WHAT IS EXPLOSIVE & POST BLAST RESIDUE ?

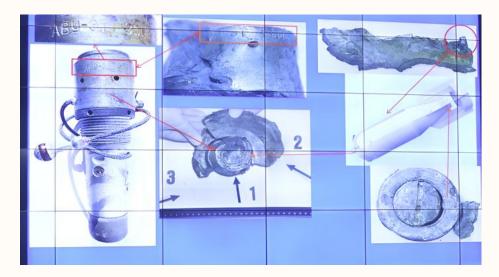
An explosive is a substance (solid liquid or gas) or device that releases energy (shock waves, heat, light, sound & pressure) in a sudden and intense manner, causing a blast or explosion.

Material left behind after an explosion has occurred

- Fragments of the explosive device
- Debris from the explosion
- Traces of the explosive materials

- Identify any criminal or malicious activity



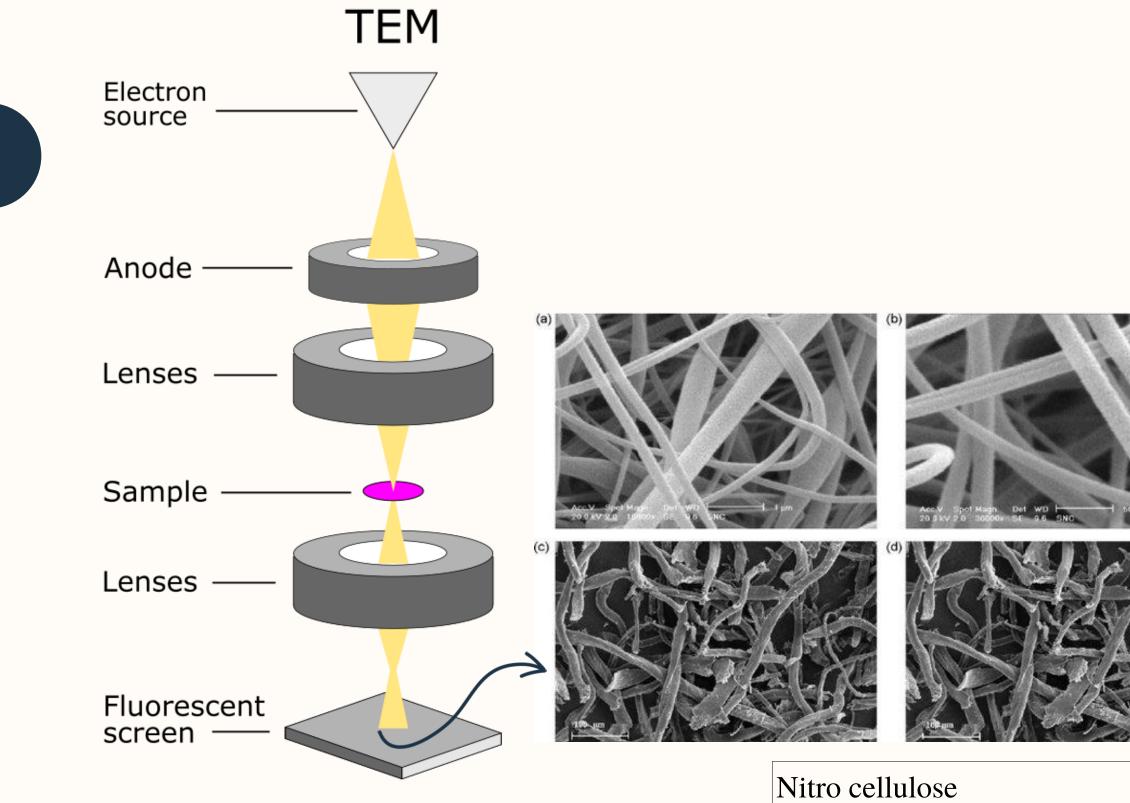
