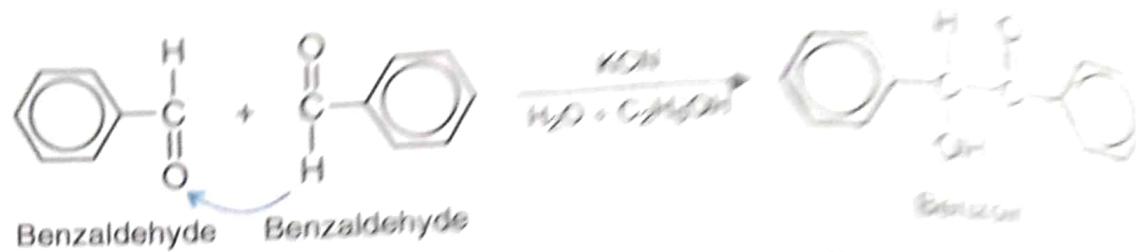
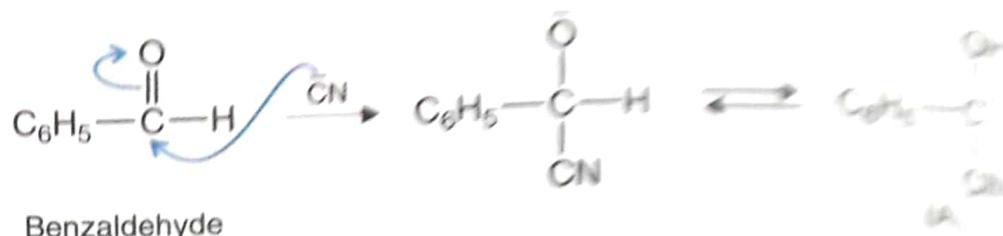


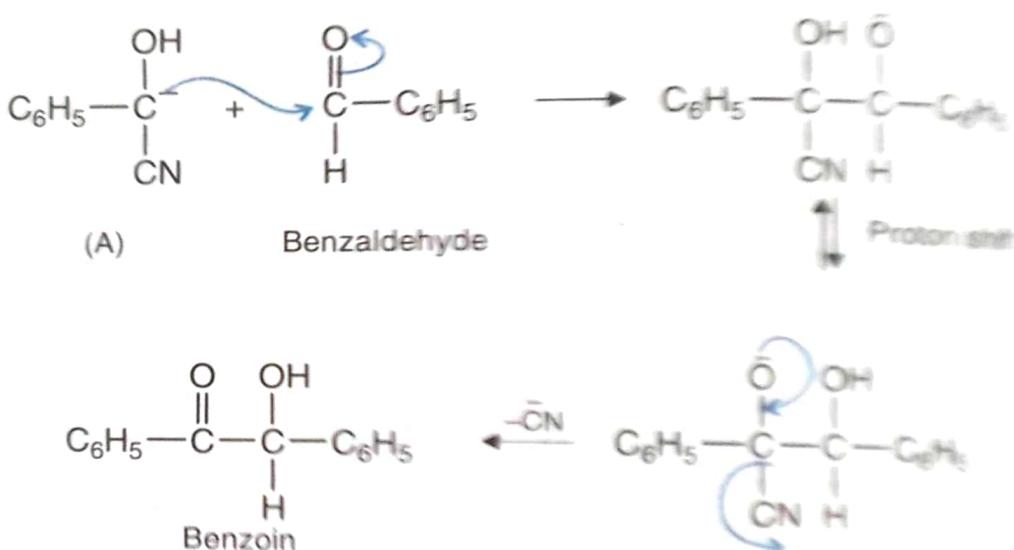
(13) **Benzoin Condensation.** The benzoin condensation involves the treatment of an aromatic aldehyde with aqueous alcoholic KCN (or NaCN). The products are α -hydroxy ketones. For example, benzaldehyde reacts with alcoholic KCN to form benzoin. Notice that two molecules of benzaldehyde take part in the reaction.



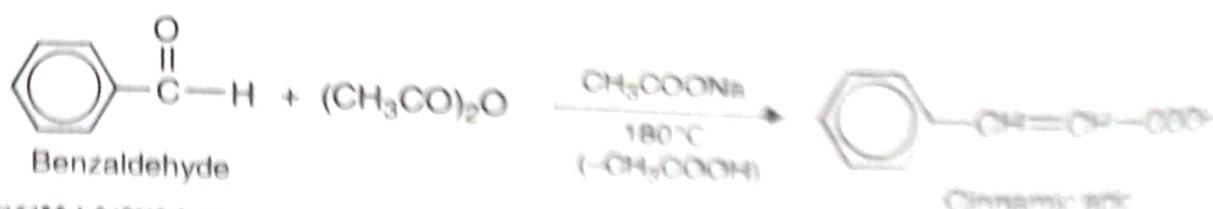
MECHANISM. The above reaction takes place as follows: The cyanide ion (CN^-) deprotonates one molecule of benzaldehyde, and enables the formation of carbanion (A).



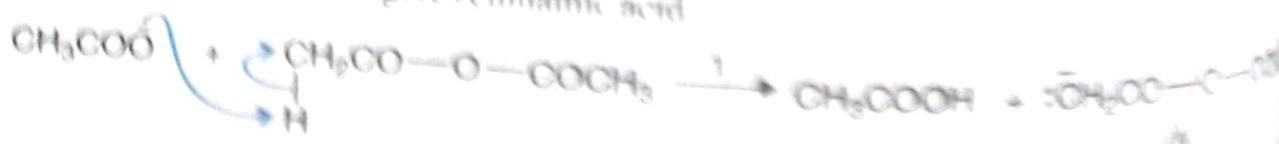
The carbanion (A) can then react with another benzaldehyde molecule. Subsequent proton transfer and loss of the cyanide ion gives benzoin.



(14) Perkin Reaction. The Perkin reaction involves the treatment of an aromatic aldehyde with anhydride of an aliphatic acid and the sodium salt of that acid. Products are α,β -unsaturated carboxylic acids. For example, benzaldehyde reacts with acetic anhydride in the presence of sodium acetate at 180°C to form cinnamic acid.



MECHANISM. The Perkin reaction involves the following steps: (1) Formation of the acetic anhydride (A); (2) Addition of (A) to benzaldehyde gives (B). Notice that the anion of the acid from step (1); (3) Protonation of (B) gives (C). The proton is supplied by (D); and (5) Hydrolysis of (D) gives cinnamic acid.
