### Genome Databases

- The study of genes and proteins has become an extremely important area in the modern day biology and they are better known as genomics and proteomics
- Genome databases store this information and differently from gene databases the genome databases contain both coding and non-coding inter-genic sequences.

# Types of databases

- Many types of databases available for researchers in the field of biology
  - a) Primary sequence databases for storage of raw experimental data
  - b) Secondary databases contain information on sequence patterns and motifs
  - c) Organism specific databases and other databases like Saccharomyces genome database, Mouse genome database, Human genome database, European mutant mouse pathology database

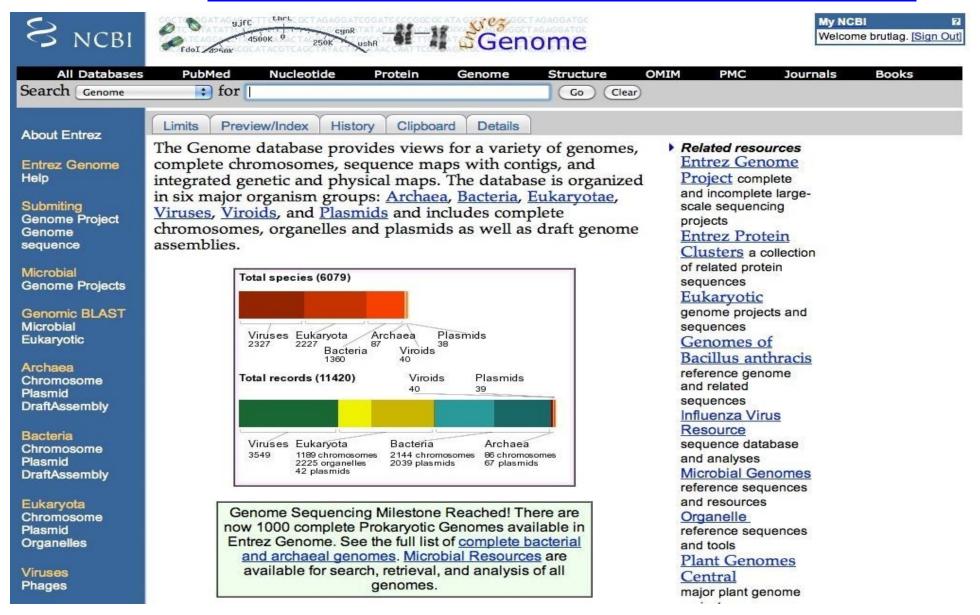

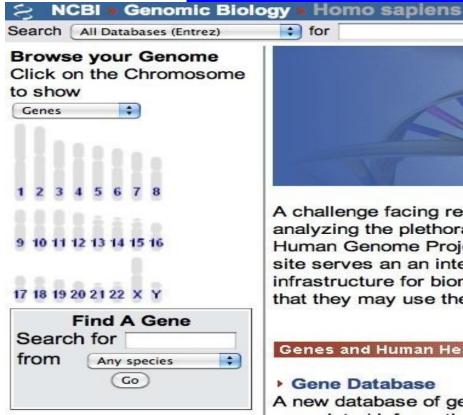
