28.1.3.1. Iopanoic Acid

lopanoic acid is a monocarboxylic acid and an iodine-containing radio-contrast medium used in cholecystography.

Molecular Formula: C₁₁H₁₂I₃NO₂

IUPAC Nomenclature: 2-[(3-amino-2,4,6-triiodophenyl)methyl]butanoic acid

Physical Properties: Iopanoic acid occurs as a white coloured powder with no taste and odour. It is insoluble in water; soluble in ether and chloroform; and soluble in solution of alkali hydroxides and carbonates.

Chemical Properties

- 1) Violet vapours of iodine are produced when iopanoic acid is strongly heated.
- 2) It contains an aromatic primary amino group due to which it forms a deep orange red coloured precipitate by undergoing diazotisation and coupling reaction.

Uses: Iopanoic acid is prescribed in conditions such as cholecystography, vestibular disorders, epilepsy (monotherapy), and radiological contrast agent. It can also be used in adjunctive treatment as a substitute drug of choice in hyperthyroidism.

Stability and Storage Conditions: Iopanoic acid should be stored below 40°C (preferably at 15-30°C). Upon exposure to light, it turns dark, thus should be stored at room temperature away from sunlight in tightly-closed light-resistant containers.

Type of Pharmaceutical Formulation: Tablets.

Brand Name: Telepaque.

28.1.3.2. Propyliodone

Propyliodone is an organic molecule which is used as a radiopaque medium for bronchographic use.

Molecular Formula: C₁₀H₁₁I₂NO₃

IUPAC Nomenclature: propyl 2-(3,5-diiodo-4-oxo-1,4-dihydropyridin-1yl)acetate

Physical Properties: Propyliodone occurs as a white crystalline powder with no taste and odour. It is faintly soluble in water; and soluble in ether and alcohol.

Chemical Property: Violet vapours of iodine are liberated when propyliodone is heated with conc. sulphuric acid.

Uses: Propyliodone is prescribed in Paget's disease of bone, for investigating fistulae and sinuses, and for bronchography.

Stability and Storage Conditions: Propyliodone should be stored in tightlyclosed light-resistant containers away from sunlight.

Type of Pharmaceutical Formulation: Injections.

28.1.3.3. Sulfobromophthalein Sodium

Sulfobromophthalein (BSP) is a dye used for diagnosing hepatic disorders. It is also used for determining proteins quantitatively.

Molecular Formula: C₂₀H₁₀Br₄Na₂O₁₀S₂

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Nomenclature: 2-hydroxy-5-[4,5,6,7-tetrabromo-1-(4-hydroxy-3-gulfophenyl)-3-oxo-2-benzofuran-1-yl]benzenesulfonic acid

properties: Sulfobromophthalein occurs as a white coloured crystalline powder with a bitter taste and no odour. It is water soluble; and insoluble in acetone and alcohol.

Uses: Sulfobromophthalein is used as an aid for diagnosing cirrhosis, acute hepatitis, and liver cell damage without cirrhosis. It is an important agent for testing liver function.

stability and Storage Conditions: Sulfobromophthalein remains stable under normal conditions of temperature and pressure. Sulfobromophthalein solutions should be stored in a warm place for preventing crystallisation. Sulfobromophthalein injections are negatively affected by light, thus should be protected from direct sunlight and stored in moisture-resistant, tightly-closed containers in cool, dry, well-ventilated areas away from incompatible substances.

Types of Pharmaceutical Formulations: Injection and solution.
