
Taylor's Series of a Complex Function

If the function f(z) is analytic inside a circle C with centre at a, then for all z inside C,

$$f(z) = f(a) + f'(a)(z-a) + \frac{f''(a)}{2!}(z-a)^{2} + \frac{f'''(a)}{3!}(z-a)^{3} + \dots + \frac{f^{(n)}(a)}{n!}(z-a)^{n} + \dots$$

Proof:

Let z be any point inside the circle C. A circle and radius smaller than that of C such that z is



 C_1 is drawn with centre at a an interior point of C_1

Let 't' be any point on C_1 , then

$$|z-a| < |t-a|$$
 i.e., $\left| \frac{z-a}{t-a} \right| < 1$

Now,
$$\frac{1}{t-z} = \frac{1}{(t-a)-(z-a)} = \frac{1}{t-a} \left[1 - \frac{z-a}{t-a} \right]^{-1}$$

Expanding R.H.S. by Binomial theorem as $\left| \frac{z-a}{t-a} \right| < 1$; we obtain

$$\frac{1}{t-z} = \frac{1}{t-a} \left[1 + \left(\frac{z-a}{t-a} \right) + \left(\frac{z-a}{t-a} \right)^2 + \dots + \left(\frac{z-a}{t-a} \right)^n + \dots \right]$$
 (2)

The series in R.H.S. of (2) converges uniformly since $\left| \frac{z-a}{t-a} \right| < 1$.

Now multiplying both sides of (1) by $\frac{f(t)}{2\pi i}$ and integrating term by term w.r.t t over the circle C_1 , we

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$$\frac{1}{2\pi i} \iint_{C_1} \frac{f(t)}{t - z} dt = \frac{1}{2\pi i} \iint_{C_1} \frac{f(t)}{t - a} dt + \frac{z - a}{2\pi i} \iint_{C_1} \frac{f(t)}{(t - a)^2} dt + \frac{(z - a)^2}{2\pi i} \iint_{C_1} \frac{f(t)}{(t - a)^{n+1}} dt + \dots + \frac{(z - a)^n}{2\pi i} \iint_{C_1} \frac{f(t)}{(t - a)^{n+1}} dt + \dots \tag{3}$$

Since f(t) is analytic on and inside C_I , so by Cauchy integral formula

$$\frac{1}{2\pi i} \oint_{C_1} \frac{f(t)}{t-z} dt = f(z)$$

and
$$f^{(n)}(a) = \frac{n!}{2\pi i} \iint_{C_1} \frac{f(t)}{(t-a)^{n+1}} dt$$
 or $\frac{1}{2\pi i} \iint_{C_1} \frac{f(t)}{(t-a)^{n+1}} dt = \frac{f^{(n)}(a)}{n!}$

:. From (3) we obtain

$$f(z) = f(a) + (z - a)f'(a) + \frac{(z - a)^2}{2!}f''(a) + \dots + \frac{(z - a)^n}{n!}f^{(n)}(a)$$
 (4)

which is the required Taylor's series for f(z) about z = a.

Maclaurin Series

If a = 0, then the Taylor,s series (4) is reduced to

$$f(z) = f(0) + zf'(0) + \frac{z^2}{2!}f''(0) + \dots + \frac{z^n}{n!}f^n(0) + \dots$$

which is known as Maclaurin's series expansion of f(z).
