### CRIME SCENE MANAGEMENT

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### CRIMESCENE MANAGEMENT

- Crime scene
- Any inquiry will achieve its optimum value in criminal investigation when the scene of crime is properly processed. It is the meeting place of the criminal and victim where the exchange of physical evidences takes place. Hence;
- > Treasure house of clues.
- Establishes corpus delicti.
- Provides link between criminal, crime & victim.
- > Evaluates the pattern of the events.
- Helps in the elimination of innocents.

### CRIMESCENE MANAGEMENT

The crime scene management should solve the problems like,

- ➤ How did the criminal and victim reach the spot?
- ➤ Routes of the entrance and exit?
- **≻**How many criminals and victims were involved?
- **≻**Modus operandi?
- ➤ What were the evidences exchanged ?
- **▶** Whether the scene of crime is genuine?
- **➤ When the crime committed?**
- **▶**Identification of criminal and victim.

# INFORMATION GATHERED FROM CRIME SCENE

- What type of crime has been committed?
- Where did it happen?
- Who committed the crime?
- When was the crime committed?
- **➤ Why did the crime committed?**
- How was the crime committed?
- Who is the victim?

# CRIME SCENE PROCESSING ORDER

- > The crime scene must be identified
- The scene must be secured
- Access and departure must be logged
- Access must be restricted to authorized personnel
- A chain of custody MUST be established for every piece of evidence from collection to inspection and submission to laboratory.

### CRIME SCENE PROCESSING ORDER

- Photography
- Search and mark evidence
- Collection of evidence
- Alternate light sources
- Chemical processing
- Re-Search
- Post evidence recovery photographs
- Sketching of the crime scene

### **CRIME SCENE NOTES**

- Concise
- Legible
- Accurate
- Objective (contain no theories, opinions, or speculation)
- Are subject to legal discovery
- Are legally required in some jurisdictions and must be maintained and surrendered

Putting relevant evidences in a correct way before court of law, which will prove a criminal activity. It is a logical, an objective and legal enquiry which will answer certain questions as below.

- Is there any violation of statute?
- > When the crime occurred?
- ➤ Who was the person involved in planning, execution and their after effects?
- > Is a witness to the criminal activity present?
- Is there evidence of criminal offense?
- ➤ How it was committed?
- ▶ Is there any indication of guilt or innocence to a law in ending a solution of a case?

Before 1900s criminal investigations were based on over intelligence collection i.e. interaction with individuals. But, today current methods involve to a large extent criminalistics / forensic sciences i.e. application of natural sciences and technologies to the detection of crime and justice administration. Hence have become indispensable.

## FORENSIC SCIENCE

The application of science to those criminal and civil laws that are enforced by police agencies in a criminal justice system.

### **CRIMINALISTICS**

- Means, Services provided by a crime/forensic laboratory. Basic services provided by a full service forensic laboratory are:
- > Physical science unit
- Chemical Science unit
- Biological science unit
- Document Examination unit
- Finger prints unit
- Toxicology unit
- > Forensic Psychology unit
- Computer Forensic unit
- > Evidence collection unit

### **EVIDENCE COLLECTION UNIT**

- ➤ This unit can assist the investigator in solving cases.
- ➤ Basically this unit consist of trained officials who manage the crime scene i.e. preserver the crime scene, collect the physical evidences, reconstruct the crime and gather information from physical evidences, preserve and forward to the respective unit of the laboratory for further scientific evaluation.

Today, systematic investigations based on evidences have started. The evidence in criminal trial is important because it will prove the fact without support. This may be:

(1)Direct evidences (oral & physical)

(2)Indirect evidences (circumstantial)

(3)Documentry evidences

- ➤ Physical evidences are most reliable in criminal investigations and justice administration. This may be any object which will establish the corpus delecti and a link between crime, criminal and victim. These evidences are found on :
- > the crime scene
- Criminal
- > Victim
- ➤ These evidences are available in all criminal cases except in forgery cases where its utilities are limited. Hence, crime scene management is the most important parameter in any criminal investigation.

### PHYSICAL EVIDENCE

- ➤ Means, all objects or any object that can establish through scientific examination that the crime has been committed, when and how it was committed and provide link between crime scene, criminal and victim.
- ➤ The important physical evidences and their importance is given below.

### CHARACTERISTICS OF EVIDENCE


Class characteristics

features that place the item into a specific category


Individual characteristics

features that distinguish one item from another of the same type

- BODY FLUIDS
- Conventional serology:
  - presence of blood in stains
  - Species identification and ABO grouping
  - is not adequately informative to positive identify a person
- DNA analysis can associate victim and/or suspect with each other or with the crime scene
- > BLOODSTAIN PATTERNS
  - > additional information

### > BODY TISSUES


organ samples collected at autopsy, including blood, urine and stomach contents

## > DRUGS & CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES

plant materials, powders, tablets, capsules

### > toxicological analysis

- volatile compounds (ethanol, methanol, isopropanol)
- heavy metals (arsenic)
- nonvolatile organic compounds (drugs of abuse, pharmaceuticals)
- miscellaneous (strychnine, cyanide)
- trace drug presence, identity, and quantity

### DOCUMENTS

- > examination
- typed, handwritten and printed materials for evidence of forgery
- indented writings, obliterated or altered writings, used carbon paper, burned or charred paper
  - paper and ink analysis
  - handwriting comparison to determine authenticity





  - hairs analysis can determine


- > morphological features

Two matching hairs identified with the comparison microscope




Flax fibers viewed with polarized light

the strongest possible evidence of a person's identity




Fingerprint Matching

- FIRE DEBRIS & EXPLOSIVES RESIDUE EXAMINATIONS
- identification of accelerants and explosive residues

- FIREARMS & AMMUNITION
- individual microscopic marks
  - identification, source, operability of firearms.
- detection and characterization of gunpowder residues
- muzzle-to-garments distance estimation
- GLASS FRAGMENTS
  - Cause of breakage
  - Direction of breakage force
  - Physical fitting
  - ➤ Glass fragment comparisons




Photomicrograph: test bullet - questioned bullet



Glass fracture produced 24 by a high-speed projectile


### > PAINT & PAINT PRODUCTS

- analysis and comparison of paint transferred from the surface of an object to another during the commission of a crime:
- Suspect vehicle impacting a victim vehicle; a pedestrian or a stationary object
- Tool impacting stationary object
- Paint databases can help identify the year, make and/or color of a motor vehicle from a chip of paint left at the scene.




Paint Layers on Wood Surface

- > TOOLMARK IDENTIFICATION
- microscopic side-by-side comparison
- attempts to link a particular tool with a particular mark to the exclusion of any other tool



Spacing between teeth in gripping -major role in toolmark examinations

- ROPE & CORDAGE
- composition, construction, color and diameter



### > SOILS & MINERALS


- comparison between two or more soils to determine if they share a common origin
- color, texture, composition comparison



- place the suspect at the crime scene
- side or end matching, fracture matching and species identification.



Layers of soil exposed at a grave site. Each layer must be sampled




Cross-section - Xylem

> OILS/GREASE & COSMETIC PRODUCTS

possess unique composition for comparison

- > SHOEPRINTS & TIRE TREAD IMPRESSIONS
- have value for forensic comparisons.
- can provide positive identification of the suspect's shoes or tires from the suspect's vehicle.

Can provide positive identification if the building is constructed as per specifications of IS code or building construction code or material used is as per requirements or not.
