#### SLUMS IN INDIA

Anybody wants to live in slums??

- What are slums? form part of our existence
- Slums is an urban phenomena physical, social, economic, cultural and political profile is important to understand
- Slumming is going to increase in India/third world as urbanisation is increasing at a rapid pace

### What causes the growth of slums?

#### Push factors -

- Agriculture and rural occupations unremunerative (not enough)
- Poverty
- Sluggish industrial growth and static agriculture
- Increase in population
- Means of production in the hands of few
- Increasing inequities

# Cont'd

#### Pull factors (big cities and urban centres)

- Employment opportunities "Bright lights"
- Increasing industries
- Growth of the informal sector
- Better wages and
- Space for living and security
- Established channels (usually people from the same area/village/caste/kin) for movement, employment

#### Urban Slums

- Urban slums 22% (40 million) of India's urban popn.
- Mumbai 55% in slums (of the 11 million) occupying 12.85% land
- Maharashtra, A.P, U.P and .....last is Goa
- Essential aspect of urbanisation
- Urban poor form a necessary labour force
- Engaged in labour market contributions and informal production activities

#### Urban Slums

- Located on encroached lands (unplanned areas of the city/towns) – high density
- No basic services environmental pollution
- Drain on the existing planned services
- Encourage social evils
- Its growth makes it difficult to link planned and unplanned areas
- Eye sores and tells on the poor planning
- Increase in urban poor in the cities/towns

### Socio-economic Profile

- Regional origin same state/district, regional and linguistic blocks
- 2. Socio-economic origin small & marginal farmers, landless agricultural labourers
- 3. Gender aspect men migrate first and women follow with family. Men employed in factories or manual/semi-skilled labour, women as domestic help, informal sector or sex trade.
- 4. Recently women migrating in groups

### Cont'd

#### **Education**

- Uneducated to secondary level
- Older people are largely uneducated, no skills

#### **Occupation**

- Skilled (formal sector driver, peon, teacher etc.)
- Unskilled (informal sector small trade & business, self employed, piece-rate work)
- Hours of work 8-16 hours
- Some do not get minimum wage
- Supplementary income wife, children (e.g ragpickers), Household commercial activities (shops etc.)

### 'Slum Wallas' vs 'Kothi Wallas'

- There is a divide
- Unclean, crime prone, indecent vs clean, honest, decent, cultured...

#### **State Approach to Slums**

- Eviction, slum clearance
- Improvement sites and services water, sanitation, school, health etc.
- Rehabilitation in other areas regularising the slums

#### Current Discourse on Slums

- Little people's rights (slum people)
  - (a) Right to stay, (b) Right to resettle, (c) Right to minimum services
- Big people's rights (Planners, NGO, donors etc)
- (a) Right to define and redefine
- (b) Right to align and re-align changing alliances between govt., NGO and donors, celebrities

#### How to deal with slums

- Sustaining the problem rather than finding sustainable solutions?
- Bringing orderliness and sanity
- Demand rights for all housing, decent living
- Clear definition of development roles
- Ask for rights not favours
- Do we allow the 'Culture of Silence' to prevail?

#### How to deal with Slums?

- Can they be ignored?
- Can they be stopped?
- What is the solution?
- What to do with the urban poor?
- In a democratic set up can the urban poor be given a life of dignity free from fear?
- Can the urban poor get opportunties in urban centres – equity and distributive justice?
- Urban poor in slums too need development options
- Urban poor serve a very important role in the life of urban residents in India

## **Urban Slum Policy**

Came into existence in 2001 (India)

#### Objectives:

- To create awareness among people and govt. about the process of slum development and integrating settlements into urban areas
- Strengthen the legal and policy framework for slum development on a sustainable basis
- To establish a framework for involving all stakeholders for the efficient and smooth implementation of policy objectives

# **Urban Slum Policy**

#### Rationale:

- Slum clearance is not a solution
- Strict guidelines for resettlement and rehabilitation for certain slums
- Slums need access to basic services irrespective of their tenure status
- Planned growth of cities to help integrate all existing slums and informal settlements
- Urban local bodies and proper urban management systems – (a) resource allocation and use, (b) service delivery, and (c) urban governance – democratic, efficient, transparent and gender sensitive

#### Cont'd

- Present planning framework Master plans ignore the slums – problem areas
- Town planning, land management, poverty alleviation, basic service delivery and capacity building – inclusive approach
- 74<sup>th</sup> constitutional ammendment role of ULBs in ensuring slum improvement and upgradation
- Ward committees and Municipal Planning
  Committees decentralised participatory structures
  to ensure slum inclusion and integration

## Strategic Interventions

- 1. Inclusive approach to definition of slum/informal settlement
- 2. Listing and registration
- 3. De-listing
- 4. Classification of land tenure/status
- 5. Granting of tenure
- 6. Resettlement and rehabilitation
- 7. Planning for integration
- 8. Environmental improvement

## Strategic Interventions

- 9. Improving access to social services
- Municipal services to be brought under Consumer Protection Act
- 11. Economic Empowerment
- 12. Financing Sustainable Slum Improvement and service explore role of pvt sector, CSR
- 13. Improving creditworthiness of slum dweller
- 14. Strengthening municipal governance and management
- 15. Shelter upgradation
- 16. Monitoring Evaluation
