## **Fourier Integral**

## **Fourier Sine and Cosine Integrals:**

The Fourier integral becomes simpler when the given function in either an even or odd function. The Fourier integral of f(x) is described as

$$f(x) = \int_0^\infty A(w) \cos wx + B(w) \sin wx) dw$$

Where A(w) = 
$$\frac{1}{\pi} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} f(v) coswv \, dv$$
 and  $B(w) = \frac{1}{\pi} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} f(v) sinwv \, dv$ 

### Case-1:

Suppose f(x) is an even function i.e. f(-x)=f(x). Now coswx is also an even function and sinwx is an odd function. Therefore f(x) coswx is also an even function and f(x) sinwx is an odd function.

Now
$$A(w) = \frac{1}{\pi} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} f(v) coswv \, dv = \frac{2}{\pi} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} f(v) coswv \, dv$$

And 
$$B(w) = \frac{1}{\pi} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} f(v) \sin wv \, dv = 0$$

Therefore 
$$f(x) = \int_0^\infty A(w) \cos wx \ dw$$

This is known as the Fourier Cosine integral representation.

#### Case-2:

Suppose f(x) is an odd functioni.e. f(-x)=-f(x). Now sinwx is also an odd function then  $f(x)\cos(wx)$  is also odd function and  $f(x)\sin wx$  is an even function.

Now 
$$A(w) = \frac{1}{\pi} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} f(v) coswv \, dv = 0 \text{ and}$$

$$B(w) = \frac{1}{\pi} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} f(v) \sin wv \, dv = \frac{2}{\pi} \int_{0}^{\infty} f(v) \sin wv \, dv$$

Therefore  $f(x) = \int_0^\infty B(w) \sin wx \ dw$ 

This is known as the Fourier sine integral.

#### **EXERCISE 2.4**

1. Show that 
$$\int_0^\infty \frac{\cos(\frac{\pi w}{2})\cos(xw)}{(1-w)^2} \ dw = \begin{cases} \frac{\pi}{2}\cos x & , & |x| < \frac{\pi}{2} \\ 0 & , & |x| > \frac{\pi}{2} \end{cases}$$

 sinx

c. 
$$f(x) = \begin{cases} \pi - x & 0 < x < 0 \\ 0 & x > \pi \end{cases}$$

a. 
$$f(x) = \begin{cases} e^x & , 0 < x < 1 \\ 0 & , x > 1 \end{cases}$$
  
b.  $f(x) = \begin{cases} sinx & , 0 \le x \le \pi \\ 0 & , x > \pi \end{cases}$  sinx  
c.  $f(x) = \begin{cases} \frac{\pi - x}{0}, 0 < x < \pi \\ 0 & , x > \pi \end{cases}$   
4. Prove that  $\int_0^\infty \frac{w^3 \cos xw}{w^4 + 4} dw = \frac{\pi}{2}e^{-x}, x > 0$ 

# **Properties of Fourier integral:**

1. 
$$f(ax) = \frac{1}{a} \int_0^\infty A\left(\frac{w}{a}\right) \cos wx \ dw \ a > 0$$

2. 
$$xf(x) = \int_0^\infty B^*(w) \sin wx \, dw$$
 Where

$$B^* = -\frac{dA}{dw}$$
 and  $A(w) = \frac{2}{\pi} \int_{0}^{\infty} f(v) \cos wv \, dv$ 

3. 
$$x^2 f(x) = \int_0^\infty A^*(w) \cos wx dw$$
,  $A^* = -\frac{d^2 A}{dw^2}$
