Ghee composition and changes during manufacture

- •Ghee majorly consists of milk lipids and richest source of milk fat.
- $\odot \textbf{Constituents}$ of ghee vary with method of its manufacture.
- It is a complete lipid of 97-98% triglycerides with small amount of di and monoglycerides.
- •Fatty acid composition of buffalo milk ghee also varies from cow milk ghee (butyric acid is significantly higher in buffalo than cow ghee).
- •Caproic to myristic are significantly higher in cow than buffalo ghee and palmitic and stearic are higher in buffalo than in cow ghee.

OBuffalo milk ghee is white (lack of carotenoids) with greenish tinge and cow milk ghee is golden yellow. **Characteristic cooler of buffalo fat is due to tetrapyrozole** pigments (biliverdin and bilirubin); pigment is conjugated to protein in milk, but is released during manufacturing of ghee thus, imparting yellowish-green color to buffalo ghee. **Ouring manufacturing, water gets evaporated and fat** present in cream/butter getting concentrated and starts settling at bottom during clarification process. **•** Flavour formation in ghee happens during fermentation of cream and clarification process. •Colour development and granulation happens during

clarification for subsequent packaging of ghee.

Flavour Formation In Ghee:





Carbonyls:

Quantity of carbonyls is directly proportional to temperature of clarification.

'Head space' and 'volatile' carbonyl content of fresh desi cow ghee is higher than buffalo ghee.

Total carbonyl content of fresh desi buffalo ghee is higher than cow ghee.

Carbonyl content increase during storage.

Lactones:

Higher in buffalo ghee.

Highest in direct cream (DC) ghee, followed by creamery butter (CB) and lowest in desi ghee.

Clarification butter at 100-120 C double lactones level from butter.

Lactone level in ghee rise on storage.

Flavour Components of Ghee:

- **•** Formation of flavour components are due to
- (i) Heat interaction between the native carbohydrates and protein system of cream
- (ii) Due to heat effect on unfermented residue as well on
- fermented metabolic products formed by ripening process.

Major flavor components in ghee

Flavour in ghee is due to four different mechanisms:

Hydrolysis

(Free fatty acid formation)

Oxidation

(Saturated and unsaturated aldehyde, ketones, alcohols and hydrocarbons)

Decarboxylation

(Alkan-2 – Ones)

Dehydration and Lactonization

(Lactones)

Lactose, citrate and glucose were responsible for increase in ghee flavour components.

- **1. Texture of ghee:**
- **Storage of ghee at room temperature crystallizes into 3**
- distinct fractions/layers: (i) Oily (ii) granular semi-solid at
- the bottom (iii) hard flakes portion floating on
- surface and sticking to sides of container.
- Layer formation can be prevented by storing at 20 C or below immediately after preparation. Ghee thus, solidified can subsequently be stored at higher temperature without formation of layer.
- Liquid portion of ghee varies with storage temperature, shape and size of container, repeated heating and agitation, ripening of cream/butter, storage and handling etc.

2. Market Quality of Ghee



Chemical and other physical preventers are evaluated to judge the quality of ghee and also to prevent adulteration of ghee:

- 1. Refractive Index:
- Ratio of the velocity of light in vacuum to the velocity of light in the sample medium.
- In case of milk fat reading is normally made at 40°C using Abbe refractometer and its values range from 1.4157-1.4566. This value is low in comparison to other fats and oils.
- RI if ghee is influenced by both molecular weight and degree of saturation of component fatty acids.
- RI could be used as indicator of adultration.

2. Iodine Number:

- Number of grams of iodine absorbed by 100 g of fat under specified conditions.
- Iodine number for milk fat falls within the range of 26-35 which is low in comparison to other fat and oils. This is estimated using Wijs method.
- One molecule of halogen compound is absorbed by each unsaturated linkage and the absorption is expressed as the equivalent number of grams of iodine absorbed by 100 g of fat.



- **3. Reichert-Meissl Number (RM Number):**
- Number of ml of N/10 sodium hydroxide required to neutralize the steam volatile water soluble fatty acids distilled from 5 g of ghee under precise conditions.
- Primarily a measure of butyric acid and caproic acid.
- Value for milk fat ranges between 17-35 and it is above that of all other fats and oils. Therefore, milk fat contains more of these acids than any fats.

4. Polenske Number:

- Number of ml of N/10 Sodium hydroxide required to neutralize steam volatile water insoluble fatty acids distilled from 5 g of fat under precise conditions.
- Caprylic acid, capric acids (steam volatile and insoluble in water) are indicated mainly in Polenske number and it ranges from 12-24 for milk fat.

- 5. Saponification Number:
- Number of milligrams of potassium required to saponify one gram of fat.
- Value ranges from 210-233 and more often falls in range of 225 -230.
- This constant is an indication of average mol. wt of fatty acid present.
- Detects presence of minerals oils (liquid paraffins in ghee as they are not acted upon by alkali and such a sample doesn't form a homogeneous solution on saponification).

6. Melting Point:

Melting point for milk fat ranges from 30 C to 41 C.

Factors Affecting the Market Quality of Ghee

- Raw-materials (Milk, Dahi, Cream, Butter) used for ghee making: Milk used should be clean, fresh and strained. Use of ripened cream, butter improves flavour score of ghee.
- 2. Method of preparation and temperature of clarification: Flavour compounds of ghee vary according to its method of preparation. Eg., desi methods have more volatile carbonyl compounds than cream method. Temperature of clarification also has influence on quantity of carbonyl compounds and lactones formation during ghee production.

- 3. Type of feed: Main factor affecting variation in fatty acid composition of milk fat. Roughages in feed mainly consist of cellulose contribute to formation of fatty acid of 4-16 carbon chain length and lipid content of feed contributes to formation of long chain fatty acid (C16 and above). Animals fed with cotton seed meal will have high amount of C10 and C12 fatty acids.
- 4. Season: In winter and monsoon, granulation is more due to changes in fatty acid profile. Winter ghee showed higher acidity, melting point and grain size whereas; in summer the saponification value is higher.

Grading of Ghee

- **Quality of ghee can be judged by physical and chemical analysis.**
- Customer can only perceive appearance, taste and aroma of ghee. Therefore, grading i.e. classification according to its quality and purity is necessary to assure customer.
- The Agricultural Produce (Grading & Marking) Act, 1936 empowers Central Government to fix quality standards ,
- known as 'AGMARK' standards and to prescribe terms and conditions for using seal of 'AGMARK'.
- □'AGMARK' is a derivative of "Agricultural Marketing".

Objectives of AGMARK:



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AGMARK is a certification mark of Government of India to ensure purity and quality of Agricultural and allied products in India

AGMARK Ghee Specifications

□Grade designation marks for ghee- The grade designation mark shall consist of label specifying name of commodity, grade designation and bearing design consisting of an outline map of India with word —'AGMARK' and figure of rising sun with words produce of India.

AGMARK grades of ghee

>Labels shall be printed on watermark paper of Government of India and shall have micro tint back ground bearing words "Government of India" in olive green color.

> Each label shall have printed thereon a serial number along with a letter or letters denoting the series, e.g. A054987.

> Each label shall have printed thereon the approx. weight content of package on which it is affixed.

Design of Label

□Grade designation marks for ghee- The grade designation mark shall consist of label specifying name of commodity, grade designation and bearing design consisting of an outline map of India with word —'AGMARK' and figure of rising sun with words produce of India.



The word "Regional' shall be printed on each label used on a package of ghee not conforming to normal physical and chemical constants

AGMARK standards of ghee



- □Flavour: High grade ghee should have natural sweet and pleasant odour, an agreeable taste, free from rancidity and objectionable flavour and pleasant, nutty, slightly cooked aroma.
- **Texture:** Large uniform grains with very little liquid fat is desirable. Upon melting, should be clear, transparent, free from sediment and foreign colouring matter.
- **Colour:** Uniform throughout, bright yellow for cow milk ghee and white with or without a yellow or greenish tint for buffalo milk ghee.

Defects in Ghee and their Prevention

Defects	Causes	Prevention
Smoky	Smoky fire used for boiling of milk/cream/butter	Use non-smoky fire for boiling milk/cream/butter
Overcooked Or bunt	Excessively high temperature of clarification	Optimum temperature of clarification of ghee
Undercooked	Excessively low temperature of clarification	Optimum temperature of clarification of ghee
Rancid	Fat hydrolysis due to lipase action in milk/cream/curd/butter/ghee	Inactivation of lipase by proper heat treatment Clarify at optimum temperature which ensures minimum moisture content in ghee
Oxidized/oily/ metallic	Fat oxidation due to direct contact of milk/curd/cream/butter/ghee with copper or iron, exposure of these product to sunlight	Storage of the milk/curd/cream/butter/ghee in properly tinned or aluminum alloy/ss vessels Filling ghee upto the brim to minimize the headspace & use opaque containers Avoid ghee storage at high temperature (>210C) & avoid long storage
