Glucocorticoids / Corticosteroids

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Introduction

O Glucocorticoids are compounds that act on the metabolism of carbohydrates, proteins, and fats, and to some degree on the electrolytic and water balance in the body.

O They have effects on practically all tissues and organs, and can change the immune response of the body to various types of influences. The end result of using them is induction (anabolism), or suppression (catabolism) of protein synthesis.

O They have an effect on the cardiovascular system, the gastrointestinal tract, the skeletal musculature, skin, connective tissue, blood, and the endocrine system.

• The direct indication for using them is severe and chronic adrenal insufficiency.

O They are used for collagenosis, rheumatoid arthritis, rheumatism, eczema, neurodermatitis, and other skin diseases, allergies, tissue transplants, bronchial asthma, and many other diseases.

Cortisone



IUPAC: 17,21-Dihydroxypregn-4-ene-3,11,20-trione

MOA

O Cortisone binds to the cytosolic glucocorticoid receptor.

O After binding the receptor the newly formed receptor-ligand complex translocates itself into the cell nucleus, where it binds to glucocorticoid response elements (GRE) in the promoter region of the target genes.

oThe DNA bound receptor then, cause the expression of specific proteins.

O It inhibits phospholipase A2, which decreases the formation of arachidonic acid derivatives.

O The anti-inflammatory actions of corticosteroids are thought to involve through inhibition arachidonic acid, which control the biosynthesis of prostaglandins and leukotrienes.

O In other words, the two main products in inflammation; prostaglandins and leukotrienes are inhibited by the action of glucocorticoids.



O Lower doses of corticosteroids provide an anti-inflammatory effect, while higher doses are immunosuppressive. High doses of glucocorticoids for an extended period bind to the mineralocorticoid receptor, raising sodium levels and decreasing potassium levels.

Uses: Allergic disorders, skin conditions, ulcerative, arthritis, colitis, lupus, psoriasis, or breathing disorders.
