Classification of Foods

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- Determine extent of heat processing and time-temperature combination
- Classified based on acidity pH influences microbial spoilage
- High acid pH < 4.5
 e.g. Fish marinades, pickles, citrus juices
- Acetic, citric, lactic acids destroy food spoilage bacteria
- Heat processed at 100°C or below destroy vegetative cells
- Acid tolerant bacteria Lactobacillus –survive acid pH heated at 100°C for longer than usual

- 2. Medium acid pH 4.5-5.3e.g. Canned fish in tomato sauce, soups
- Heat processed at 100 °C

- 3. Low acid pH >5.3e.g. Canned fish in oil, brine, curry
- Complete heat sterilization

- Acidity of food
- 1. High acid
- 2. Medium acid
- 3. Low acid

- Heat treatment
- 5 min at 80 °C (pasteurization)
- 15 min at 100 °C
- 60 min at 121.1 °C

 Clostridium botulinum – most heat resistant of food poisoning organisms –spore forming, anaerobic pathogen - growth inhibited at pH 4.5

 Canned fish – neutral pH – heat processed, assuming *C.botulinum* to be present – eliminated Bacillus stearothermophilus – heat resistant spore former – survives thermal process designed for C.botulinum

 Complete destruction – overcook fish and affect quality

Avoid contamination with B. stearothermophilus –
 hygienic handling, processing and storage
