sup>)
    TH- qp \_\_\_\_\_ 2qp
    HT- pq \_\_\_\_ 2qp
    HH- pp (p<sup>2</sup>)
- These are terms of the binomial  $(q + P)^2$  because
  - $(q+p)^2 = q^2 + 2qp + p^2$



### BINOMIAL DISTRIBUTION WITH SOLUTION

- In a special case where  $p = q = \frac{1}{2}$  , we have
- $\left(\frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{2}\right)^2 = \frac{1}{4} + \frac{1}{4} + \frac{1}{2}$
- If three coins are tossed
  - **TTT-** *q*<sup>3</sup>
  - **TTH-** *q*<sup>2</sup>p
  - **THT-** *q*<sup>2</sup>p
  - **HTT-** *q*<sup>2</sup>p
  - THH- *qp*<sup>2</sup>
  - HTH  $qp^2$
  - HHT  $qp^2$
  - HHH -*p*<sup>3</sup>

•  $(q+p)^3 = q^3 + 3q^2p + 3qp^2 + p^3$ 



## BINOMIAL DISTRIBUTION

- By expanding the binomial  $(q + p)^n$ , we obtain probability of 0, 1, 2....n heads the probability distribution is *Binomial Probability Distribution*/the *Binomial Distribution*
- The Binomial Distribution
  - $P(\mathbf{r}) = {}^{n}\mathbf{C}_{\mathbf{r}} q^{n-r} p^{r}$
- Where p = Probability of success in a single trial
  - q= l-p
  - n = Number of trials
  - r = Number of success in n trials



## **OBTAINING BINOMIAL COEFFICIENTS**

- The first term is  $q^n$
- The second term is  ${}^{n}C_{r} q^{n-1}p$
- In each succeeding term the power of q is reduced by 1 and the power of p is increased by 1
- The coefficient of any term is found by multiplying the coefficient of the preceding term by the power of q in that preceding term, and dividing the products so obtained by one more than the power of p in that preceding term



#### **OBTAINING BINOMIAL COEFFICIENTS**

- In expanding  $(q + p)^n$ , we get
- $(q+p)^n = q^n + {}^{\mathbf{n}}\mathbf{C}_1 q^{n-1}p + {}^{\mathbf{n}}\mathbf{C}_2 q^{n-2}p^2 + \dots + {}^{\mathbf{n}}\mathbf{C}_r q^{n-r}p^r + \dots p^n$



## **GENERAL RELATIONSHIP**

- The number of terms in a binomial expansion is always n+1
- The exponents of p and q for any single term, when added together always sum to n
- The exponents of q are n, (n-1), (n-2)....1, 0, respectively and the exponents of p are 0, 1, 2.....(n-1), n respectively
- The coefficients for the n+1 terms of the distribution are always symmetrical ascending to the middle of the series and then descending, when n is odd number, n+1
