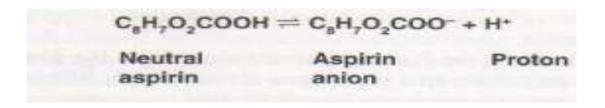
Factores affecting drug absorption

The Effect of pH on drugabsorption

- Most drugs are either weak acids or weak bases.
- Acidic drugs (HA) release a H⁺ causing a charged anion (A⁻) to form in basic media:

$$HA \leftarrow H^+ + A^-$$

A weak acid is defined as a neutral molecule that can reversely dissociate into an anion (a negatively charged molecule) and a proton (a hydrogen ion)



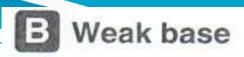
The Effect of pH on drugabsorption...Cont

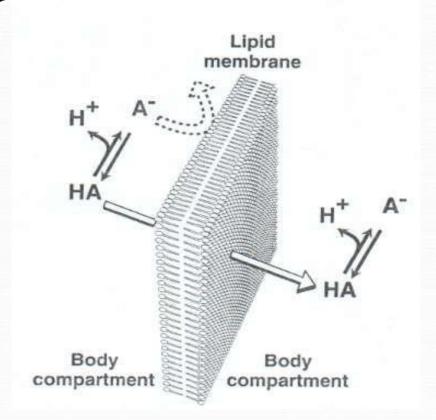
 Weak bases (BH+) can also release a H+; however, the protonated form of basic drugs is usually charged and loss of a proton produces the uncharged base (B).

$$BH^+ \longrightarrow B + H^+$$

A weak base is a is defined as a neutral molecule that can form a cation (a positively charged molecule) by combining with a proton







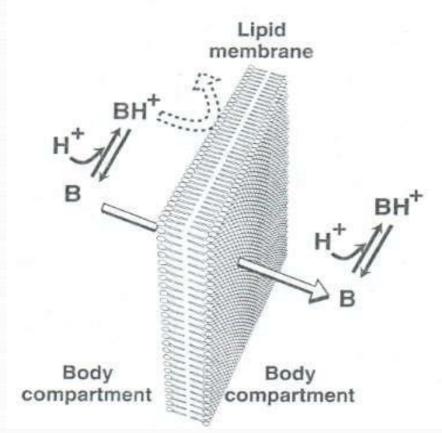

Physical factors influencing drug absorption

Blood flow to the absorption site.

-Blood flow to the intestine is much greater than the flow to the stomach

Total surface area available for absorption.

-Intestine surface is rich in microvilli, it has a surface area about 1000 times that of the stomach.

Contact time at the absorption surface.

-Speed of movement through the GIT (diarrhea).



Other factors affecting absorption

- Dosage forms of the drugs
- Drug solubility
- Stress/pain
- Food
- Routes of administration
- The presence of other drugs
