Aim - Estimation of Salt (Sodium Chloride) in given sample

Principle: Excess silver nitrate is added to the salt solution prepared from the sample. The silver nitrate reacts with chloride ion according to: $Ag+ + Cl- \rightarrow AgCl$ (precipitate). The silver nitrate left behind after precipitation is determined by titrating against ammonium thicyanate/ potassium thiocyanate using ferric alum as indicator. The results are expressed as % of sodium chloride or in g/L, depending on the sample type (the molar weight of NaCl is 58.443 g/mol).

Materials:

- 0.05N silver nitrate (AgNO₃): Exactly 9.493g of silver nitrate into 1 litre of distilled water. Stored in an amber coloured bottle.
- a) To standardize- Take 10 ml of standard 0.1 N NaCl solution in a conical flask.
- b) Add 1 ml of potassium chromate indicator and titrate the contents against silver nitrate solution till appearance of faint red colour (end point).
- c) Calculate the exact normality of AgNO₃ using the relationship $N_1V_1=N_2V_2$
- 0.1 N Ammonium thiocyanate (NH₄CNS) : 8g of NH₄CNS is dissolved in 1 litre of distilled water
- a) To standardize- Take 10ml of standard AgNO₃ solution in a conical flask.
- b) Add 10 ml of ferric alum indicator and titrate the contents against ammonium thiocyanate solution till appearance of faint blood red colour (end point).
- c) Calculate the exact normality of NH₄CNS by using the relation $N_1V_1 = N_2V_2$
- 0.1N NaCl: 5.846g of NaCl is dissolved in 1 litre of distilled water.
- Potassium chromate indicator: 5% solution is prepared in distilled water.
- Conc. HNO₃
- Saturated ferric alum indicator: 5g ferric alum (ammonium ferric sulphate) in 50ml distilled water. To it add 5ml conc. HNO₃ and boiled slowly until the nitrous fumes (brown colour fume) are expelled. Then the solution is cooled and diluted to 200ml.

Method:

- 1. Take 0.3-0.5g sample in a 250 ml conical flask.
- 2. Add about 0.1(N) AgNO₃ solution to it.

- 3. Add 20 ml of conc. HNO₃ and boil the mixture gently on hot plate for about 15 min until all solids except AgCl dissolve.
- 4. Then cool the conical flask and add 50ml of distilled water and followed by 5ml of ferric alum indicator.
- 5. Titrate against 0.1(N) NH₄CNS solution
- 6. Look for the appearance of permanently light brown colour.
- Substract the volume of 0.1(N) NH₄CNS used from the volume of 0.1(N) AgNO₃ added and calculated the NaCl (%) from the difference.
- 8. Run a blank simultaneously with 40ml AgNO₃

Calculation:

Sodium Chloride (%) =

Where,

S = Titrate value (blank-sample)

W = Weight of sample
