Poisons are the substances administered either by mouth, injection, inhalation or through skin/mucous membrane. They produce harmful, dangerous or fatal symptoms in animals and human beings.

Poisoning could be accidental, occupational, suicidal or criminal. Generally, self-medication is an important cause of drug poisoning and is particularly seen with OTC drugs. Acute poisoning is generally observed with over-use of drugs or insecticides and hence emergency treatment of acute poisoning is symptomatic.

CLASSIFICATION OF POISONS

Poisons are classified into three main categories:

1. Corrosives:

Strong acids (H₂SO₄, HNO₃, HCI)
Strong alkalies (caustic soda, caustic potash)

2. Irritants:

a. Inorganic:

Non metallic (P, CI, Br, I)

Metallic - heavy metal (As, Sb, Pb, etc).

Herbal - castor seeds, croton oil etc.

Animal - snake venoms, cantharides.

- Poisons acting peripherally CO₂, CO, coal gas. d)

General Treatment of Poisoning (Clinical - Manifestation)

1. Immediate removal from the environment:

When poisoning appears to have occurred due to gases like carbon monoxide or from surface absorption, the patient must be immediately removed for fresh air.

Poisons introduced due to snake bite needs tournicating which prevents the poison from reaching vital organs like heart, kidneys, brain and liver through circulating blood. Make an incision (cut) and the tissue bleeds. Neutralise the poisons by a suitable method. Poisons into body cavities should be thoroughly washed with plenty of water or should be neutralised by a specific chemical agent.

2.Emesis:

Emesis plays very important role in poisoning with oral ingestion of some material.

Note: Vomiting should never be attempted in the following cases.

- (i) Ingestion of corrosives (acids and gases), perforations may occur.
- (ii) Kerosene oil aspiration pneumonia may occur.
- (iii) Convulsant drug vomiting may induce convulsions.

 Vomiting can be induced by following methods.
 - Mechanically.
 - (2) Ipecac syrup or powder.
 - (3) Mustard Powder.
 - (4) 3 teaspoonfuls of salt in water.
 - (5) Apomorphine (6mg) causes prompt vomiting usually within 3-5 minutes. The only disadvantage is that it should be administered parentrally and should never be used if the poison itself is a CNS depressant.

3. Gastric Lavage:

It is necessary if the poison is ingested. The poison is washed out by inserting catheter into alimentary canal upto stomach.

Washings are usually done with:

- i. NaHCO₃, 2gm in 300ml water.
- ii. 30gm (Mag. Or Sod. Sulphate in 1/4 litre water)
- iii. 100ml liquid paraffin + 150ml water.
- iv. 8gm of activated charcoal in water.
- Use of emetics, e.g. common salt, ipecac powder, mustard powder.

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It should never be attempted in drowsy or in coma because of risk of inhalation of stomach contents.

Intravenous fluids are administered to excrete poisons it be kept in mind not to overhydrate the patient as it lead to circulatory impairment or even pulmonary oedema. Forced diuresis is done in amphetamine poisoning. Peritoneal dialysis involves instilling dialysis fluid into peritoneal cavity. Poison in the blood enters the dialysis fluid which is then

In Haemodialysis, a semipermeable membrane separates blood from dialysis fluid and poison passes passively from the blood, where it is present in high concentration into the fluid. It is useful for many poisons like barbiturates, bromides, boric acid, salicylates, digitalis, and methyl alcohol.

6.CLINICAL MANIFESTATION OF GENERAL SYMPTOMS

- For increase in body temperature sponge with water.

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- In anaphylaxis, antihistamine and corticosteroids with adrenaline are used.
- For asphyxia, i.e., suffocation, cessation of breathing, artificial respiration and oxygen through nasal catheter is useful.

ANTIDOTES

Remedies which counteract the effect of poison are called antidotes. They can be classified as:

- 1. Mechanical antidotes.
- Chemical antidotes.
- Systemic antidotes.
- 4. Universal antidotes.

1. Mechanical antidotes

These substances interfere with the absorption of poison. They act by forming a coat over mucous membrane of the stomach, e.g., fats, oils, egg albumin, activated charcoal (4-8gm) is specifically used in adsorbing alkaloidal poisons.

2. Chemical antidotes:

They react with poison to form harmless or insoluble compounds, e.g.,

- Acids are neutralised by alkalies and vice-versa.
- ii. KMnO₄ used in opium poisoning.
- iii. MgO or calcium oxide neutralises acids.

3. Systemic antidotes:

They produce the action which are opposite to that of poison e.g., Caffeine for morphine; Atropine for pilocarpine.

6 Chelating agents

Chelating agents are widely used as specific antidotes for heavy metals. They form stable, soluble, non-toxic complexes with some heavy metals. They promote dissociation of bound meal from tissue enzymes and other functional macromolecules. These metal chelates are water soluble.

NSECTICIDE POISONING:

Insecticide are generally discussed as organo-Phosphorous compounds, D.D.T. and Endrin

1. ORGANOPHOSPHOROUS COMPOUNDS

- Hexaethyl tetraphtosphate (HETP)
- Tetracthyl pyrophosphate (TEPP)
- Octamethyl pyrophospharamide (OMPA)

Symptoms

- Headache.
- Diarrhoea
- Malaise.
- Giddiness.
- Profuse sweating.
- Nausea.
- Vomiting.
- Abdominal cramps.
- Excessive bronchial secretions, bradycardia.

Antidote

Anticholinergic, i.e., atropine to block the cholinergic reactions.

CLINICAL MANIFESTATION:

Treatment consists of:

- Decontamination: The patients must be removed from the source of poison by washing the external surface and by inducing vomiting to remove ingested poison.
- 2. Respiration therapy: Artificial respiration is necessary in some cases. Sometimes suction is applied to cause hyperventilations.

Antidote therapy: (i) Atropine can antagonise the peripheral action of organophosphoric compounds and is administered in dose of 2mg for every 15-30 minutes. I.M or I.V route is followed, sometimes the dose may higher per need of the patient. (ii) Another antidote is PAM pyridine — 2- aldoxime methiodide is given in dose of 1gm/I.V or by infusion in saline. It is then repeated after half an hour if necessary. This is useful to prevent nicotinic symptoms.

Administration of choline esterase reactivation: The oxime compounds like paralidoxine chloride and pyridine aldoxy methiodate are given. The dose of 1 to 2 g/l.V is for adults and 25-50 mg/kg for children. It is given as 5% solution in isotonic saline and repeated after every 12 hours of the day.

2. DDT (DICHLORODIPHENYLTRICHLOROETHANE)

Symptoms:

- Excess of saliva.
- Parthesias of tongue, lips, face,
- Vomiting, irritability, tremors.
- Abdominal pain.

As poison is generally absorbed through the skin or by inhalation.

The symptom are irritation of eyes, blurring of vision, cough, pulmonary oedema. Clonic and tonic convulsion, hyper irritability and paralysis of limb muscles are sometimes observed. DDT in the dose of 150-1000 mg/kg body weight is

a fatal dose.

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CLINICAL MANIFESTATION:

- Ingested material can be removed by gastric lavage and by using saline cathartics. 1. Adrenaline and its related compounds should never
 - be used. Artificial respiration is required in some cases.
 - Phenobarbitone in the dose of 100mg recommended 4. for tremors along with some antibiotic.
 - Wash the skin with soap and water. 5.
 - In chronic poisoning remove patient from the site. 6.
 - In case of liver/kidney damage a low fat, high 7. carbohydrate and protein diet is recommended.

3. ENDRIN

Symptoms

- Abdominal pain
 - Vomitting
- **Tremors**
- Convulsions
- Occasionally blood stained from mouth and nostrils.

Convulsions become severe if continued for a long time and followed by come which may terminate in respiratory failure and ultimately death. The fatal dose is 6gm.

CLINICAL MANIFESTATION

It is always symptomatic (treatment of general symptoms).

Decontamination must be carried out.

For convulsion barbiturates can be used. 2.

3. Calcium decreases toxicity of endrin.

METALS POISONING

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Heavy metals block the body enzyme system as they chelates with body enzymes.

Arsenic : symptoms of acute toxicity are:

Nausea, cramps in legs, dilated pupil, vomiting, diarrhoea, gintness, pale anxious face, malaria, tachycardia, burning pain n stomach, dyspnoea.

Vomiting initially consists of stomach contents but later it becomes greenish or black in colour due to the presence of bile. Diarrhoea is complained and stools contain mucous tinged

with blood. When arsenic dust is inhaled it may cause pulmonary oedema, restlessness, cyanosis.

Fatal dose: 130mg - 300mg.

CLINICAL MANIFESTATION

- Stomach wash with sodium and magnesium sulphate 1.
- Morphine and atropine is given to relieve colic pain. is recommended. 2.
- EDTA acts as chelating agent. 3.

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Symptoms of Chronic toxicity are:

- Redness of skin
- Loss of weight
- Horny growth of cornea
- Inflammation of mucous membrane
- Coughing
- Patchy brown pigmentation of skin
- White strips of fingernails
- Tenderness of muscles.

CLINICAL MANIFESTATION

- Dimercapnol 3mg/kg is administered intramuscularly at 4 hourly intervals.
- Fluid replacement and use of pressor agents like dopamine is used to control hypotension.

CLINICAL MANIFESTATION

- Further absorption of barbiturates can be controlled
 by administering activated charcoal.
- 2. Artifical respiration must be given by a mixture of 95% oxygen +5% carbon dioxide (CO₂).
- Haemoperfusion and haemodialysis are the available options for the severe toxicity.
- Amphetamine sulphate in the dose of 10mg every half-an-hour must be given intravenously till improvement occurs.
- Alkalisation of urine to pH8 with sodium bicarbonate helps in the elimination of phenobarbitone.

NARCOTIC DRUG POISONING

Narcotics are the drugs which produce unconsciousness, e.g., paraldehyde, barbiturate, ${\rm CO_2}$ in high amount. Narcotics from plant sources are :

Opium, Cannabis, etc.

OPIUM POISONING

Symptoms

If opium is consumed in large doses, respiration becomes shallow constriction of pupil takes place and heart rate decreases. Body temperature drops, cyanosis and ultimately death occurs due to respiratory depression and cardiac arrest.

Fatal dose: Morphine - 200mg

- CLINICAL MANIFESTATION Naloxone 0.4mg is given either by LM/L / route _{imme}diately.
 - Gastric lavage is done to remove any unabsorbed 2. drug.
 - patients must be kept awake, as in awake condition ventilation and basic metabolic rate is more which 3. is responsible for detoxification of the opium.

2. CANNABIS POISONING

symptoms

First excitement then necrosis is followed.

Chronic poisoning results in anorexia, loss of weight. weakness, tremors.

Fatal dose: Charas 2000mg/kg body weight.

CLINICAL MANIFESTATION

The stomach must be washed with warm water. Hypodermic injection of strychnine and saline purgatives are very useful.
