Microbiological Criteria

A criterion is a measure on which a judgment/decision can be made. A microbiological criterion will stipulate that a type of microorganisms, group of microorganisms or toxin produced by a microorganism must either be not present at all, be present in only a limited number of samples, or be present as less than specified number or amount in given quantity of a food or food ingredient.



Components of a Microbiological Criterion

A statement describing identity of food

A statement of contaminant of concern (microorganisms/group of microorganisms and/ or toxin)

> The microbiological limits considered appropriate to the food and commensurate with sampling plan

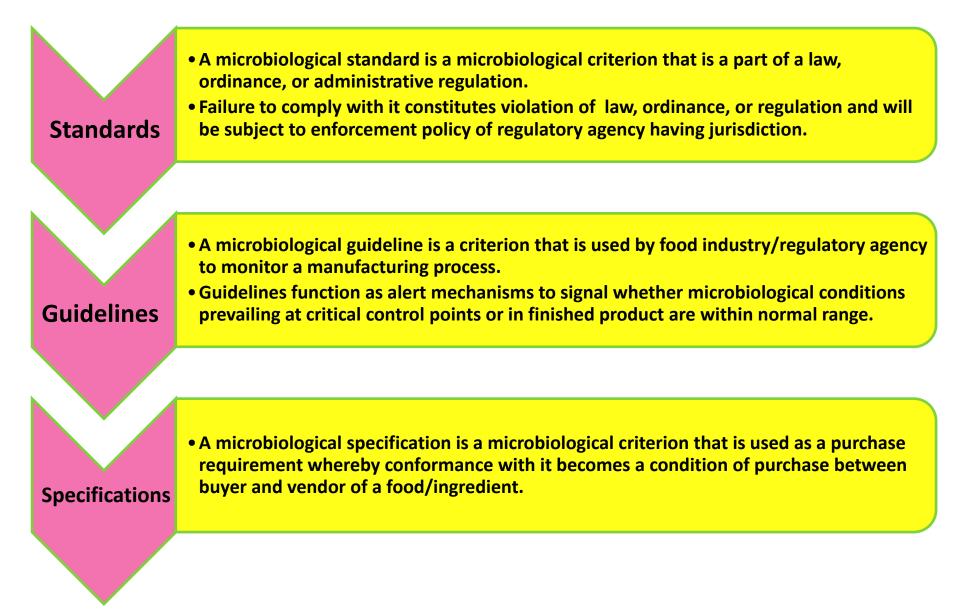

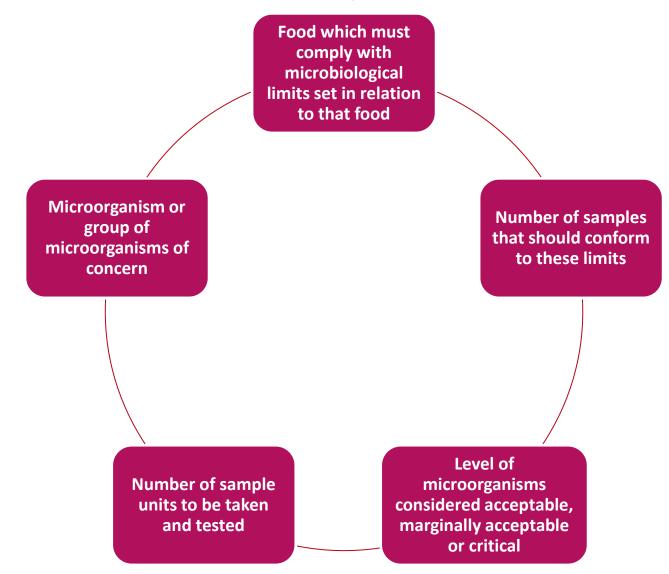

Types of Microbiological Criteria Mandatory and advisory criteria A mandatory limit is one that the food cannot exceed. Food that does not meet criterion must be subjected to some action e.g., it may be rejected by purchaser, destroyed, reprocessed, sold as an inferior grade, or diverted to a use where contaminant is not of concern. Certain mandatory criteria also may result in loss of license to process food when limits are consistently exceeded. Advisory criteria serve as an alert to deficiencies in processing, distribution, storage, or marketing.

Sampling plan: a statement of criteria of acceptance applied to a lot (batch) based on appropriate examinations of a required number of sample units by specific methods

Sampling Plans and FSSAI Microbiological Standards for Milk and Milk Products

Sampling plan and interpretation

Following terms are used by International Commission on Microbiological Specifications for Foods (ICMSF) are defined and used in development of FSSAI standards for different milk and milk products.

- n = number of sample units which must be examined from the batch/lot of food to satisfy the requirements of particular sampling plan.
- C = maximum allowable number of defective sample units. This is the number of sample units, which may exceed microbiological limit specified by m.
- m = Represents an acceptable level and values above it are marginally acceptable in terms of sampling plan.
- M = Microbiological criterion which separates marginally acceptable quality from unsatisfactory/potentially hazardous quality. Values above M are unacceptable in terms of sampling plan and detection of one or more samples exceeding this level would be cause for rejection of lot.

Steps for choosing sampling plan

- **Select the measurement**
- **Befine the sampling unit**
- Determine: consumer or producer risk to ensure the lot quality
- **W** Obtain an estimate process
- **Select a plan that meet the risk and lot quality**
- Calculate operating characteristic curve (probability of acceptance)
- **Apply the plan on the lot**
- Maintain record on process or make change the plan if necessary

Two class plan

Simple plan used to designate acceptable or unacceptable batch/lot of food

Specification: *n*_{*r*} *c*_{*r*} *m*

- *m* = the number of sampling units from the lot
- C = the maximum allowance number of sample units that exceed the microbiological criterion
- # m = the maximum number or level of relevant bacteria (CFU/gm or ml) (std. acceptable criteria)

Three class plan

Used to designate acceptable/marginally acceptable/unaccepatble food

- **Specification:** *n*, *c*, *m*, *M*
 - *m* = the number of sampling units from the lot
 - *c* = the maximum allowance number of sample units that exceed the microbiological criterion
 - # m = the maximum number or level of relevant bacteria (CFU/gm or ml) (Threshold value)
 - M = the maximum number that use to separate marginally acceptable/unacceptable quality food (Maximum permitted microbial level)

Microbiological criteria and their interpretation

- Three categories of microbiological quality have been assigned based on Total plate count, levels of indicator organisms (Coliform count and yeast & mold count) and number /presence of pathogenic bacteria.
- Satisfactory= If a maximum of c/n value are between m and M, rest of values observed are <m (means results are within limits of acceptable microbiological quality and no action is required).
- Unsatisfactory= If one or more of values observed are >M or more than c/ n values are between m and M means results are outside acceptable microbiological limits linked with hygiene indicators (Total plate count, Coliform count and Yeast and mold count) and indicative of poor hygiene/handling practices.
- Potentially hazardous= If one or more of values observed are >M or more than c/n values are between m and M (results are outside acceptable microbiological limits linked with E. coli, Salmonella, B. cereus, C. perfringens, L. monocytogenes and are indicative of serious food safety concern and immediate remedial action should be initiated.

Sample Size, Storage and Transport Standards & Reference Methods of Testing

- 1. Each sample unit taken for submission to laboratory should be of sufficient size to allow appropriate analysis .
- 2. A minimum sample size of 100 g or 100 ml is usual.
- 3. Food samples obtained by an authorized officer as a result of a consumer complaint, or as part of an investigation of suspected food poisoning incident, may only be single samples.
- 4. Food samples provided to testing laboratory should have undergone only minimum change in their microbiological status since point of sampling.
- 5. Knowledge of aseptic sampling techniques and use of appropriate sampling tools are necessary.

- 6. It is also important that temperature during transport and storage of food samples is appropriate to minimize microbial growth.
- 7. Chilled foods should be transported in an insulated container and frozen foods kept frozen.
- 8. Every effort should be made to minimize period between sampling and analysis.
- 9. The sampling for microbiological testing as per the sampling plan in standards is to be ensured at manufacturing units as per guidelines given in IS: 11546:1999 (ISO 707:1997).

Lot of food does not comply with standards if number of defective samples units is greater than c, or level of microorganism in a food any one of the sample units exceeds M.
