Session-5:

Determinants

The determinant of a 2×2 matrix $A = \begin{bmatrix} a & b \\ c & d \end{bmatrix}$ is defined by

$$\begin{vmatrix} a & b \\ c & d \end{vmatrix} = ad - bc.$$



The area of the parallelogram is the absolute value of the determinant of the matrix formed by the vectors representing the parallelogram's sides.

The determinant of a 3×3 matrix $\mathbf{A} = \begin{bmatrix} a & b & c \\ d & e & f \\ g & h & i \end{bmatrix}$ is defined by

$$\begin{vmatrix} a & b & c \\ d & e & f \\ g & h & i \end{vmatrix} = a \begin{vmatrix} e & f \\ h & i \end{vmatrix} - b \begin{vmatrix} d & f \\ g & i \end{vmatrix} + c \begin{vmatrix} d & e \\ g & h \end{vmatrix}$$
$$= aei + bfg + cdh - ceg - bdi - afh.$$

Determinant of a 3 \times 3 Matrix by Diagonals Method:

This one is a little crazier. First you have to duplicate the first two columns and then write them after the last column.

$$det \begin{bmatrix} a & b & c \\ d & e & f \\ g & h & i \end{bmatrix} = \begin{vmatrix} a & b & c & a & b \\ d & e & f & d & e \\ g & h & i & g & h \end{vmatrix} = \begin{vmatrix} a & b & c & a & b \\ d & e & f & d & e \\ g & h & i & g & h \end{vmatrix} - (gec + hfa + idb)$$

Area of a Triangle:

The area of a triangle with vertices at (x_1, y_1) , (x_2, y_2) , and (x_3, y_3) is given by:

Area =
$$\pm \frac{1}{2} \begin{vmatrix} x_1 & y_1 & 1 \\ x_2 & y_2 & 1 \\ x_3 & y_3 & 1 \end{vmatrix}$$





Properties of the Determinant:

The determinant has many properties. Some basic properties of determinants are:

- \triangleright det(I_n)=1,whereI_n is an n×n unity matrix.
- $\blacktriangleright \det(A^{T}) = \det(A^{T}).$
- → $\det(A^{-1}) = \overline{\det(A)}$.
- \blacktriangleright det(AB)=det(A)det(B).
- $\blacktriangleright \quad \det(cA) = c^n \det(A) \text{ for an } n \times n \text{ matrix } A \text{ and } c \text{ is a constant.}$
