Requirements for Effective Segmentation





Customerization

Combines operationally driven mass customization with customized marketing in a way that empowers consumers to design the product and service offering of their choice.

Target Marketing Strategies

- Undifferentiated (mass) marketing
 - Ignores segmentation opportunities
- Differentiated (segmented) marketing
 - Targets several segments and designs separate offers for each
- Concentrated (niche) marketing
 - Targets one or a couple small segments
- Micromarketing (local or individual marketing)

Undifferentiated Marketing

- Single product addressing all segments with a single marketing program.
- Mass production is possible giving scale economies
- Pushes price downwards enabling to attract price sensitive segments

Differentiated Marketing

- A separate market offering for every segment
- Marketing programs for every segment could be different
- Pushes up costs at various levels, necessitating sufficient volumes for viability
- Generates inter-segment rivalry

Mega marketing

Mega marketing is a term coined by U.S. marketing academic, Philip Kotler, to describe the type of marketing activity required when it is necessary to manage elements of the firm's external environment (governments, the media, pressure groups, etc) as well as the marketing variables; Kotler suggests that two more Ps must be added to the marketing mix: public relations and power.
