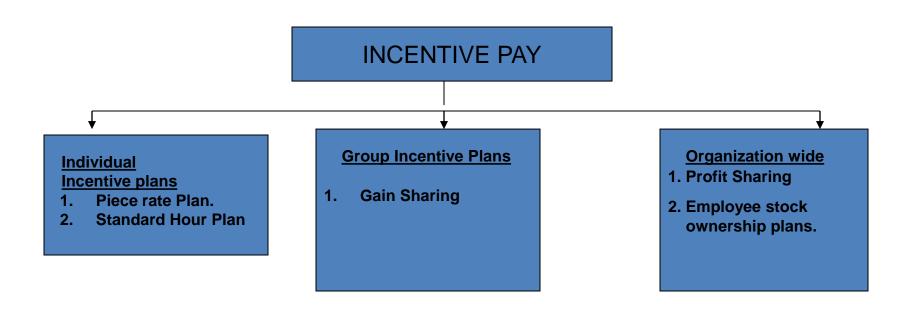

#### Motivation and Pay.

- F.W. Taylor in the late 1800 as a supervisory employee at Midvale steel company scouted for financial Incentives paid to workers whose production exceeds some predetermined standard.
- Fredrick Hertzberg said the best way to avoid dissatisfaction by linking better pay and working condition which he mentioned as (hygienes).
- Edward Deci highlighted the benefits of pay on individual motivation yet insisted too many may backfire.
- In Victor Vroom's theory Motivation =  $E \times I \times V$  The emphasis was given to the relationship between performance and rewards along with the value of the reward.
- Psychologist BF skinner's finding provide the foundation for much of what we know behavior modification.

Traditional Pay	Performance based Pay
Employees receive compensation based on a fixed hourly pay rate linked to factors such as seniority, length of service or past performance.	Performance based pay rewards individuals, teams of employees or the company overall for performance.

#### Cont...

- In most cases systems of payment by results, if accompanied by improved organizational and work measurement, enable labor cost to be estimated more accurately. This helps in costing and Budgetary Control.
- Increased complaints that equipments are poorly maintained hindering employee effort to earn large incentives.
- Increased turnover among new employees discouraged by the unwillingness of experienced workers to cooperate in on the job training.

#### **Group Incentive Plans**

❖ Group Incentive plans reward employees for their collective performance rather than for each employees individual Performance.

#### **Group Incentive Plans**

- Organizations use two major types of Group Incentive Plans.
  - 1. Team based or small group incentive plans.
  - 2. Gain Sharing Plans.

❖ Gain sharing describes group incentive systems that provide participating employees with an incentive payment based on improved company performance.

#### Organization wide Incentives

- Profit Sharing.
- Employee stock option plans. (ESOP)

#### Profit sharing Plans

❖ A organization wide pay for performance plan that uses a formula to allocate a portion of declared profits to employees.

#### Profit sharing plans classified

- 1. Current profit sharing. (Under these plan cash awards are being given to employees typically on a quarterly or annual basis)
- 2. Deferred Profit Sharing. (Under this plan cash awards are placed in trust (deferred share trust) accounts for employees)

#### Calculating Profit Sharing

❖ A fixed percentage of profits formula.

❖ A graduated percentage of profits formula.

Profitability thresholds formula.

#### Distribution of profits

- \* Equal payments to all employees.
- Proportional payment.
  - 1. based on employees annual salary.
  - 2. Based on an employees contribution to profits.

#### Pros and Cons

- Profit sharing plans enable employees to share companies fortunes and in turn enhance employee commitment to organization.
- Companies use profit sharing program gain greater financial flexibility.

Undermine the economic security of employees.

Profit sharing plans may fail to motivate employee because they do not see a direct link between their efforts and corporate profits.

#### Employee stock option Plans

• These are company wide plans in which right or privilege granted by a corporation to purchase the corporation's stock at a specified price during a specified period.

# 'ESOP' Typology.

TYPES	Description
Employee Stock Purchase Plan.	Gives employees the chance to buy stock, usually through payroll deductions.
Restricted Stock Plan.	Involves an outright grant of stocks, usually at nominal or no cost. The advantage lies in with the tax deferral that results from the vesting restrictions.
Phantom Stock	It provides employees with a payout usually in cash, based on the increase in the companies stock value.
