## PROPERTIES OF LAPLACE TRANSFORM:

**Linearity Property:** If a, b, c be any three constants and f,g,h be any function of t whose Laplace transform exist, then

$$L\{af(t) + bg(t) - ch(t)\} = aL\{f(t)\} + bL\{g(t)\} - cL\{h(t)\}.$$

Change of Scale Property: if  $L\{f(t)\} = F(s)$ , then  $L\{f(at)\} = \frac{1}{a}f\left(\frac{s}{a}\right)$  where a is positive constant.

Proof: By def<sup>n</sup> of Laplace transform, we have

$$L\{f(at)\} = \int_0^\infty e^{-st} f(at)dt$$

Let 
$$at = x \implies t = \frac{x}{a}$$
 and  $dt = \frac{dx}{a}$ 

Also if  $t \to \infty \Longrightarrow x \to \infty$  and if if  $t \to 0 \Longrightarrow x \to 0$  therefore the above integral becomes

$$L\{f(x)\} = \frac{1}{a} \int_0^\infty e^{-\left(\frac{s}{a}\right)x} f(x) dx = \frac{1}{a} F\left(\frac{s}{a}\right) , \quad since \int_0^\infty e^{-st} f(t) dt = F(s).$$

First Shifting Property: if  $L\{f(t)\} = F(s)$ , then if  $L\{e^{at}f(t)\} = F(s-a)$ , where a be any real constant.

Proof: By definition of LT, we get  $L\{f(t)\} = \int_0^\infty e^{-st} f(t)dt = F(s)$ .

$$L\{e^{at}f(t)\} = \int_0^\infty e^{-st}e^{at} f(t)dt$$

$$= \int_0^\infty e^{-(s-a)t} f(t)dt = F(s-a).$$
