# What is Viral Hepatitis?

 Viral hepatitis is a systemic disease with primary inflammation of the liver by any one of a heterogenous group of hepatotropic viruses

# Pathophysiology

>pathophysiologic features are similar regardless of the cause






#### CAUSES

- Autoimmune hepatitis
- Infections from viruses, bacteria, or parasites
- Certain chemicals or poisonous organism
- Liver damage from alcohol, poisonous mushrooms, or other poisons
- Medications: Acetaminophen
- Inherited disorders: cystic fibrosis, hemochromatosis, Wilson's disease







### RISK FACTORS

- Intravenous drug use
- Overdosing on acetaminophen
- Engaging in risky sexual behaviors
- Eating contaminated foods
- Traveling to an area where certain diseases are common
- Living in a nursing home or rehabilitation center
- Having a family member who recently had hepatitis A







#### CONT..

- Using or abusing alcohol
- Being an organ transplant recipient
- Having HIV or AIDS
- Having received a blood transfusion
- Being a newborn of a mother with hepatitis B or C
- Being a health care worker, because of blood contact
- Receiving a tattoo
- Receiving contaminated blood, sweat, tears, saliva, semen, vaginal secretions, menstrual blood and breast milk.











## PREVENTION

- 1. To prevent from Viral Hepatitis
  - Vaccination
  - Immune Globulin for Traveling Abroad
  - Hand Washing
  - Avoid Used Needles
  - Protected Sex
  - Avoid Sharing Certain Personal Items
  - Wear Gloves When Handling Body Fluids
  - Avoid Contaminated Water and Food















- Injected blood sharing of needles unprotected sex ,tatoo.








#### HEPATIIS C:

- Heavy alcohol used.







- Infected needles.



- Difficulty gaining weight.
- Growing normally.
- Mental development.





## PATHOGENESIS - HAV

Cause subacute disease in children & young adults.

HAV invade into human body by fecal-oral route, multiplies in the intestinal epithelium & reaches the liver by hematogenous spread.

After one week, the HAV reach liver cells replicate within. Then enter intestine with bile and appear in feces.

Incubation Period: 2 to 6 weeks.




#### Hepatitis A Vaccination Strategies Epidemiologic Considerations

- Many cases occur in community-wide outbreaks
  - no risk factor identified for most cases
  - highest attack rates in 5-14 year olds
  - children serve as reservoir of infection
- Persons at increased risk of infection
  - travelers
  - homosexual men
  - injecting drug users

A vaccine is whole killed hepatitis a virus. It does not contain live virus so u cant get hepatitis from vaccines.




# VAQTA VACCINES OF HEPATITIS A

Vaqta is inactivated whole virus vaccine Derived from hepatitis A.







# HOW TO USE HEVRIX AND VAQTA VACCINES OF (HEPATITIS A)

The vaccine is usually given by injections intra muscular
By a health care professional, a series of 2 injections is usually given 6 to 8 month period.









# DOSAGE OF HAVRIX AND VAQTA (HEPATITIS A VACCINE)

#### CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS.

Primary immunization for children (12 months to 18 years age)

Consist of a single 0.5ml and 0.5 ml booster dose administered between 6 to 12 months ...

#### ADULT DOSE.

Primary immunization for adults Consist of a single 1ml dose And 1ml booster dose administered Between 6 to 12 months

## **HBV: Modes of Transmission**

 Parenteral - IV drug abusers, health workers are at increased risk.

 Sexual - sex workers and homosexuals are particular at risk.

Perinatal (Vertical) — mother (HBeAg+) →infant.

# Clinical Features

Incubation period: Average 60-90 days

Range 45-180 days

Insidious onset of symptoms.

Tends to cause a more severe disease than Hepatitis A.

Clinical illness (jaundice): <5 yrs, <10%

 $\geq$  5 yrs, 30%-50%

1/3 adults-no symptoms

10 - 15% Clinical Illness at presentation

Acute case-fatality rate: 0.5%-1%

< 5 yrs, 30%-90% ≥ 5 yrs, 2%-10% Chronic infection:



# Current Treatment Options

- Interferon alfa (Intron A)
- Response rate is 30 to 40%.
- Lamivudine (Epivir HBV)
   (relapse ,drug resistance)
- Adefovir dipivoxil (Hepsera)

## **Treatment**

- Interferon for HBeAg +ve carriers with chronic active hepatitis.
   Response rate is 30 to 40%.
  - alpha-interferon 2b (original) (INTL units)
  - alpha-interferon 2a (newer, claims to be more efficacious and efficient)
- Lamivudine a nucleoside analogue reverse transcriptase inhibitor. Well tolerated, most patients will respond favorably. However, tendency to relapse on cessation of treatment. Another problem is the rapid emergence of drug resistance.
- Adefovir (10mg po) less likely to develop resistance than Lamivudine and may be used to treat Lamivudine resistance HBV. However more expensive and toxic (less than 12 yrs)
- Entecavir most powerful antiviral known, similar to Adefovir
- Successful response to treatment will result in the disappearance of HBsAg, HBV-DNA, and seroconversion to HBeAg.

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- Alpha interferons, cause or aggravate fatal or life-threatening neuropsychiatric, autoimmune, ischemic, and infectious disorders
- Depression and suicidal behavior including suicidal ideation, suicide attempts was reported in patients receiving interferon alfa-2a.
- Interferon alfa-2a used with extreme caution in patients who reported a history of depression.
- Interferon alfa-2a should be used with caution in patients with preexisting cardiac disease
- Severe or fatal gastrointestinal hemorrhage has been reported in association with alpha interferon therapy.
- Ulcerative and hemorrhagic/ischemic colitis, sometimes resulting in death,
   have been observed within 12 weeks of starting alpha interferon therapy.
- Alpha interferons suppress bone marrow function and may result in severe cytopenias and anemias including rarely aplastic anemia. Cytopenias can lead to an increased risk of infections or hemorrhage.

#### **Entecavir side effects**

- Allergic reaction: hives; difficulty breathing; swelling of your face, lips, tongue, or throat.
- lactic acidosis (a build-up of lactic acid in the body, which can be fatal). Lactic acidosis can start slowly and get worse over time. Mild symptoms of lactic acidosis, such as:
- muscle pain or weakness;
- numb or cold feeling in your arms and legs;
- trouble breathing;
- •feeling dizzy, light-headed, tired, or very weak;
- stomach pain, nausea with vomiting; or
- •slow or uneven heart rate.

Entecavir may also cause severe liver symptoms. low fever; nausea, stomach pain, loss of appetite; dark urine, clay-colored stools; or jaundice (yellowing of the skin or eyes). Less serious side effects may include: mild nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, upset stomach; temporary hair loss; headache; skin rash; or sleep problems (insomnia).

## Prevention

- Vaccination highly effective recombinant vaccines are now available. Vaccine can be given to those who are at increased risk of HBV infection such as health care workers. It is also given routinely to neonates as universal vaccination in many countries.
- Hepatitis B Immunoglobulin HBIG may be used to protect persons who are exposed to hepatitis B. It is particular efficacious within 48 hours of the incident. It may also be given to neonates who are at increased risk of contracting hepatitis B i.e. whose mothers are HBsAg and HBeAg positive.
- Other measures screening of blood donors, blood and body fluid precautions.

### V&CCINATION:


The first vaccine became available in 1981.

The vaccine contains:

**HBsAg** 

It is produced by yeast cells, into which the genetic code for HBsAg has been inserted.

A course of three (3) vaccine injections is given. Afterward an immune system antibody to HBsAg is established in the bloodstream. The antibody is known as *anti-HBsAg*. This antibody and immune system memory then provide immunity to hepatitis B infection.









### MEDICATIONS:

Acute hepatitis B does not require medication.

<u>Chronic hepatitis B</u> requires proper medication, currently, there are at least six drugs available:

#### 1. Interferon:

- Usually a good choice for young people without serious liver disease.
- Treatment duration is relatively short (24 to 48 weeks) compared to other hepatitis B therapies.

- Not available for people with failing livers.
- Most expensive compared to the other drugs.
- Pegylated interferon not approved for children.



#### 2. Lamivudine:

- Least expensive.
- One of the older hepatitis B drugs, so a lot is known about its safety.
- Might be helpful in treating HIV co-infection in combination with tenofovir.
- Approved for both children and adults.




- Often loses its effectiveness against the hepatitis B virus.
- Requires long-term treatment.

#### 3. Adefovir dipivoxil

• Can be used in patients with lamivudine-resistant hepatitis B virus.





- •Can be toxic to your kidneys at high doses.
- •Requires long-term treatment.

#### 4. Entecavir:

- Has an extremely low rate of resistance.
- Might be helpful in patients with failing livers.



- A newer drug.
- •Requires long-term treatment.



#### 5. Telbivudine:

· More powerful antiviral drug than lamivudine and adefovir.





- As likely as lamivudine to become resistant to hepatitis B virus.
- Requires long-term treatment.
- · Not approved for children.

#### 6. Tenofovir:

- Excellent at treating regular and drug-resistant types of hepatitis B virus.
- •Treats both HIV and the hepatitis B virus.





- It's a relatively new drug for treating hepatitis B.
- Not approved for children.
- Requires long-term treatment.
- Regular monitoring of kidney function is necessary.

## Hepatitis B Vaccine

- Infants: several options that depend on status of the mother
  - If mother HBsAg negative: birth, 1-2m,6-18m
  - If mother HBsAg positive: vaccine and Hep B immune globulin within 12 hours of birth, 1-2m, <6m</li>
- Adults
  - \* 0,1, 6 months
- Vaccine recommended in
  - All those aged 0-18
  - Those at high risk

# HEPATIS C

# **Hepatitis C Virus**

HCV is found in the blood and body fluids (e.g., semen, vaginal fluids) of an infected person

Average incubation period: is 7 to 9 weeks



# **Symptoms**

#### You might have:

- Tiredness
- Loss of appetite
- Fever
- Stomach-ache
- Diarrhea
- Dark urine
- Jaundice (yellow skin and eyes)



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## **PREVENTION**

- No vaccine for the prevention of HCV transmission
- Best means of preventing transmission of HCV is to prevent contact with infected blood and organs and to avoid high-risk sexual behavior such as multiple partners and anal contact.
- Avoiding alcohol and drugs that can damage the liver may help slow the rate of progression of the disease.

## MEDICAL TREATMENT

 pegylated interferon alpha (Pegasys, PEG-Intron) - often combined with an antiviral drug called ribavirin (Virazole)

- PegIntron (peginterferon alfa-2b) is made from human proteins that help the body fight viral infections.
- PegIntron is used to treat chronic hepatitis C in adults.
   Peginterferon alfa-2b is often used in combination with another medication called ribavirin (Rebetol, Ribasphere) to treat hepatitis C in adults and children who are at least 3 years old.
- PegIntron may be used in combination with boceprevir (Victrelis) or telaprevir (Incivek) to treat hepatitis C in adults.
- PegIntron may also be used for purposes not listed in this medication guide

#### Serious Side Effects

- vision problems;
- •fast heart rate, feeling like you might pass out;
- •fever, chills, body aches, flu symptoms, pale skin, easy bruising or bleeding, unusual weakness;
- high fever with severe stomach pain and bloody diarrhea;
- pain or burning when you urinate;
- severe pain in your upper stomach spreading to your back, nausea and vomiting, fast heart rate;
- cough with mucus, feeling short of breath, chest pain, uneven heartbeats;
- sudden numbness or weakness, problems with vision, speech, or balance; or
- •new or worsening liver symptoms (upper stomach pain, dark urine, jaundice).

#### **LESS SERIOUS:**

PegIntron side effects may include:

- dizziness, tired feeling;
- headache, joint or muscle pain;
- nausea, dry mouth, loss of appetite, weight loss;
- •sleep problems (insomnia), feeling mildly anxious, depressed, or irritable; or
- pain, redness, swelling, or irritation where the medicine was injected

# Certain medical conditions preclude the use of interferon

- <u>Depression</u> and certain other mental and neurologic disorders
- Active alcohol or drug abuse
- <u>Autoimmune</u> diseases such as <u>rheumatoid arthritis</u>, <u>systemic lupus erythematosus</u>, or <u>psoriasis</u>
- Low blood <u>hemoglobin</u> level (<u>anemia</u>) or blood cell counts
- Cirrhosis that is severe enough to cause symptoms such as jaundice, wasting, fluid retention that causes swelling, or mental disturbances

## Medication

- Interferon alpha (Intron A) pegylated type (Pegasys, PEG-Intron)
  - Interferon is a protein that the body makes naturally in response to viral infections in order to fight the infection. Pegylation describes a chemical process that makes the interferon last longer in the body.
- Ribavirin (Virazole)
  - has little effect on HCV, but interferon increases its potency

# Surgery and Other Therapy

- For end-stage liver disease, the only treatment is liver transplantation
- Alternative therapies has not been proven to work in any scientific study
  - most promising complementary therapy is milk thistle
  - licorice and ginseng
  - ginger (to reduce nausea) and St. John's wort (to relieve depression) may be taken as complementary therapy to help relieve the side effects of interferon

# Patient Counseling

- Eat a varied, healthy diet, take part in some physical activity daily, and get plenty of rest.
- Drink plenty of water and other noncaffeinated fluids to stay well hydrated.
- Avoid alcoholic beverages and medicines such as nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (like Brufen, Aleve, Advil) that can be harmful in people with liver disease.
- If you have symptoms, avoid prolonged or vigorous physical exercise until your symptoms improve.
- If symptoms worsen at any time, contact your doctor.
