Tribe in Indian Society

- Also known as Janjatis, Adivasis, Vanvasis, Primitive groups, indigenous people, ethnic minorities
- 8.6% of the total population (104 million 2011 census)

<u>Definition – Features</u>

- Distinct identity and culture, different from non-tribals
- Primitive people, living in backward areas,
- Ecology living in isolated hills and forests,
- Common culture.

Tribe in Indian Society

- No scriptures, except Santhal tribe
- Primitive arts & crafts,
- Linguistic and political boundary distinct,
- Socio-economic: Unstratified, non-monetised economy,
- Self contained unit considered mostly backward

Features of Indian Tribes

- Oldest inhabitants of the country
- Living in relative isolation in hills and forests
- Low level of techno-economic development
- Distinct culture language, world-view, customs, beliefs and institutions
- Largely homogeneous and non-hierarchical
- Differentiation among tribes due to language and racial stocks, levels of technological and economic development

Features cont'd

- They are undergoing changes and many do not confirm to the ideal tribal society
- Interactions with hindu caste is an on-going process and at times difficult to distinguish them
- Religious conversion especially to christianity has taken place among many large tribals
- In India there is a big variation among the tribes NE part of India, eastern, western and southern tribes – population, geographical spread, nature of livelihoods and social organisation

Constitution of India and Tribes

- Constitution Scheduled Tribes classified based on certain criteria – living close to nature in a definite geographical area, distinctive culture and occupational pattern, lack of education and technological development
- <u>Constitution Article 342 (1)</u> listing of ST for special treatment, President does it in consultation with the Governor of the State/UT.
- It may also remove from the ST category

Scheduled Tribes

- In 1951 there were 212 tribes and now it is 800, about 8.6% of the population of the country.
- Odisha 62 tribes and it is about 25% of the total population
- Dispersed all over concentrated in North East and Central/East India
- North East India Garo, Khasi, Naga, Bhotia, Lepcha
- Central/East India Gond, Khond, Santhal, Oraon, Juang, Saora, Birhor, Bonda, Munda, Didayi
- Western India Bhil, Meena and Garasia
- Southern India Chenchu, Irula, Kurumba, Toda
- Andamans Jarawe and Onge

Scheduled Tribes

- Tamil Nadu 7% Mizoram 95%
- Literacy rate varies 20% Rajasthan, 83% in Mizoram
- Racial Diversity Negrito, Mongoloids and Proto-Austroloids
- Linguistic Diversity Indo-Aryan, Dravidian, Austro-asiatic, Sino-Tibetian
- Many tribes speak more than one language
- Santhals have a script of their own

Economy of the Tribe

- Largely self-sufficient
- Forest dependent gathering and hunting
- Shifting cultivation 'podu chasa', swidden cultivation slash and burn (Juang, Saora, NE tribes)
- Settled cultivation small plots of land available (large tribes – Santhals, Khonds, Munda)
- Industrial workers wage workers e.g Ranchi and Orissa
- Terrace cultivation hill tribes (NE and East)
- Nomadic groups pastorals (Gujjars) Western and northern parts
