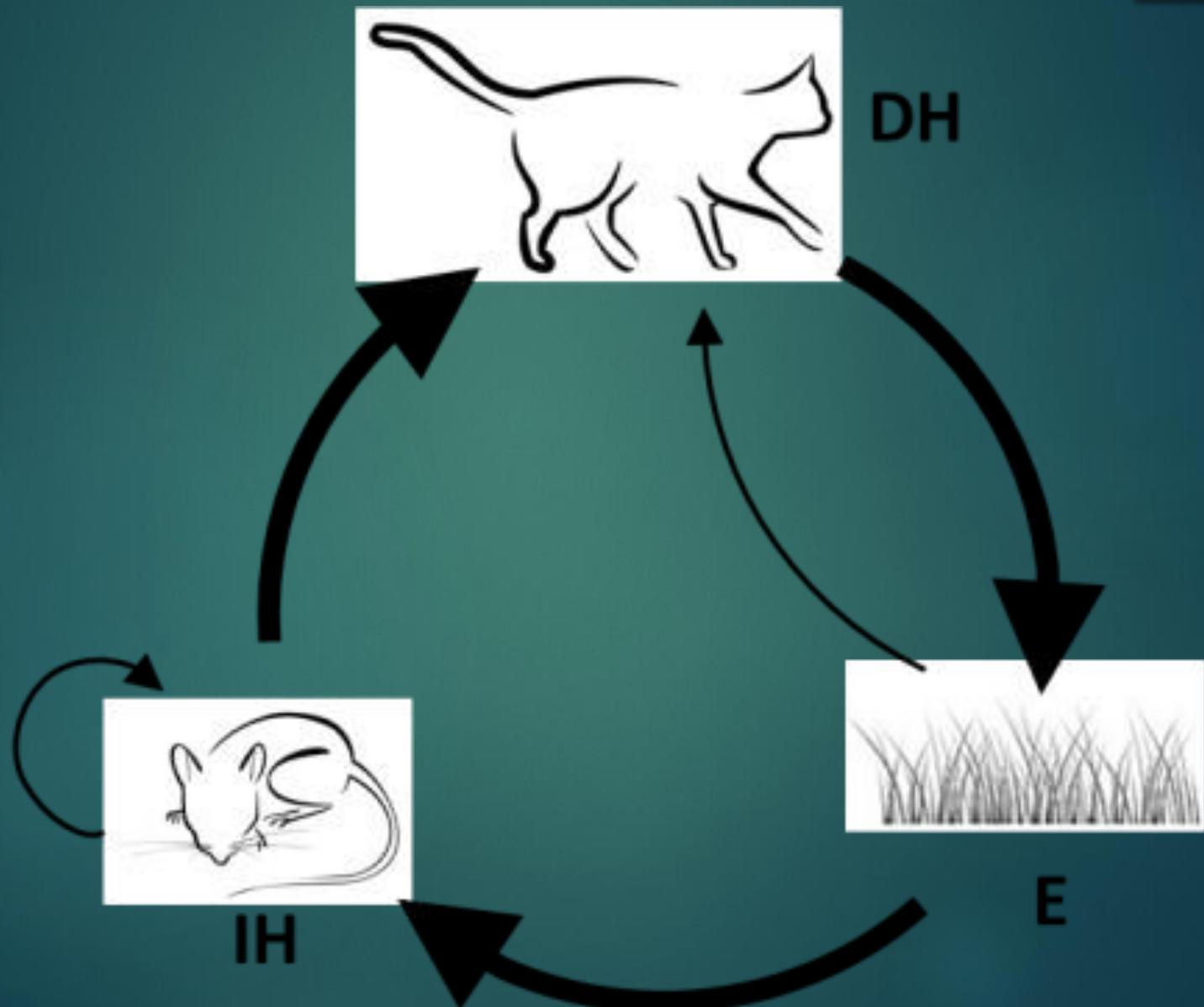


Parasites

- ▶ **Organisms which are dependent on other organisms for survival**
- ▶ **Eukaryotes**
- ▶ **Unicellular – Protozoa**
- ▶ **Multicellular - Helminths**

- ▶ **Host – organism that provides nutrition to parasite**
- ▶ **Definitive host – adult stage of parasite is lodged – undergoes sexual reproduction – both males and females are present**
- ▶ **Intermediate host – harbours larval stage of helminths, asexual reproduction of protozoa**

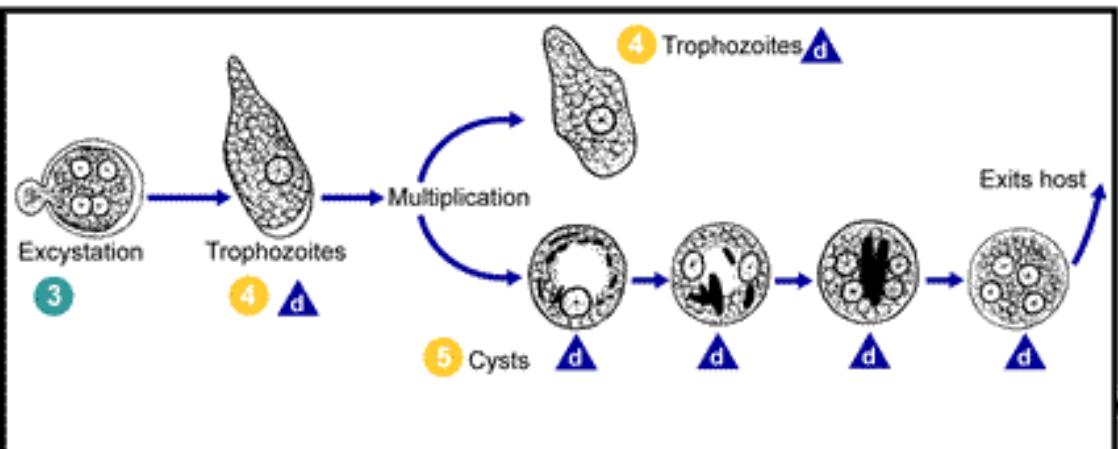
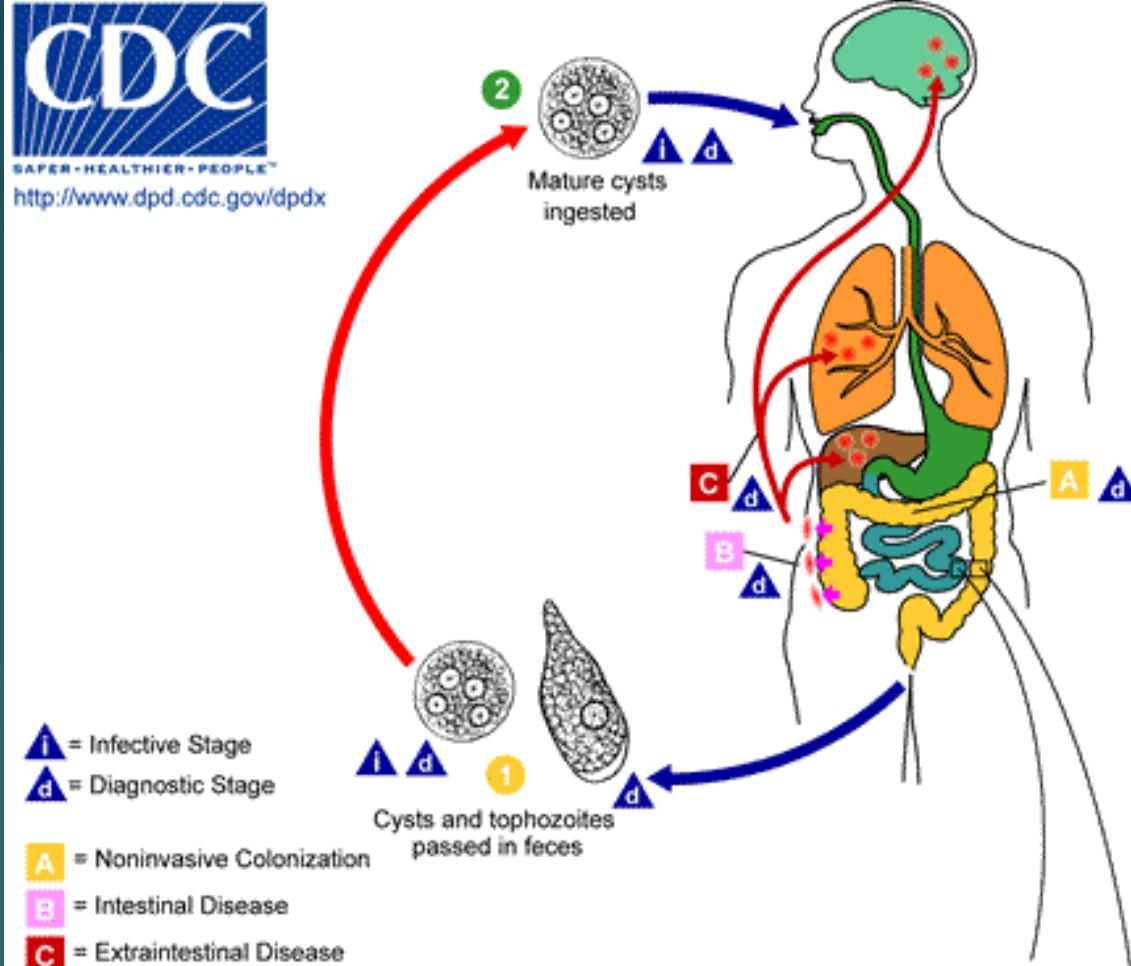
- ❑ **Round, 10-15 microns**
- ❑ **4-6 microns nucleus**
- ❑ **Highly refractile cyst wall**
- ❑ **Four or more nuclei**



Trophozoites

- ▶ **18-40 microns**
- ▶ **Cytoplasm – outer ectoplasm, inner endoplasm**
- ▶ **Nucleus – 4-6 microns**
- ▶ **Ingested red blood cells**

Diseases caused

- ▶ **Dysentry - Trophozoites burrow into intestinal wall and cause dysentry with ulcers**

- ❑ Amebic hepatitis

- ❑ **Iodine mount for cysts**

► **Amoebic hepatitis**

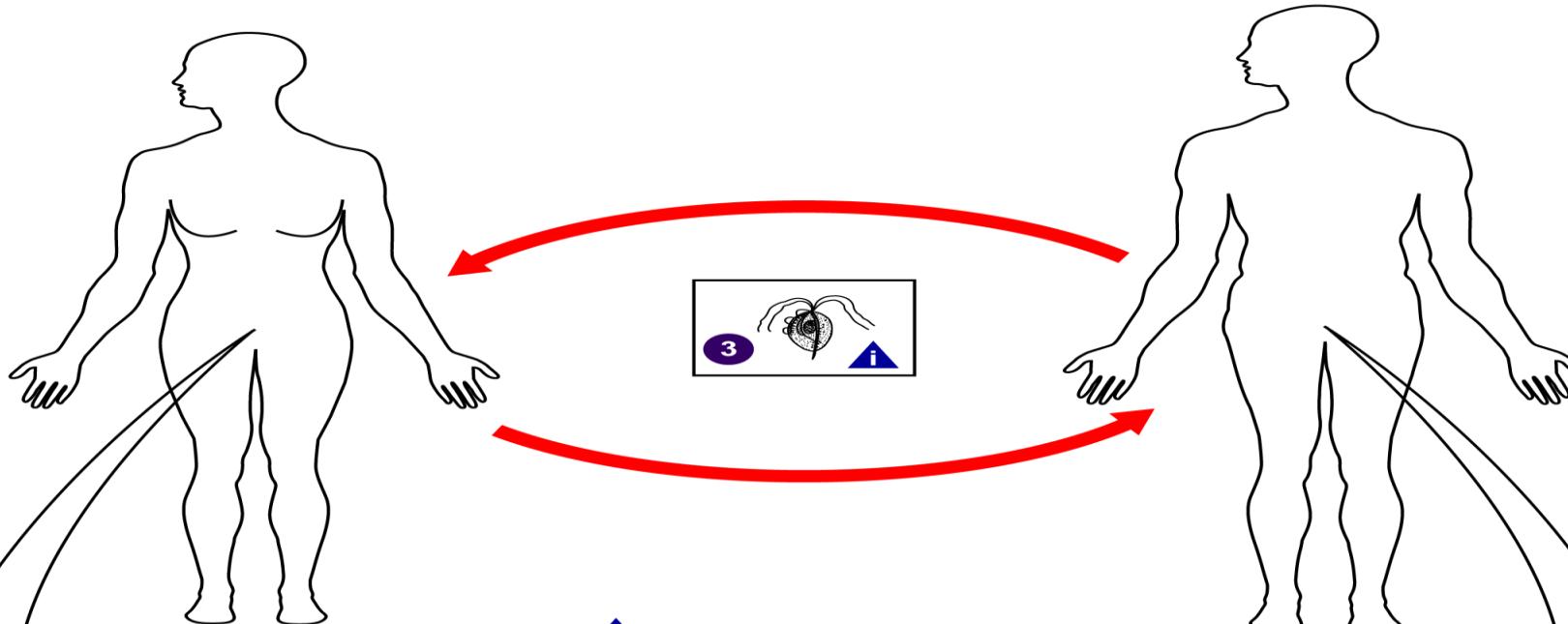
- ▶ Only one flagellum

- ▶ One undulating membrane



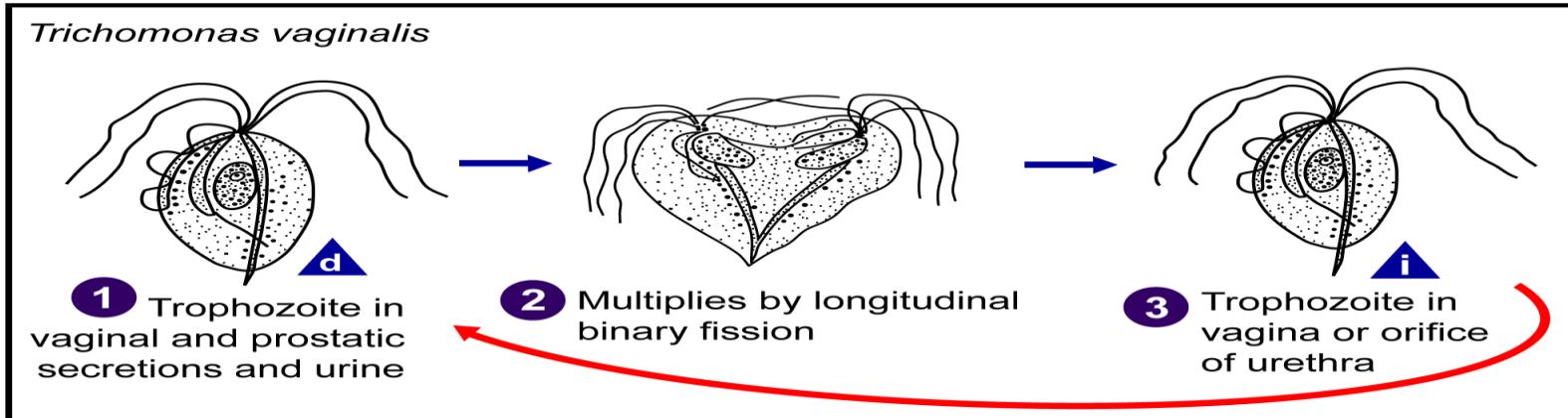

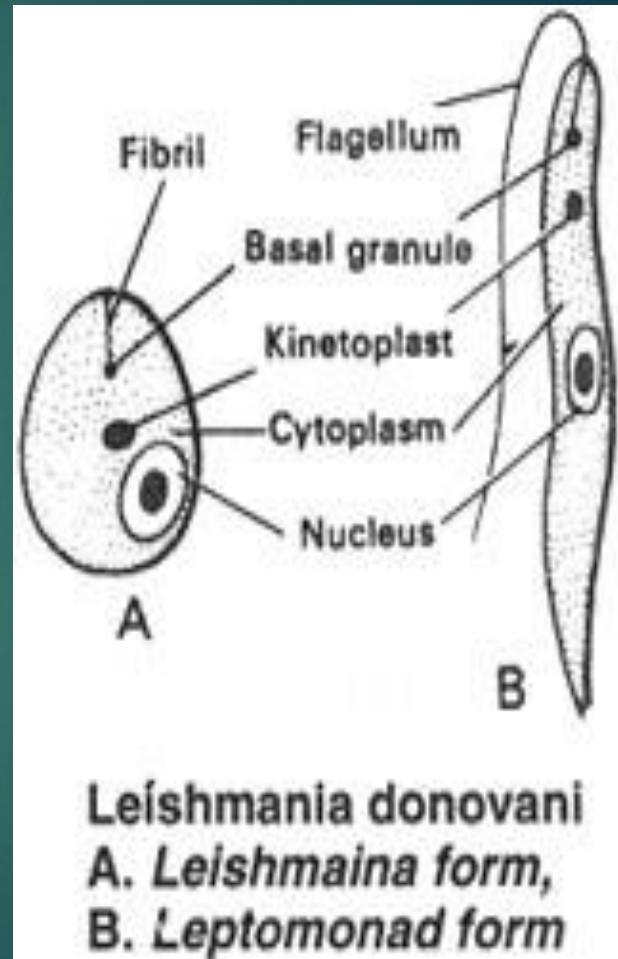

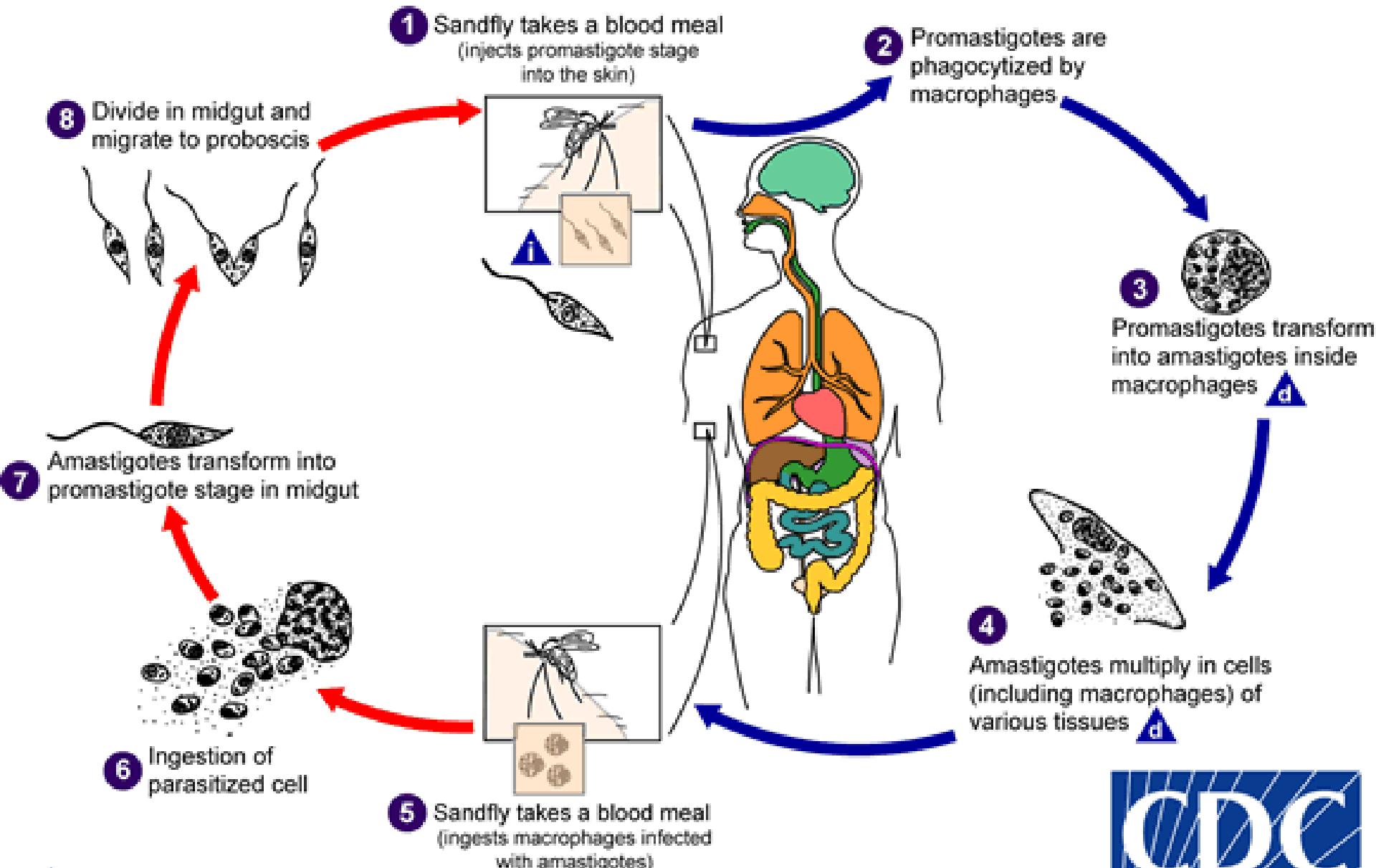

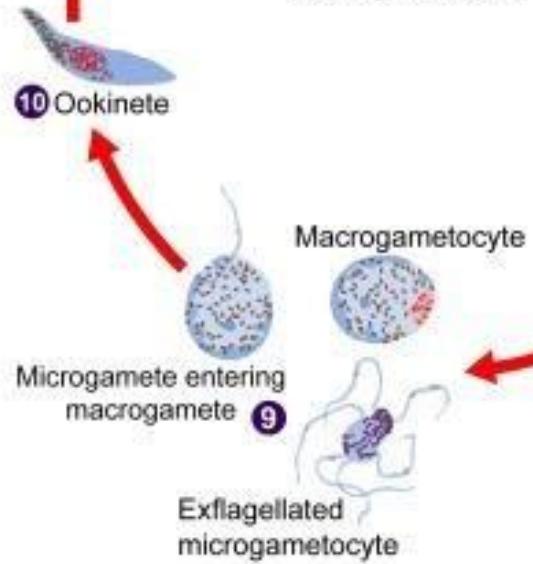

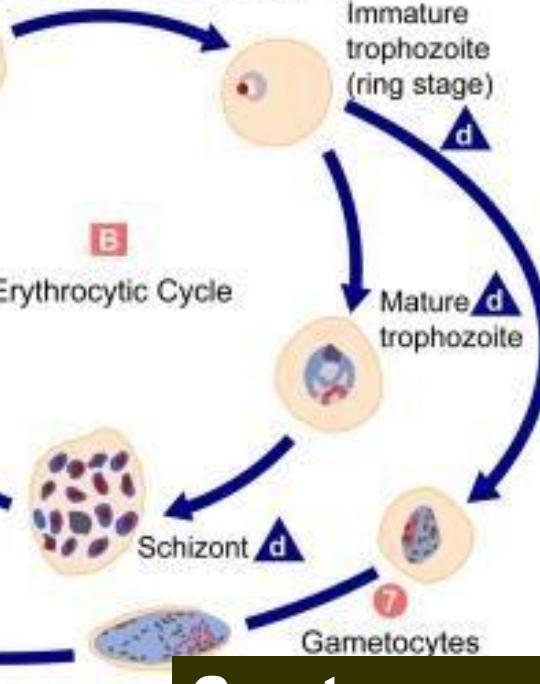

Disease caused

- ▶ **Splenomegaly**
- ▶ **Hemolytic anemia**
- ▶ **Black water fever – intravascular hemolysis**

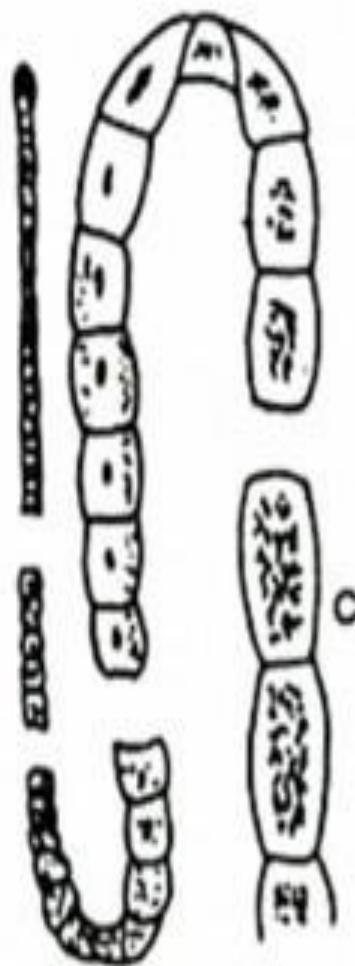

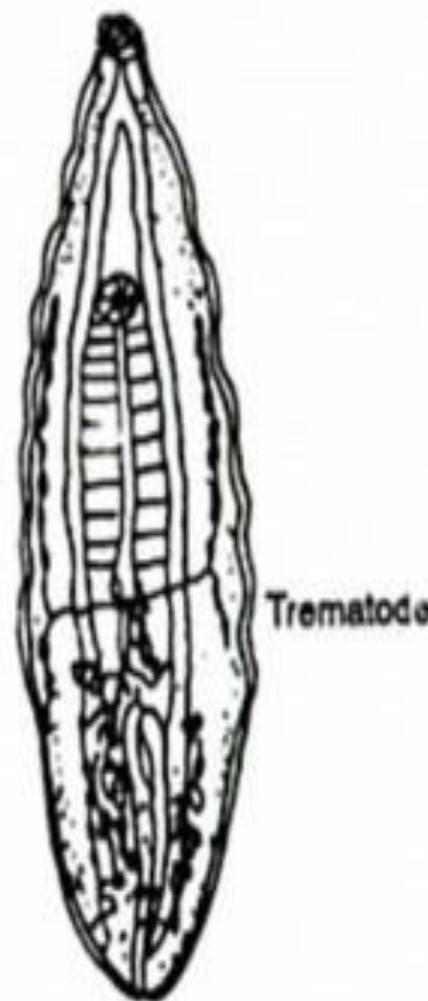

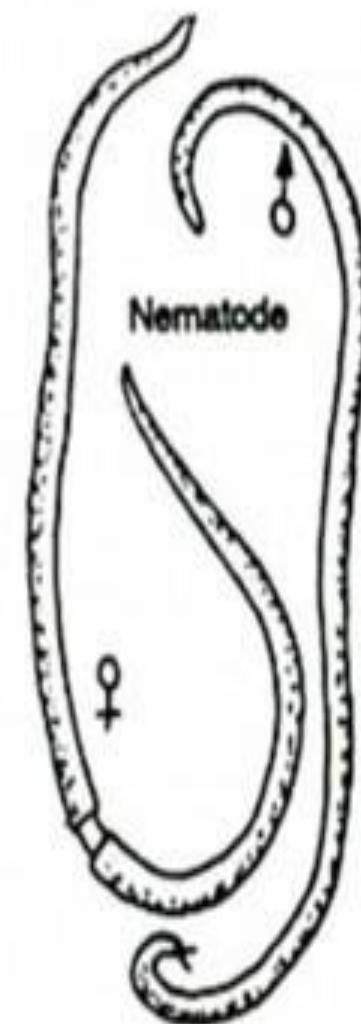

- ❑ **Female worm lays 2.5 million eggs per year**

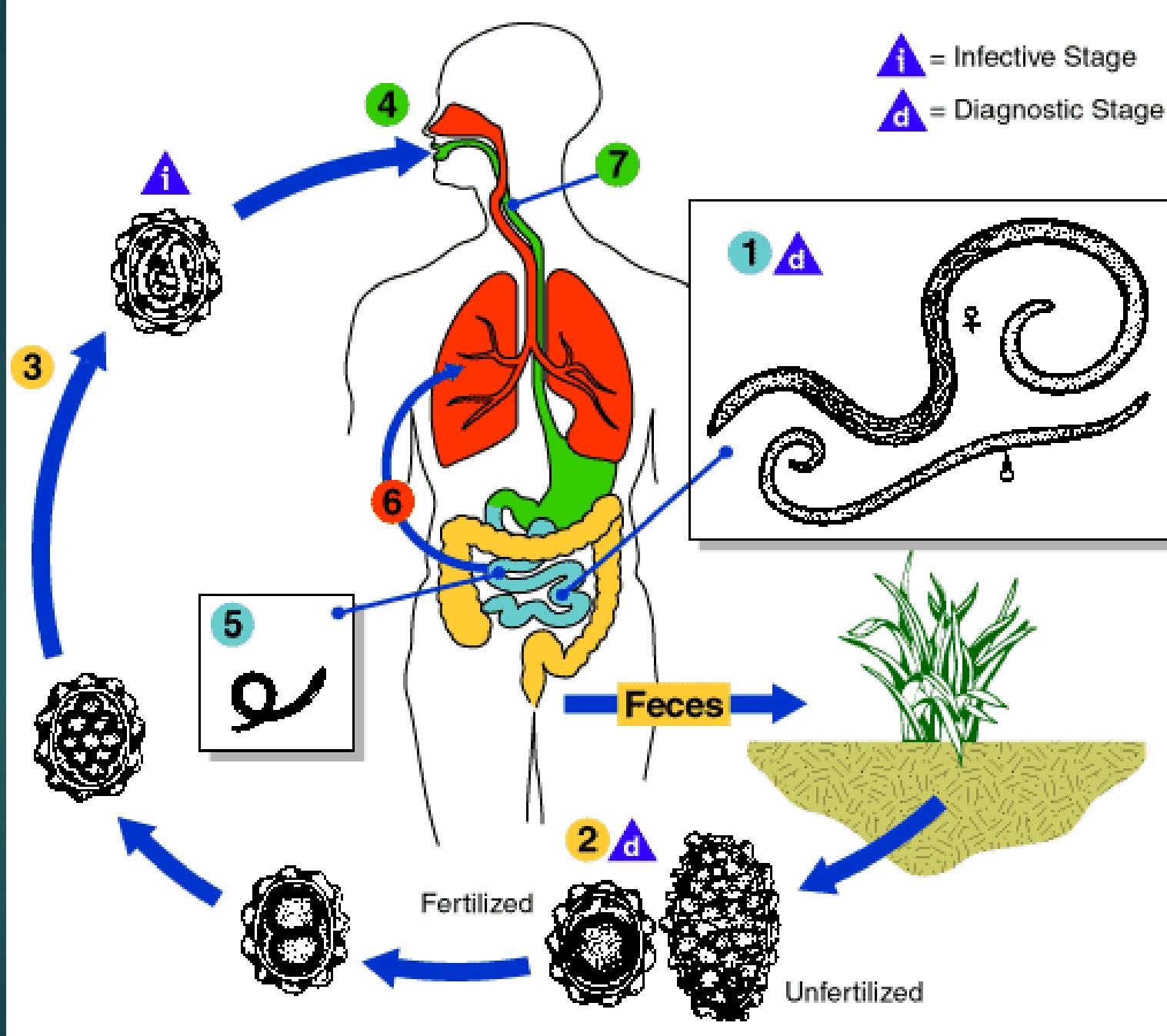

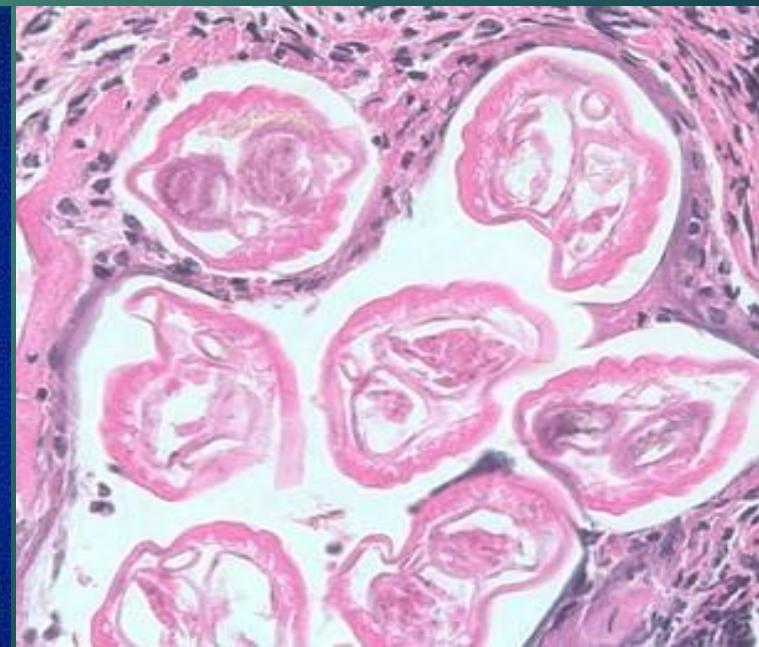
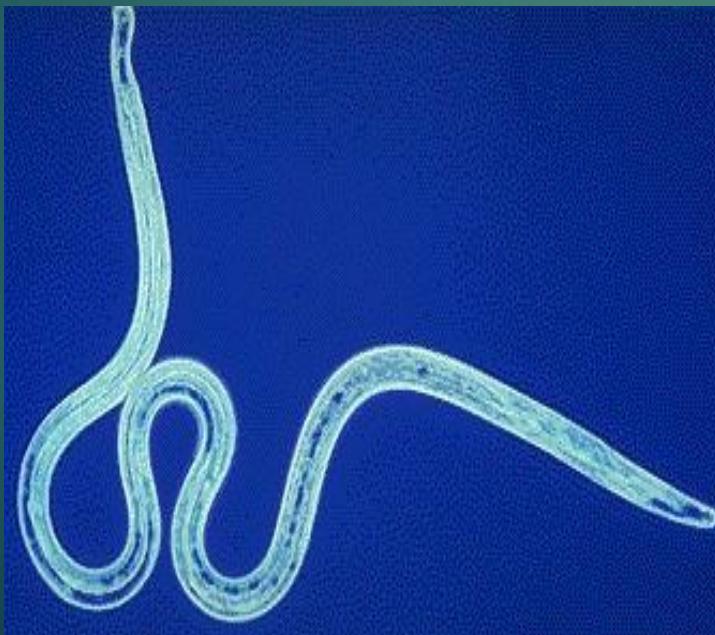


This illustration depicts the life cycle of *Brugia malayi*, one of the parasitic worms that cause the tropical disease lymphatic filariasis.

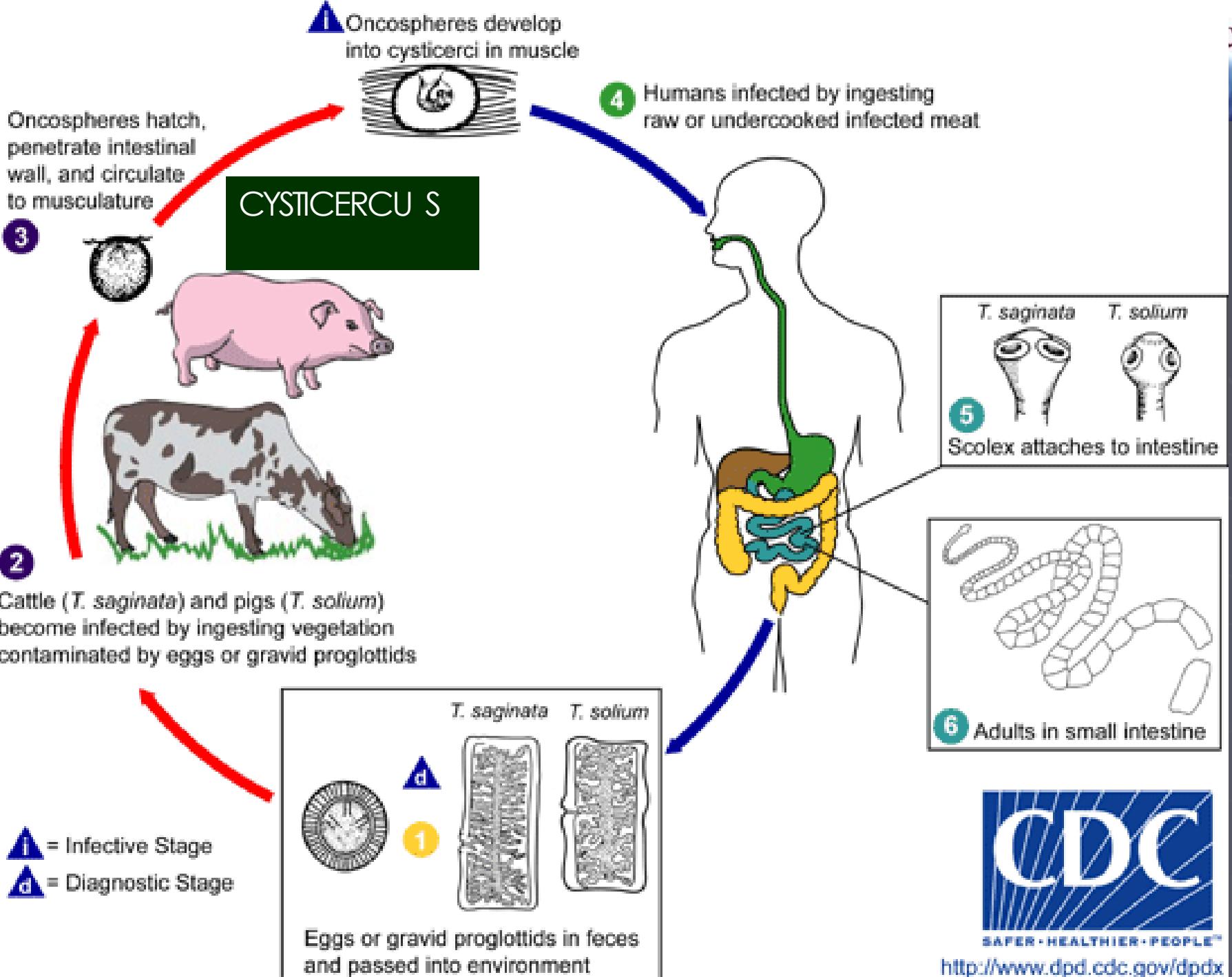
► **Adult worm – solium**

- Spherical and bile stained**



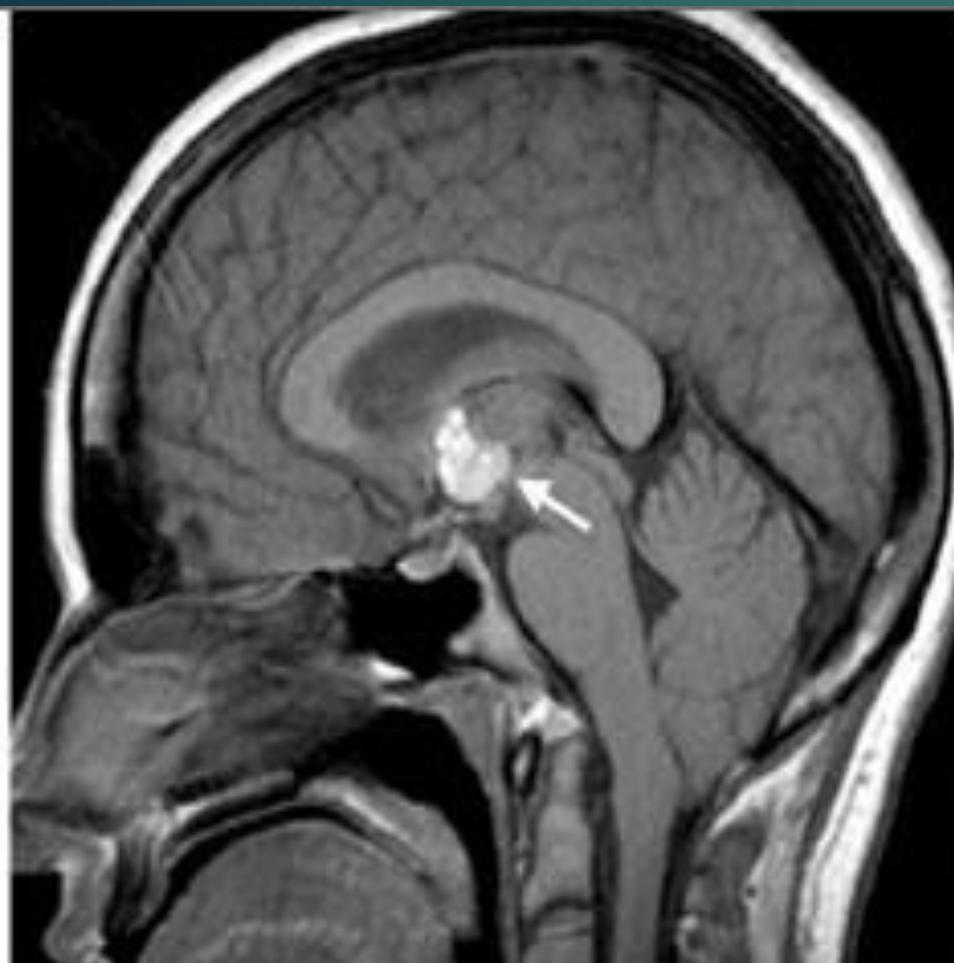

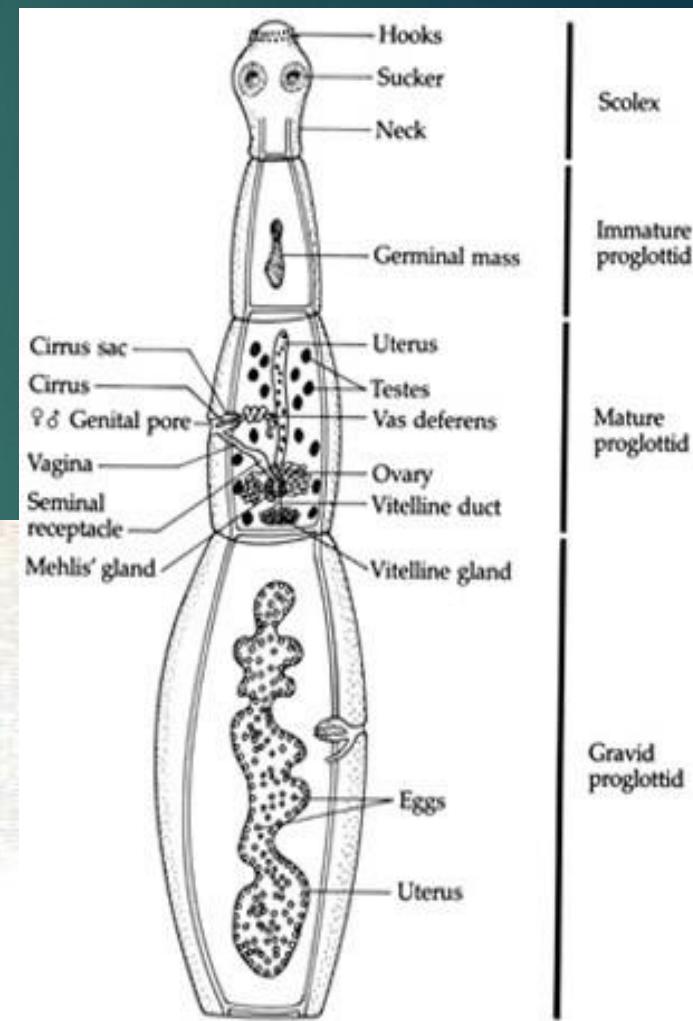
Life cycle

- ▶ **Sheep are intermediate hosts**
- ▶ **Humans are accidental intermediate hosts**

- ?] Head has suckers (rostellum)

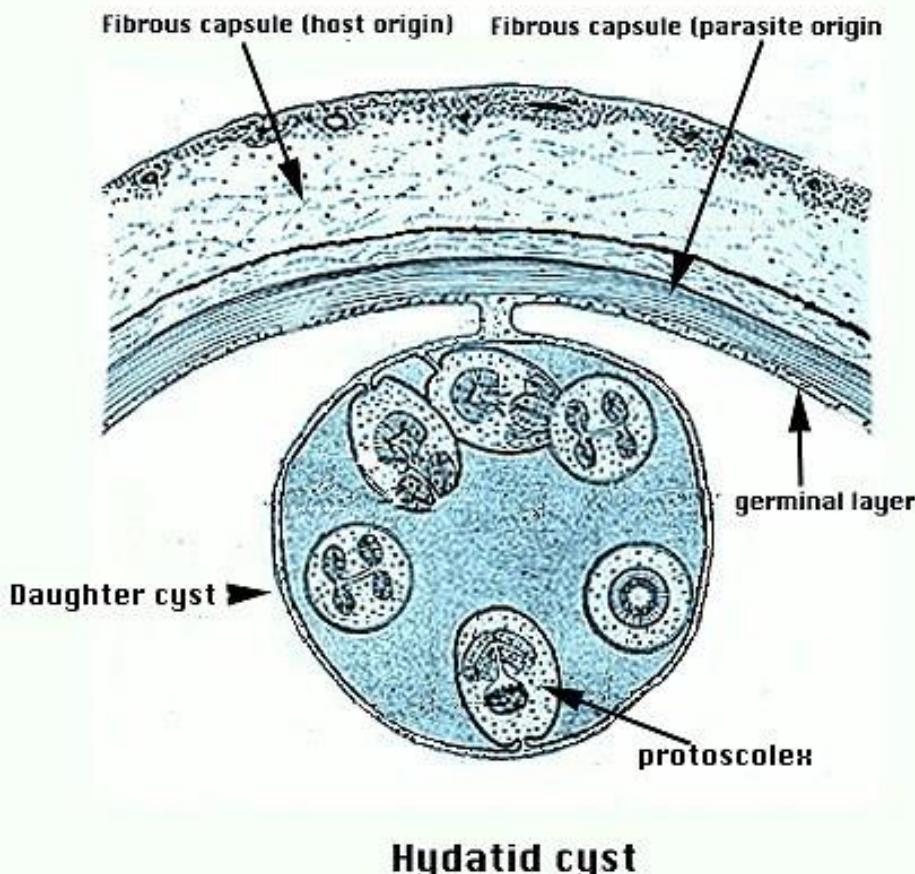


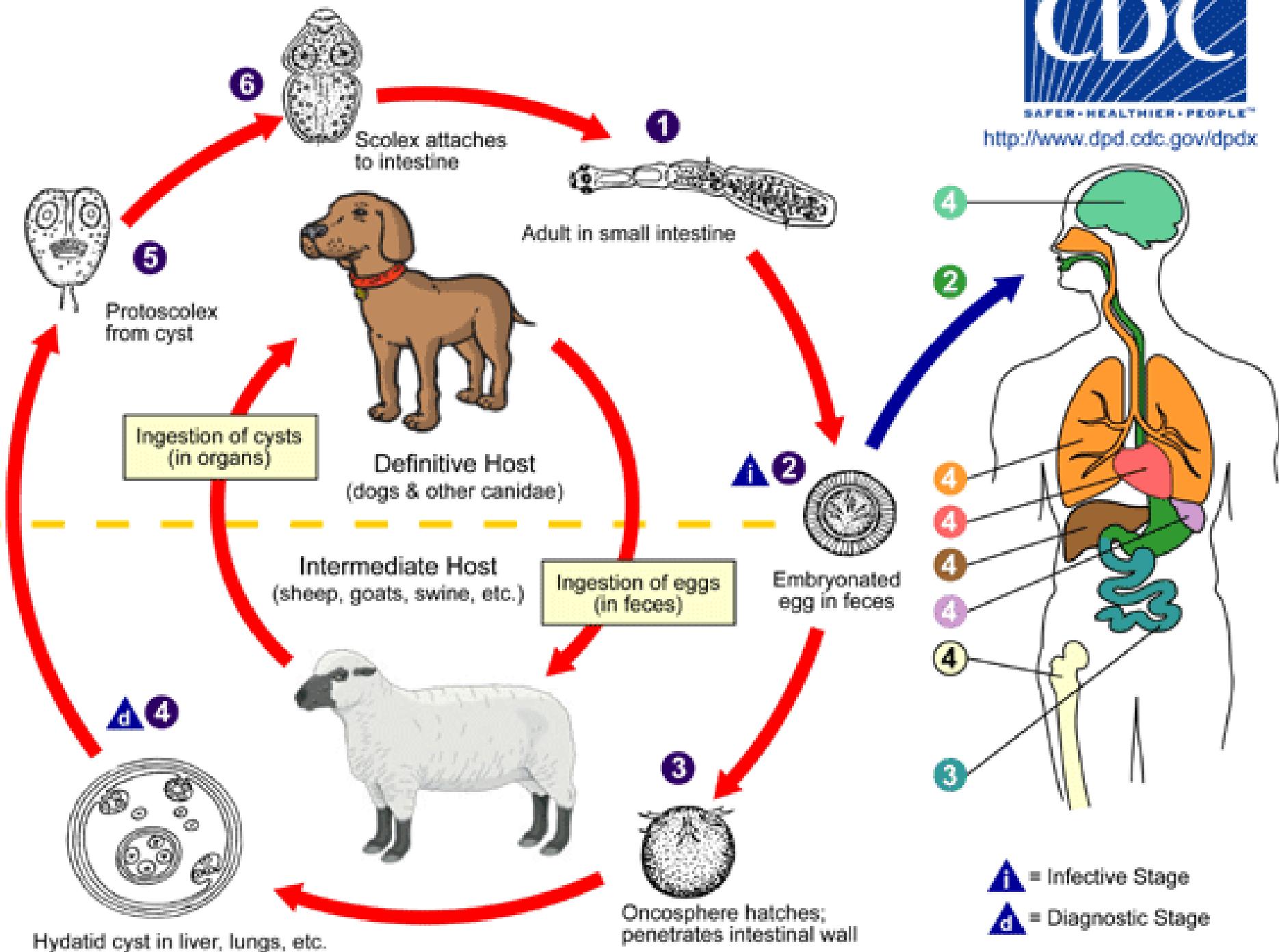

Diseases caused

- ▶ **Rupture of cyst can cause anaphylactic shock**
