Chemotherapy: General principles of chemotherapy

CHEMOTHERAPY:

- The use of drug (chemical entity/substance derived from micro-organism) with selective toxicity against infections/ viruses, bacteria, protozoa, fungi and helminths is called as chemotherapy
- **ANTIBIOTICS:** Antibiotics are substances produced by micro-organism which selectively suppress the growth of or kill other micro-organism at very low concentration
- Antimicrobials (chemotherapeutic agent + antibiotics): any substance of natural, synthetic or semisynthetic origin which at low concentration kill or inhibits the growth of micro-organism but causes little or no effect on host

Basic principle of chemotherapy:

- Diagnosis: site of infection, responsible organism
- Selection of drug: specificity (spectrum of activity, microbial activity of drug), pharmacokinetic factors (physiochemical properties of the drug), patient related factors, (allergy, renal disease)
- Frequency and duration of drug administration: inadequate dose may develop resistance, intermediate dose may not cure infection
- Continue therapy: acute infection treated for 5 10 days, but some bacterial infection typhoid fever, Tb therapy have been continued in order to avoid relapse
- Test for cure: after therapy, symptoms & sign may disappear begore eradication of pathogens
- Prophylactic chemotherapy : to avoid surgical site infections
