PHYLOGENETIC METHODS

Definition

• A phylogeny is a hypothetical relationship between groups of organisms being compared. A phylogeny is often depicted using a *phylogenetic tree*, such as the simple one below describing the evolutionary relationships between the great apes.

Introduction

- **Phylogeny** is discovered using molecular sequencing data and morphological data matrices.
- Greek Origin Phylon-Tribe, Geneticos Relative to birth
- The evolutionary development and history of a species or higher taxonomic grouping of organisms

Maximum likelihood

- Maximum likelihood is the third method used to build trees.
- Likelihood provides probabilities of the sequences given a model of their evolution on a particular tree.
- The more probable the sequences given the tree, the more the tree is preferred. Likelihood is defined to be a quantity proportional to the probability of observing the data given the model

Simple Coin Flip example

The likelihood for heads probability p for a series of 11 tosses assumed to be independent
HHTTHTHHTTT 5 heads (p), 6 tails (1-p) Assuming a fair coin what is the likelihood of this series results?
L=(n!/k!(n-k)!)pk (1-p)n-k = 0.22559

• Where n is the number of tosses, k is the number coming up heads, p is the probability of heads (0.5 used above). L is maximized (0.23609) when p= 0.45454, intuitively 5/11. Thinking of L as a function dependent on the number of tosses (n), number of heads observed (k) and the true probability (p) of getting heads in a single toss. Since n and k are observed you can try various values for p to find the

Advantages and disadvantages of maximum likelihood methods

- Supposed advantages.
- Appropriate for simple data like DNA sequences, where we can reasonably model the largely stochastic processes, i.e. a statistical description of the stochastic processes.
- lower variance than other methods

Disadvantages

- very computationally intensive and so slow
- -Apparently susceptible to asymmetrical presence of data in partitions.
- the result is dependent on the model used and information is derived from sites that are uninformative under parsimony is only due to the model used.

• Neighbor joining is a bottom-up (agglomerative) clustering method for the creation of phylogenetic trees. Neighbor-joining (Saitou and Nei, 1987) is a method that is related to the cluster method but does not require the data to be ultrametric.
