Cauchy's First Integral Theorems

If f(z) be single valued and analytic throughout a simply connected bounded domain D , then for every simple closed curve (or closed contour) C in D

$$\oint_{c} f(z) dz = 0$$

Proof: Let f(z) = u(x, y) + iv(x, y) where z = x + iy

Now
$$\iint_{C} f(z) dz = \iint_{C} (u dx - v dy) + i \iint_{C} u dy + v dx$$
(1)

Since f(z) is analytic $\Rightarrow f'(z) = u_x + iv_x$ exists in D

Let f'(z) be continuous $\Rightarrow u_x, u_y, v_x \& v_y$ are continuous in D

Applying Green's theorem from the equation (1):

$$\iint_{C} f(z) dz = \iint_{R} \left(-\frac{\partial v}{\partial x} - \frac{\partial u}{\partial y} \right) dx dy + i \iint_{R} \left(\frac{\partial u}{\partial x} - \frac{\partial v}{\partial y} \right) dx dy$$
$$= 0 + i0 \qquad (by C-R equations)$$

$$0+i0$$
 (by C-R equation

(where R = Region bounded by C)

$$\therefore \prod_{C} f(z) dz = 0$$
